Greg Clonts won both hurdle races, Will Whiteley won the High Jump and Eddie Johnson won the 440 dash.



Haskell Girls Win In KC Invitational Relays

There was plenty of excitement in Greyhound Stadium last Friday afternoon as the Girls' Invitational Track Relays came to an end. The meet has always had its share of troubles with high water and floods preceding last year's meet. This year officials were confident that the meet would be completed even though high winds buffeted the track most of the afternoon.

However, as the meet was concluding and persons headed for their cars, the storm siren blasted out a warning that ominous clouds were approaching the town. What was later described as a "mini-tornado" sent the 500 girl athletes and their coaches scrambling for cover under the stands and buses. Fortunately no injuries or property damage occurred, as a dark cloud formed north of the track some 300 yards away and began whirling toward the field.

With seventeen high school teams entered, the Haskell Maidens won the meet with 108 points, paced by Toliver in the 80 hurdles and Horn in the discus with first place honors.

Toliver was the victory for the junior high division with 60 points.

Baird's Kathy Jones was outstanding in the high school events by scoring 50 points to give her team fourth place in the high school division. She won the 100 yard dash, the 60, the Triple Jump, the High Jump, the Broad Jump - five of 14 events, to claim the high point individual trophy.

Allen Lowrey local Veterans Service Officer for Knox County states that his office has received numerous inquiries concerning these reductions. Many contacted his office after receiving a letter advising them of the reduction in benefits, while others became aware of the situation when they received their January 1973 checks, and found them to be for lesser amounts than for previous months. All such decreases were effective January 1, 1973.

The Local service officer advises that the reductions were the result of a 20 percent increase in Social Security benefits effective September 1, 1972. Since the Congress adjourned in October without enacting any legislation which would change the annual VA income limitations, the reductions in 1973 payments were necessary. Social Security benefit payments are counted as income, less a 10 percent deduction.

The Congress is again in session, and consideration is being given to legislation which would help in restoring the lost pension benefits to many veterans and widows. The Veterans Service Office will have information concerning any such legislation which may be passed by the Congress during the present session. It will be necessary for the Veterans Administration to continue the reduced payments until action is taken by the Congress.

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
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
