The main event will be Dory Funk Sr. going against Hank James, managed by JoJo. For several months, there has been one of the hottest feuds in wrestling going on between these two.

Dory Sr. without a doubt, is an all time favorite in Texas. He is the father of Terry Funk and Dory Funk Jr., the world's champion. The Umbarger rancher is the toughest blood and got wrestler today. He never quits, but he will be in for a rough night Friday when he meets Hank James.

THE AERATION DITCH FOR THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT are being dug by W. B. Abbott and Co. of Lubbock. The ditch is 164 feet x 62 feet and is to be filled with a considerable amount of concrete. The city has a population of 2,000. The ditch will comply with current water quality objectives and the city must have complete treatment facilities. The project should require about three months, city officials.

Construction Is Now Underway On Waterwaste Treatment Plant

The city has finally approved the project that took a considerable amount of time in the long run. The city was awarded a contract by the Texas Water Development Board for the wastewater treatment plant. The city officials said that the project will be completed by the end of the year.

In April, 1971, allowed the city to get the grant increased to \$1,540,000 for area planning. The Brazos River Authority provided 25 percent of the amount in the form of a loan to be repaid by the city from sewer funds possibly within a year.

In September, 1972, bids on the project were opened with W. B. Abbott and Co. of Lubbock low bidder with \$35,376.10.

Knox Co. Riding Club To Meet Apr. 2

There will be a meeting of the Knox County Riding Club on Monday, April 2 at 7:30 p.m. in the Assembly Room of the Courthouse in Benjamin. Everyone is requested to attend this meeting. New officers for the coming year will be elected and plans for the coming playnights will be made.

The city advised the Texas Water Quality Board that the final cost analysis of \$44,000,00 would require that federal grant funds be revised and increased from \$6,940,00 to \$24,000,00.

Last November, the city was advised that under the provisions of the new Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, the project might be eligible for a grant increase to 75 percent. The application was submitted immediately for the grant increase and received approval for \$33,000,00.

Mr. White, 83, died Sunday at 2:15 p.m. in the Knox County Hospital after a n illness of three months.

Born January 23, 1890 in Erath County, Texas, he married Effie Gentry January 5, 1911, in Stephenville. He moved to Knox County in 1908. In 1923 he became partners with L. C. Porter in the Feed and Coal business and continued to operate the business after Mr.

Porter's death. He was joined in the business by his son, Rufus. In 1969 his grandson, Ronny became his partner in the Sam L. White & Son Grain and Feed Store.

Mr. White was a member of the First Baptist Church.

His two sons, Rufus and Bill preceded him in death.

Survivors include his wife, Effie of Knox City; 5 grandchildren; 7 great-grandchildren and one great great grandchild.

Winds Cause Damage In Area

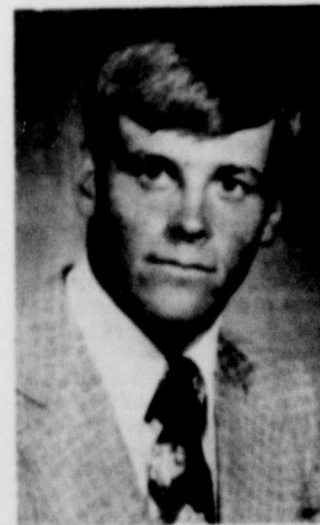
Last Friday when most of the Big Country was under a tornado alert, Knox City received some damage from winds described as mini-tornadoes.

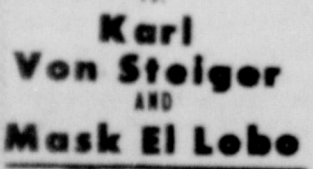

Haskell Girls Win In KC Invitational Relays

There was plenty of excitement in Greyhound Stadium last Friday afternoon as the Girls' Invitational Track Relays came to an end. The meet has always had its share of troubles with high water and floods preceding last year's meet. This year officials were confident that the track would be completed even though high winds buffeted the track most of the afternoon.

However, as the meet was concluding and persons headed for their cars, the storm sirens blasted out a warning that oncoming clouds were approaching the town. What was later described as a "mini-tornado" sent the 500 girl athletes and their coaches scrambling for cover under the stands and buses.

Fortunately no injuries or property damage occurred, as a dark cloud formed north of the track some 300 yards away and began whirling toward the field.

With seventeen high school teams entered, the Haskell Maidens won the meet with 108 points, paced by Toller in the 80 yard dash, and Horn in the discus with first place honors.

Puduch won the victory for the junior high division with 60 points.

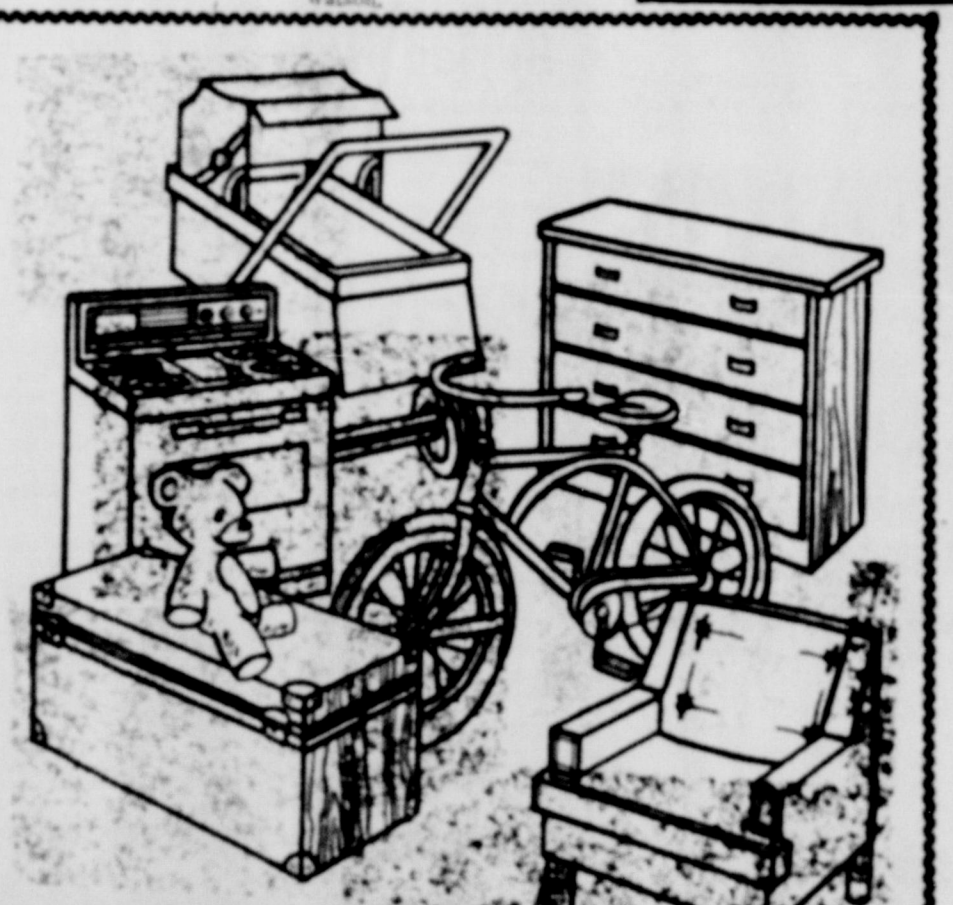

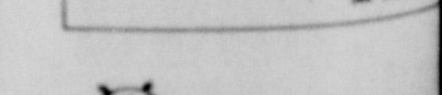

Computer Medicine Now At Knox County Hospital

Knox County Hospital District has taken another big step into the Electronic Age, or to be more precise, computerized medicine.

A national computer network TELEMED Corporation, will soon be installing the instrumentation to enable Knox County Hospital District to "Teletone-in" electrocardiograms taken on its patients.

The ECG information will be transmitted to the Schiller Park, Illinois Computer Center where it is processed. The computer will then call in the hospital and a teletype unit will receive the analysis.

TALKING TO THE COMPUTER

A technician places small electrical sensors or electrodes on the patient's ankles, wrists, and chest. These are attached to the ECG cart with small wires. The technician then dials the computer center and the computer answers with a "beep" in the telephone receiver. The technician then moves a switch on the cart and code data is automatically transmitted to the computer which identifies the hospital and patient and the patient's height, age, sex, and weight.

Two seconds later, the computer again informs the technician via a signal light on the cart that it has received the code information and is ready to receive the ECG. A switch is flipped and the cart automatically records the entire ECG in 20 seconds.

While the cart is taking the ECG, the computer is watching the process. At the end of the ECG, the computer lights another signal lamp on the cart telling the technician that the information was received. The technician then hangs up the receiver and waits for the computer analysis. Within minutes, a bell rings on the teletype unit as it starts to type out its message.

First comes a verification of the patient and hospital code then a series of tabulated numbers rating the various functions of the heart. Finally, a printed analysis and interpretation concludes the report.

24 HOURS A DAY, 365 DAYS A YEAR

The big advantage of this recent development is a speedy reading and interpretation of the heart's performance, and it can be obtained at any time of day or night, a particularly valuable aid in off-hour emergency cases.

It is not the intent of TELEMED's Computer Processed Electrocardiogram Service to replace man with machine, or doctor with computer. It is there to assist him by providing a rapid indication of the "normal" electrocardiogram versus the "abnormal." This allows the physician to concentrate his attention on the patient whose interpretation indicates that further clinical diagnosis and treatment may be necessary.

Maximizing the efficiency of staff physicians is a must in keeping patient care costs down. The computer collects the information and provides a general analysis faster than traditional methods. In only a few seconds, the computer makes 26,000 separate measurements on each ECG before the analysis is ready for return.

In addition to its speed and economy, the national ECG network assures maximum levels of accuracy and dependability. Knox County Hospital District expects to process 200-300 ECGs via computer over the coming year.

Two Blasts To Warn Of Storm

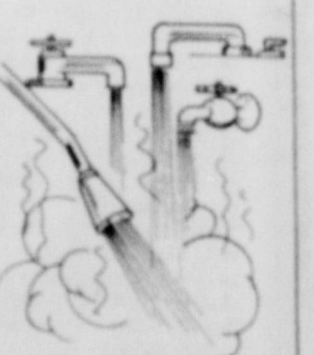

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Price To Ask That Guar Be Allowed As Substitute

The Office of Congressman Bob Price announced last Thursday that early this week the Congressman would introduce Legislation which would allow guar to be included as a substitute crop for wheat, feed grain, and cotton.

If passed, the Legislation would allow area farmers to plant a new cash crop and retain their yield history on wheat feed grain or cotton. Guar production in this area would add considerably to the cash income of farmers and bring some relief to producers who aren't able to produce large volumes of feed grain due to growing conditions in certain portions of the 13th District.

As a result of increased demand for Guar on the domestic market and the probability of increased export market for guar, several large corporations which are represented in the Wichita Falls and Amarillo area have indicated an interest in the crop and are offering a stable market for its production.

Guar is used as an ingredient of ice cream, cloth and paper sizing, oil well drilling muds, ore flotation, whipped cream substitutes and highly refined gum. Guar contains from 30 to 35 percent protein and can also be used as a protein supplement for livestock.

"The 1970 Farm Program has been well accepted by most agricultural producers and this legislation will enable even more flexibility in the farmers plans for the coming years," Congressman Price said. He also stated "I hope we have immediate action in committee on this Legislation so that farmers can take advantage of the change in the program this crop year."

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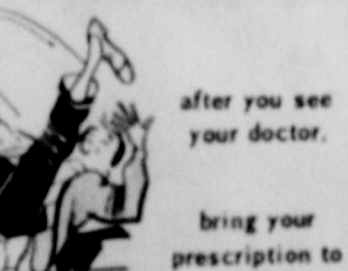
