## Joe Tidwell Assigned To Knox County Area

Joe D. Tidwell, Vegetable Specialist, Texas Technological College graduate, has been assigned to the Knox County Area to help establish a vegetable research program. The program is designed to improve cultural practices, develop new varieties of vegetables to the area, increase production and acreage, and encourage the planting of fall crops of vegetables. On-the-farm test plots will be planted where fertilizers, insecticides, fungicides and herbicides will be used and evaluated as a part of the over-all effort to assist the farmer with many of the agricultural problems found in this area.

## Veterans Day November 11, A Day Of Hope

AS THE PENDULUM SWINGS Monday, November 11, 1968, is Veterans Day, a day of hope. Fifty years have passed since the end of one of America's great attempts to ensure freedom and peace for the world. Silence had fallen over No Man's Land in Europe at 11:00 a.m. on November 11, 1918, ending World War I. This date and time marked the moment for an annual observance by the United States. It was called "Armistice Day". Next Monday, fifty years later, we are still looking forward toward the future and the achievement of a world free of aggression. For eight years, the people of the nation paused on November 11 to pay homage to the 4 1/2 million men who represented the United States in this great conflict. There had been 126,000 men who paid the supreme sacrifice. They were remembered in services beginning on November 11, 1921. Five years later, in 1926, "Armistice Day" was changed to Veterans Day. ## 50 Years Ago . . . . . A R M I S T I C E

The leaves had fallen from the trees of Compiègne Forest at Rethondes, where two railway trains waited in the dawn mist. It was close to 5 A.M. on November 11, 1918. In a car of one of the trains sat a tired group of men, about to sign a document over which they had haggled through the night. There was no riding up of generals on spirited steeds, no surrendering of swords, but soon, at 11 A.M., the greatest war in history would be over. The Germans, who had plunged into the struggle with the heady optimism, were beaten, and Matthias Erzberger, leader of their delegation, knew he must yield to Foch's demands. "I saw Erzberger brandish his pen and grind his teeth," Foch wrote later. "I was then glad that I had exerted my will. . . . The business was settled." History was to prove sadly that the business was not settled, but both German and Allied soldiers along the lines felt an unforgettable joy and relief that, at last, all was quiet on the Western Front.

## Former Resident's Townhouse Shown In Nov. Magazine

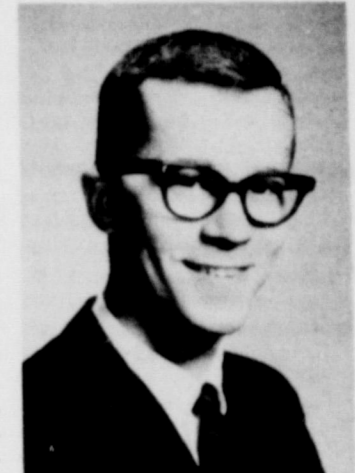

**Bond Sales Reach 56% Quota In '68**

Mr. W. E. Braly, Chairman of the Knox County Savings Bonds Committee reports today that sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Knox county totaled \$3,464 during September. Sales during the first nine months totaled \$90,265 and this is 56 percent of the 1968 sales goal. September sales in Texas totaled \$13,508,678 and the January-September sales were \$134,729,099 — an increase of 8.3 percent over sales during the same period of 1967.

Nationally, the cash sales of E and H Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares totaled \$361 million for September and topping September sales for 10 of the previous 11 years. Holdings of Savings Bonds/Freedom Shares as of September 30 total \$51,964 million.

"Vice Day" was made the official name for this observance. Twelve years later, in 1938, a Congressional Resolution proclaimed the date a legal public holiday.

Just one year later, in 1939, the hopes of man were shattered when World War II began. Once again, America responded to the challenge. 161 1/2 million men were called to bear arms for the protection of our allies.

Twice since then Americans have rallied to the oppressed . . . once in Korea and now in Vietnam. When communists invaded Korea and South Vietnam, we came to the aid of those suffering men and women who had envisioned a land

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of freedom. Today, even though we are in the throes of such aggression, we still maintain hope, as Americans, for peace for the world, and will not accept a peace of slavery, but a peace of honor.

As we celebrate Veterans Day this year, we pause to remember the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, symbolic of all those Americans who paid with their lives, that our freedom might endure. In the past fifty years, over one-half million men have given their lives in this endeavor.

We have inherited a great treasure and are the recipients of a trust which we must keep, or we shall lose this freedom which has been maintained at such great cost. The 39 million men of past wars, all across our nation, have given us this torch to carry. More than 26 million of these fighting men are alive today. We have a great responsibility and we owe a great debt to these men who have given us the freedom that we cherish so dearly.

To these men that we honor on Nov. 11 as veterans, we owe
