Tuesday Weather Reminds Residents Of March 13, 1953

Tuesday of this week reminded residents of that March 13, 20 years ago, when an angry Texas twister slashed a 300 yard swath across northwestern Haskell County and the southern tip of Knox County, claiming the lives of 14 persons and hospitalizing 23 more. In Knox City alone real estate damages were estimated at over \$2 million.

Tuesday morning a sudden wind hit with hard rain from the west. Gusts were measured up to 70 miles an hour and some damage was noted in town to roofs, two large trees were uprooted and several old sheds were reported to be completely demolished.

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




