Accidents Investigated

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of October, 1974, according to Sergeant J.W. Garner, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1974 shows a total of 34 accidents resulting in no persons killed and 11 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1974, shows a total of 502 accidents, resulting in 19 persons killed and 215 persons injured as compared to October, 1973, with 664 accidents resulting in 31 persons killed and 77 persons injured. This was 162 less accidents, 12 less killed, and 162 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

The 19 traffic deaths for the month of October, 1974, occurred in the following counties: three in Hale; two each in Haskell, Lubbock, Palo Pinto, Wise; and one each in Clay, Briscoe, Hall, Ochiltree, Oldham, Roberts, Swisher, and Wheeler.

Winner Jim Ned To Play Seagraves

Hounds Suffer Loss In Bi-District Try

Despite the cold north wind and sand that hit Shotwell Stadium in Abilene Saturday night shortly after the kickoff for the bi-district game between Knox City and Jim Ned, over 2,000 fans were on hand to watch the Indians fumble their first defeat of the season, 28-12.

Winning the flip, Jim Ned chose to defend the north goal. The Hounds received and controlled the ball the first quarter driving to Jim Ned's 20 when a 15-yard penalty proved costly and denied the Hounds the chance to score.

Jim Ned scored early in the second quarter when they went 72 yards in six plays with Johnny Quinney going the final 20 yards and kicking the extra point.

The Hounds ran three plays and punted and the Indians got the ball back and didn't relinquish it until nearly the half. Jim Ned drove from its own nine to the 35 and Ricky McClure punted 23 yards. The ball was fumbled and Tommy New pounced on the pigskin for the Indians at the Hound 43.

This time, it took the Indians eight plays to get in. The big gainer was a 20 yard scamper by Quinney and he again added the extra point, ending the first half, 14-0. The Hounds took the wind in the second half, but didn't get to use it to the best advantage.

Jim Ned took the kickoff and promptly hit paydirt, with Tony Elkins, Quinney, and Brian Aycock providing the punch, and Johnny Kraatz's

making the two-point conversion.

Don Swearinger gave the Hound fans a big boost on the kickoff when he rambled 37 yards after taking a squib kick to set the Hounds up at the Jim Ned 33.

Jerry Stamps picked up three yards on the first play and Charlie Flye swept the end for a touchdown from 30 yards out. Flye's run attempt for the two points was stopped.

The Hounds got another break on the Indians' second play after the kickoff when Elkins fumbled and Bo Johnson pounced on it.

Trying for a touchdown five plays later, Joey Swain was dropped for a five yard loss and the Hounds had to give

up the ball.

Jim Ned did the Hounds a favor on the next play when Elkins fumbled at the one, the ball fell into the end zone and Jimmy Moore fell on the ball for a Greyhound touchdown, but the try for two extra points failed.

The Indians pushed it up as Aycock scooted in from seven yards out. Quinney's kick attempt was no good.

Still another turnover was picked up by the Indians in the closing seconds as Aycock picked off a Swain pass.

After a very successful season, the Hounds ended 10-1.

Jim Ned will meet Seagraves, champions of District 5-A, at 7:30 p.m. Friday in Big Spring Memorial Stadium.

Hale Center Meet Set For MG Patients

The Northwest Texas Chapter of the Myasthenia Gravis Foundation has announced that a clinic will be held on December 6 beginning at 8:00 a.m. in Hale Center for all patients in the area.

Dr. Bernard M. Patten, the Chief of the Neuromuscular Disease Department of Neurology at the Baylor College of Medicine Medical Center in Houston, will conduct the clinic. He has written many research papers on M.G. and has held several M.G. clinics throughout the U.S.

According to Gordon Russell, administrator of the Hi-Plains Hospital in Hale Center, which will host the clinic, arrangements are being made to provide for the comfort of patients while they are attending the clinic. Meeting rooms, beds for those that might need rest, free meals for patients and their families, and coffee during the day are all being provided by the hospital. Safety Program Is Presented At School

If a small child suddenly dashed out into the street in front of your car, COULD YOU STOP IN TIME? Many people say, "I can stop on a dime."

Students of Knox City High

School had an opportunity at 10:30 Monday, November 18, to see for themselves the distance required to stop a car in an emergency, while participating in a Farm Bureau sponsored traffic safety program, according to Bill Holcomb, Principal.

The program, in two parts, was given under the direction of Ben Bullard, Waco, Assistant Safety Director, Texas Farm Bureau.

During the first part of the program, Bullard discussed Texas traffic safety, in addition to outlining procedures to be followed during the second part demonstration.

The group was then directed to N. 5th Street north of the school to witness driving tests at 20, 30, and 40 m.p.h.

Bullard rode in his special equipped car with each of the drivers. The safety belts were used during each test. During each test, the equipment signaled the driver to make a panic stop and marked the exact spot on the street. Two more spots were marked: (1) where the brakes were first applied and (2) where the car came to an exact and complete stop. Students and teachers got a "panorama view" from their safety vantage point. Student assistants, using a steel tape, measured the reaction and braking distances in exact feet and inches. Following each stop test and measurement, Bullard announced the results over his auto public address system for each member of the audience to mark their personal card.

This program was also presented to students and teachers at Benjamin at 1:30 Wednesday, November 20.

This public service traffic safety program, presented before high schools across the state since 1957, was brought to Knox City and Benjamin under the sponsorship of the Knox County Farm Bureau.
