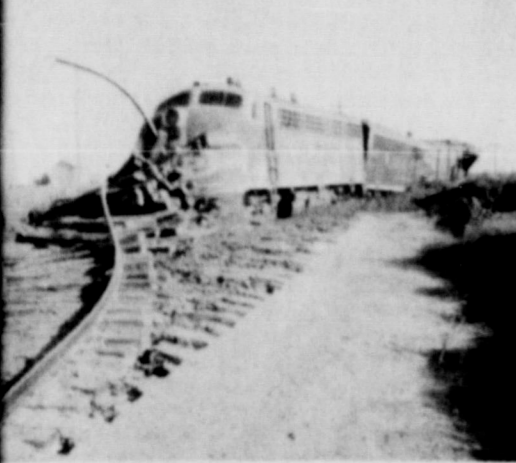

Knox County Vegetable Festival Held In Munday June 28-29

Annual Knox County vegetable festival will be held in Munday, Texas, June 28-29th. The festival is held in June and features vegetable harvest exhibits of various vegetables and judged. Cooked foods are also prepared and judged by judges. Ribbon prizes will be given to winners. The festival is sponsored by the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

A northbound Santa Fe freight train derailed about two miles south of O'Brien on Wednesday last week at 5:05 p.m. after apparently hitting a "sun kink", caused by heat expansion of the metal track, according to train company officials. Three diesel engines and two hopper cars were derailed and approximately 250 feet of track was badly damaged. The units were en route to a derailment north of Benjamin which occurred Tuesday.

According to officials, the hopper cars, used for loading wheat, are heavier and larger than box cars, and fortunately were empty at the time. There were no injuries among the crew members, but one spokesman said they were "pretty shook up when it looked as though some of the cross ties were coming right through the front of the train." Crews began working immediately to clear room at the side of the damaged track for a "shoo-fly", a temporary track to handle rail traffic. Some of the men worked all night, and according to Z. I. Smith, local Santa Fe agent, service was resumed at 1:05 p.m. the next day. Mr. Smith said that the temporary track was constructed from pre-fabricated rails and cross ties, spiked together in a panel, and would be used until a permanent track can be rebuilt.

Year-to-date sales were \$62,708,055 --- 11 percent higher than a year ago.

50-Year Masonic Pin Given E. Q. Warren At Ceremony

Members of the Orient Lodge No. 905 AF&AM, relatives, and friends witnessed a special ceremony in the Masonic Fellowship Hall Monday evening of last week at which E. Q. Warren received his 50-year pin. George R. Wall, District Deputy Grand Master, 91st District of the Grand Lodge of Texas AF&AM, told the group, "We are assembled upon this occasion to pay a tribute of respect and esteem to a distinguished Brother of Orient Lodge No. 905. From time immemorial, Freemasonry has taught a proper reverence and veneration for age. This is particularly so when years of age stand united with years of service and when an honor is conferred upon a recipient who is both worthy and esteemed. Age has always been the 'crowning glory of man.' It affords an opportunity to reflect upon the past, and from the experiences of the past, the present receives its most useful counsel and guidance. It is to age we look for wisdom, and it is upon wisdom that Freemasonry builds each and every laudable enterprise. "There are three steps which are symbolic of the three principal stages of human life, namely: Youth, Manhood, and Age. In Youth we should industriously occupy our minds in the attainment of useful knowledge; in Manhood we should apply that knowledge to the discharge of our respective duties to God, our neighbor and ourselves; but it is only in Age, that we may enjoy the happy reflections consequent upon a life well spent." In presenting the pin, George concluded by wishing, "May you wear this emblem in Health, Happiness and Prosperity; with much pleasure to yourself and with honor to your Grand Lodge, your Lodge, and all of the Craft where so ever dispersed." Mr. Warren, who was 92 years of age last September 20, became a member of the Masonic Lodge in Merkel in 1918. He came to Knox City with his brother, H. M., and they established the first car agency here, as Ford dealers. In 1925, E. Q. purchased the funeral business from Bryant Link and continued his work as funeral director until July, 1957, when he held his business to E. Hob Smith. Mr. Warren married Miss Eva Williams of Merkel in Marshall, Missouri and he and Mrs. Warren have made their home here since 1921. She is widely known as a teacher of music throughout this entire area. L. W. Graham, longtime businessman and civic leader, made several interesting comments concerning the honoree prior to the presentation. After receiving the pin, Mr. Warren expressed his sentiments on the meaningful experiences as a Mason. Refreshments of ice cream and cake were served.

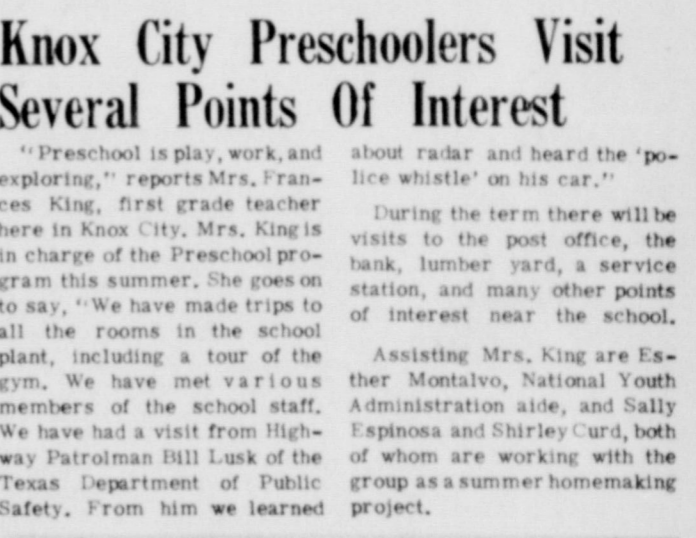

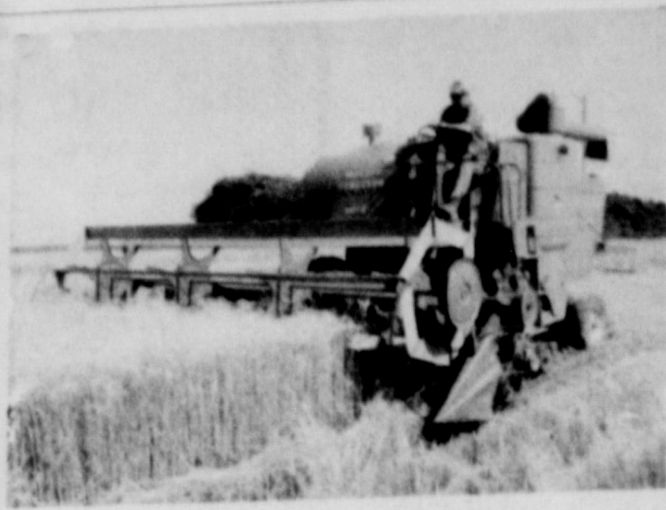

KCHS Senior Has Wheat Crop As Future Farmer Project

Don Hawkins, Knox City High School senior, harvested a 20-acre plot of Early Triumph wheat Thursday, June 13, and yielded 51 1/2 bushels per acre. Don chose the growing of wheat as his Future Farmers of America project, according to Leon Burkham, local vocational ag teacher and FFA advisor.

Don sowed one hundred and ten pounds of seed wheat per acre on November 10. Two hundred and seventy-five pounds of dry fertilizer were applied to the soil before planting. Approximately one and one-half acres could not be harvested due to the soft ground from recent rains.

Plymouth Marks Fortieth Anniversary In Detroit

DETROIT --June 11-- On the first production shift today, the 40th anniversary of the Plymouth car line was commemorated by production of the 15,832,544th car in its history. The milestone car, a Plymouth Satellite, rolled off the line at the Lynch Road Assembly Plant in Detroit.

The first Plymouth ever built was a four-cylinder model with a wheelbase of 109 inches and a price tag of \$670. Built at the Chrysler Corporation's Highland Park, Mich., plant, it offered low-priced car buyers such expensive-car features as

four-wheel hydraulic full pressure expansion and aluminum wheels. In that first year, there were 200,000 cars built. "Thus far in the year, we have built 654,694 Plymouths. White, Chrysler-Plymouth general manager said. "That's already a record. Our best Plymouth production history came in 1957 when we built 646,582 cars."

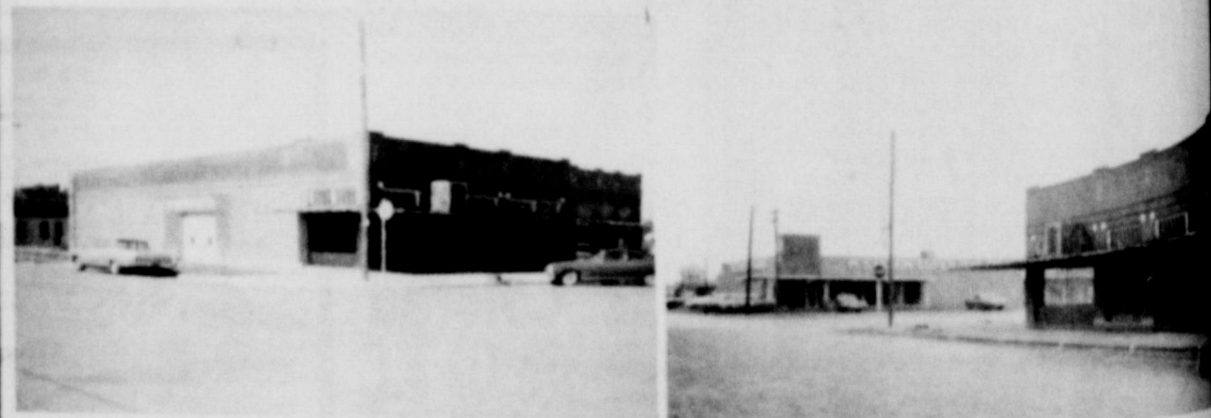

VEGETABLE FESTIVAL ENTRIES

Knox County residents are reminded to make entries in the Vegetable Festival to be held in Munday, June 28-29.

There are many areas of interest in which entries may be made. In the vegetable exhibits, commercial or home garden entries of many varieties may be made. Persons with home gardens are invited to check for possible entries they may make.

MAY STILL BE TIME TO SPRAY MESQUITES

Only a few days may be left in this season to effectively control mesquite by aerial spraying, Dr. J. D. Rogers, Texas A&M University Extension range specialist, says.

The extensive rains this year have prolonged the growing period for the pest and thus delayed effective spraying. During the period of rapid growth is the best time to spray mesquite because the leaves are performing photosynthesis to produce food for the tree. By interrupting this process it is possible to kill the mesquite, he adds. The time is growing short to treat aerially as the growth begins to slow, says Rogers.

Trees are approaching the cut-off point for spraying due to soil moisture reduction by excessive weed and brush usage of water. However, mesquite is entering the stage when basal application of herbicides can be used successfully.

On land where the stands of mesquite are sparse, generally less than 75 trees per acre, the basal method is unbeatable. When the soil is dry during the summer, basal application of herbicides is best because the chemical can reach the crown buds easier, the specialist concludes.

ZINC DEFICIENCIES IN PECAN TREES

June is the best time of the year to take pecan leaf samples for analysis to determine possible zinc deficiencies in pecan trees.

Now is the best time to take samples because the pecan trees are at a proper growth stage for determining the deficiency level. It is too late to treat pecans this year, but recommendations can easily be made for next year's treatment by sending in samples this summer.

An extra yield of about 30 pounds of nuts per tree each year can be obtained if deficient trees are treated with foliar application of zinc sulfate solutions.

Samples should be collected from representative trees of the same variety -- usually six

to ten trees in an average sized orchard. About 12 to 16 leaflets should be taken from the outside perimeter of each tree, well above the ground. Leaflets should be collected from this year's leaf growth.

Full information on the correct sampling, packaging and mailing procedure is available from the County Agent's office. Leaf samples can be mailed to the Soil Testing Laboratory, Texas A&M University. Analysis fees are \$2 per sample submitted.

Information sheets to be filled out and mailed with the samples are also available at the County Agent's office.

DISTRICT 4-H BOYS' CAMP

The District 3 4-H Boys' Camp will be at Buffalo Gap July 17-19, according to Herman H. Collier, Knox County Agent.

The fee for the camp will be \$6.50, which is an increase from last year. The reason for the increase is that the cost of the camp has increased. Registration will begin at 9:30 a.m. July 17, and camp will end following breakfast on July 19. Six meals will be furnished along with cabin and bunks. Boys will bring bed sheets, blanket or quilt and pillow, if needed.

4-H members are divided into four or more groups for competitive activity in softball, swimming, horseshoe pitching and other games. The majority of attendance in the past has been boys 10 to 14 years of age.

Of the 22 County District 3, there will be 164 4-H boys eligible to attend. Knox County may carry up to 10 members. All interested boys are encouraged to get word to County Agent Herman Collier of their interest in attending the camp.

Adult leaders are invited to attend the camp. Any father who would like to attend along with his son is certainly welcome to do so.

WEED CONTROL IN COTTON

Post-emergence weed control in cotton is more positive than pre-emergence. It is used from the time cotton emerges until layby time, says Fred C. Elliott, Extension cotton specialist. Timely application of post-emergence herbicides and mechanical methods can drastically reduce or eliminate hand hoeing, he adds. Most post-emergence treatments work best when weeds and grass are less than two inches tall and will usually do a better job when the weather is warm. Always use a surfactant at the recommended rate to control emerged weeds and grass, he says. Local county agents can supply details on herbicides and their use.
