

Hearing Called to Discuss School Budget for 1956-57

Foursquare Meeting To Start Tuesday

The Knox City Foursquare Church will begin a revival meeting on Tuesday night, August 21, Rev. Floyd V. Bailey, pastor, announced this week.

Services will begin at 7:45 nightly. Morning services will be held from 9:45 to 11 each day.

Evangelist for the revival will be Rev. Sidney Westbrook.

"Rev. Westbrook is in full time evangelistic work and is doing outstanding work in this field of service," the pastor said. "He is an old time Holy Ghost preacher and will give out the word of God."

Rev. Bailey said there will be special singing nightly, and invited the public to attend the services for "Christian fellowship, spiritual singing and anointed preaching."

Members of the Knox City school Board called for a public hearing on the 1956-57 school budget at a special meeting of the board Tuesday night.

The hearing will be held at 7:30 Tuesday night, August 21, in the superintendent's office.

Supt. Chas. E. Silk said a new provision in the school law provides that a budget be prepared, that the trustees make a preliminary study and call a public hearing at least five days after the meeting. Anyone in the district interested in how the money is being spent may attend the meeting and go over the budget with the trustees.

Tuesday night the board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Evelyn Nichols as elementary teacher. She will teach in Rochester, which is nearer her home.

No action was taken in filling the vacancy created by Mrs. Nichols' resignation, Supt. Silk said.

Bynum, a member of the highly selective American Bandmasters Association, has been director of the band and professor of music at McMurry since 1946.

Parents Reminded Beginning Students Need Certificates

All beginning students in the Knox City Schools should have a birth certificate to file with the teacher on registration day, August 31, Supt. Chas. E. Silk said Wednesday.

"Under regulations, we are not permitted to take any student under six years of age," the superintendent said.

Certificates should show that the child was six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1956. Birth certificates will be returned to the parents.

First graders should also have certificates showing vaccination of smallpox and successful immunization against diphtheria.

All elementary students were asked to be at the school at 9 a. m. Friday, August 31. They will be dismissed at 11 and buses will return students home at 11:30.

In high school, freshmen will register from 9 until 10:30; sophomores from 10:30 until 12 noon; juniors from 1 p. m. until 2:30; and seniors from 2:30 to 3:30.

The following Monday, Sept. 3, buses will run on regular schedule and the first full day of classes will be held. Lunches will be served at the school lunchroom. Prices of lunches will be 30 cents per student and may be paid by the day, week or month.

Bus drivers have, not been hired as yet, the superintendent said.

Ranch Notes

England, County Agent

Texas Research Foundation, known as the Renner Foundation, located near Dallas, recently to a group of ranchers from this surrounding areas. The trip was sponsored by the Abilene Review under the direction of Cooke, farm editor.

A group of farmers, ranchers, and others interested in Agriculture met Thursday, August 10, at the Hill Country Hotel in Ft. Worth, and arrived in Renner Friday morning. The trip was conducted on a tour of research farms where they observed the results of experiments with crop rotations, new varieties of crops, including perennial sub-

stant resistant varieties of wheat, permanent pasture grasses and other important agricultural crops.

Renner 15, is a paper-pod variety that makes harvesting much easier. It has yielded as much as 2900 pounds per acre in tests, and with a ready market for commercial seed at ten cents per hundred, may prove to be an extremely valuable cash crop for Texas.

Knox County Farm Bureau

The Knox County Farm Bureau has financed an expense-paid trip for five Knox County 4-H boys to attend a three-day district convention at Camp Perkins, Wichita Falls.

The five boys, including Germauer, Charles Todd, Ed Moorehouse, David Albus and Tom Moore, were selected by the county 4-H Council for their participation in 4-H Club work.

The Farm Bureau will be commended for its interest and assistance in Knox County's 4-H activities.

Legal Notice

FIRE LIMITS ORDINANCE
Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Knox City, Texas as follows:
SECTION 1. FIRE LIMITS: The following shall be and are hereby declared to be the fire limits: Beginning at the Northeast Corner of Block No. 27, Original Town of Knox City, Thence South through 4th St. and Main St. with the East Boundary Line of Blocks 27, 34 and 44 to the S. E. Corner of Block 44 Original Town;
Thence West with the S.E.L. of Blocks 44 & 43 to S. W. Corner of Block 44 for the S. W. Corner;

Thence North with W.B.L. of Blocks 43, 35 & 26 and crossing Main & 4th Streets to the N.W. Corner of Block 26;
Thence East with the N.B.L. of Blocks 26 & 27 Original Town to the place of beginning.
SECTION 2. PERMITS AND INSPECTIONS: No wall, structure, building, or part thereof, shall hereafter be built, enlarged, or altered, until a plan of the proposed work, together with a statement of materials to be used, shall have been submitted to the City Secretary, who shall, if in accordance with the provisions herein contained, issue a written permit in triplicate for the proposed work. Permits to be kept on file with the City Secretary.
Structures hereafter erected without a permit, or not in conformity with this ordinance, shall be removed.

No building shall be moved from without to within the fire limits, nor from one location to another within the fire limits until a permit shall have been issued therefor. No permit shall be issued unless such construction is in accordance with this ordinance.
The designated Building Inspector shall inspect, as often as practical, construction in progress to see that all provisions of this ordinance are being complied with.
NOTE: All plans and specifications submitted to City Secretary, designated official, shall comply with all city ordinances of the City of Knox City, Texas, and with Article 3271A of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas.

SECTION 3. CONSTRUCTION REQUIRED WITHIN THE FIRE LIMITS: No building or structure of wood, ironclad (whether on wood or metal supports), stucco, or veneer type construction, or any building whose walls contain wood supports, shall be permitted except as indicated in Section 4. No building shall hereafter be built, enlarged, or altered, except in accordance with this ordinance.
The thickness of walls shall be not less than as given below:
Brick walls shall be not less than 12 inches thick, except that small one-story buildings with floor areas of 750 square feet or less may have walls 8 inches thick.
Reinforced concrete walls may be three-fourths of the thickness of brick walls, but in no case less than 8 inches.
Hollow building tile may be used as filler walls provided such walls be supported on reinforced concrete beams and footings, and by adequate reinforced concrete or brick pillars or columns spaced not more than 16 feet apart; walls to be not less than 12 inches thick. Small one-story buildings of less than 500 square feet floor area may have walls of 8-inch hollow building tile.
Solid stone walls shall be 4 inches thicker than brick walls for like construction.
All exterior walls, party walls, and division fire walls shall have parapets extending at least eighteen inches above the roof, and said parapets shall be at least 12 inches thick, except where eight-inch walls are permitted as above, in which case parapets may be eight inches thick.
SECTION 4. FRAME BUILDING IN FIRE LIMITS: The following

frame structures are permissible in the fire limits:
a. Temporary one-story frame buildings for the use of buildings.
b. Wooden fences not over 8 feet high without roof or cover.
SECTION 5. ROOFS: All buildings or structures hereafter constructed in the fire limits shall have incombustible roof coverings.
No roofing on an existing roof shall be renewed or repaired to a greater extent than 10% of the roof surface, except in conformity with this ordinance, and in no instance shall more than one permit be issued each existing building in any one year.
SECTION 6. REPAIRS AND ADDITIONS: Any existing building within the fire limits which may hereafter be damaged by fire, decay, or otherwise, to an amount greater than 50% of its present value, exclusive of the foundation, shall not be repaired or rebuilt, but shall be removed.
Extensions, remodeling, or additions to existing buildings shall not be considered as repairs, and shall not be permitted except when conforming with Section 3 of this ordinance.
SECTION 7. ARBITRATION: Whenever an application for per-

mitted to repair any existing building already located within the fire limits is made by any person or firm, and the City Council and the applicant disagree on the extent of repairs to be made, and the permit is denied by the designated Building Inspector, then the City Council or Commission shall appoint a competent and disinterested person, and the applicant shall appoint a competent and disinterested person, which said two persons so appointed shall select a third member, and these said three persons shall appraise the building, examine the plan of the proposed work, and the statement of materials and labor to be used in the repairing or rebuilding of said building, and make a signed written report of their findings to the City Council or Commission. If such report reflects clearly that said rebuilding or repairing would be a violation of this ordinance, then such application for permit shall be denied by the City Council or Commission, and if such report reflects that the person seeking said permit has complied with said ordinance, and the requested rebuilding or repairing is not in violation of such ordinance, then said City Council or Commission shall issue a permit for the proposed rebuilding or repairing.
SECTION 8. VALIDITY OF ORDINANCE: If any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or provision of the ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or held unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole, or any part or provision thereof, other than the part so decided to be invalid or unconstitutional.
Whereas, public safety demands the immediate passage of this ordinance, creating this ordinance of Fire Limits; therefore an emergency exists demanding a suspension of the rules requiring ordinances to be read on the days, said rule is hereby suspended, and this ordinance shall have full force from and after its first reading and approval.

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Proposed Constitutional Amendments to be Voted on at an Election to be Held on Nov. 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31
proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 51-c, providing that the Legislature may grant aid and compensation to persons who have been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for offenses of which they are not guilty.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another Section, to be designated as Section 51-c, which shall read as follows:
Section 51-c. The Legislature may grant aid and compensation to any person who has heretofore paid a fine or served a sentence in prison, or who may hereafter pay a fine or serve a sentence in prison, under the laws of this State for an offense for which he or she is not guilty, under such regulations and limitations as the Legislature may deem expedient.
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all of the ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty" and
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty."
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

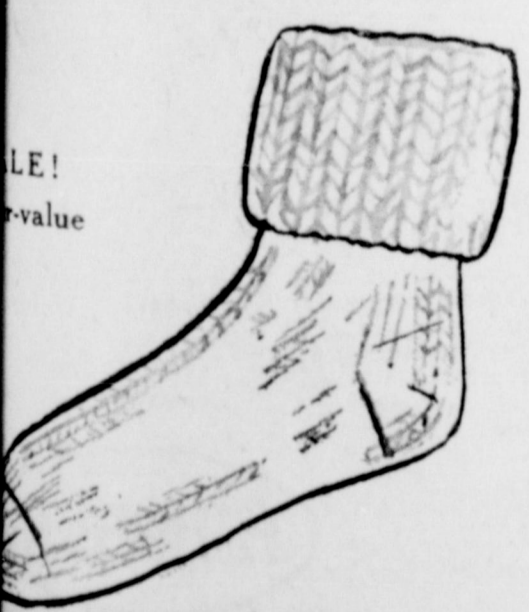

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 43a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize the Legislature to amend or repeal the existing Teacher Retirement System of Texas; providing that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 15 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1934, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto; providing for the necessary action, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 43a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 43a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 43, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the State and/or school districts, and shall in no one (1) year exceed the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for any such person; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.

"The Legislature may authorize all moneys coming into such fund to be invested in bonds or other evidences of indebtedness of the United States, or of this State, or any county, city, school district, or other municipal corporation or district of this State; or in such other securities as now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other State pension or retirement fund, contributed by the State, or received from the State of Texas.

as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 15 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1934, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the constitutional amendment empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State, authorizing that the State's contributions for such purposes shall equal contributions by such employees and providing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulating the eligibility of such employees for retirement benefits and prescribing the manner of investing money accruing to the retirement fund."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State, authorizing that the State's contributions for such purposes shall equal contributions by such employees and providing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulating the eligibility of such employees for retirement benefits and prescribing the manner of investing money accruing to the retirement fund."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and shall be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments to be Voted on at an Election to be Held on Nov. 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. No person shall be committed as a person of unsound mind except on competent medical or psychiatric testimony. The Legislature may enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for a waiver of trial by jury, in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, by the concurrence of the person under inquiry or his next of kin, and an attorney ad litem appointed by a judge of either the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry, and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machines in such manner that each voter shall vote on the machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
