## Correct Advertising Is An Asset; Make It a Part of Your Business

Knox City has a wide-awake citizenship, a progressive people as is shown by the number of business men, including heads of mercantile establishments and their employes, bankers and those engaged in other lines of trade, who are members of the Chambers of Commerce. This fact is also evidenced by the interest that is manifested whenever a move is on for any kind of development or improvement in our city or community. It is further substantiated by the number of modern residences and brick business houses, as well as the school building and church edifices in the town. There are other evidences that we could enumerate, and some that we do not call to mind just now, which prove conclusively that Knox City is one of the most progressive and wide-awake towns in this part of the state. ## THE AG CLUB STARTS POULTRY PLANT IN KNOX CITY

The Ag Club is completing the construction of its poultry plant south of the school building. Pens will be available for Rhode Island Red and White Leghorn laying hens and for Giant Bronze Turkeys. A cockerel from one of the leading White Leghorn laying pens of the 1920 National Egg Laying has been ordered from an East Texas breeder and a Rhode Island Red cockerel will be sent here from the College Station flocks. Absolutely modern equipment, made by the members of the class will be used, and balanced feeds will be fed. Green feed will be supplied from sprouted oats daily, and grit and minerals will be kept before the birds in self-feeders. A 200 egg incubator will be set about the middle of March so it is doubtful if there will be any eggs for setting that will be for sale. The eggs from the turkey pen will be set so that Knox City may be plentifully with home grown turkey next Turkey Day.

## SLEET AND SNOW WELCOMED HERE

Prospects Are Made Brighter For the Farmers Throughout This Section.

## INDUSTRY TO BE DEVELOPED

Wealth Believed to Be Waiting for Capitalists Who Will Promote Trade in Mesopotamia.

As law and order come into the wild and unsettled mountains of Mesopotamia, especially when new roads and the eventual railway connect the northern country around Mosul with the rest of the world, many a now useless tree and shrub will doubtless be put to service as a contributor of gum.

The gums of Mesopotamia have many commercial uses, and the systematic tapping and trading that now brings the product on pack animals to Suleimanya, where merchants buy it from Kurds and sell it again to other merchants in Bagdad, is a mere suggestion of the industry that may be developed by enterprising promoters who may have observed the extent of this natural resource in Mesopotamia and looked further afield than Aleppo and Bagdad for markets.

Now that British occupation has opened the land to Western ideas, it would not be surprising if the gum industry grew to be a source of considerable national wealth, and an important factor in creating a new Mesopotamia.—Brooklyn Eagle.
