LOCAL BOY WINS MEDALS
Spec. Four E-4 John E. McAda, U. S. Army 119th Assault Hel-

icopter Co., has been awarded the DFC and the Purple Heart. It was in Vietnam when Spec. McAda distinguished himself by heroic action on Nov. 11, 1966. On this date McAda was serving as crew chief on an armed helicopter whose mission was to secure a landing zone for a combat assault.

A battle was in progress between a civilian irregular defense group company and elements of the North Vietnamese Army. The situation demanded that a relief force rescue the friendly forces. Upon entering the area, Spec. McAda's aircraft became the target of hostile anti-aircraft fire. The fire remained constant and deadly throughout the assault operation which required low level flying.

Despite the enemy tactical advantage, McAda repeatedly placed himself in positions of danger as he brought continuous fire on the hostile weapons with his machine gun. Throughout the battle McAda continued to show an outstanding awareness of the tactical situation, sound judgement and devotion of duty.

His courage and determination under fire made possible the successful accomplishment of a difficult and hazardous mission, without the loss of a single lift ship. McAda's actions were an honor to the U. S. Army and reflect great credit to himself, his unit, and the military service.

Spec. McAda is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. McAda Jr. of O'Brien. He was born in Knox City April 2, 1946. He attended schools in Farmington, N. M., and O'Brien before entering the services April 6, 1966. McAda was home for a 30-day leave from Feb. 6 to March 6 and he has returned for an extended six-month duty in Vietnam.

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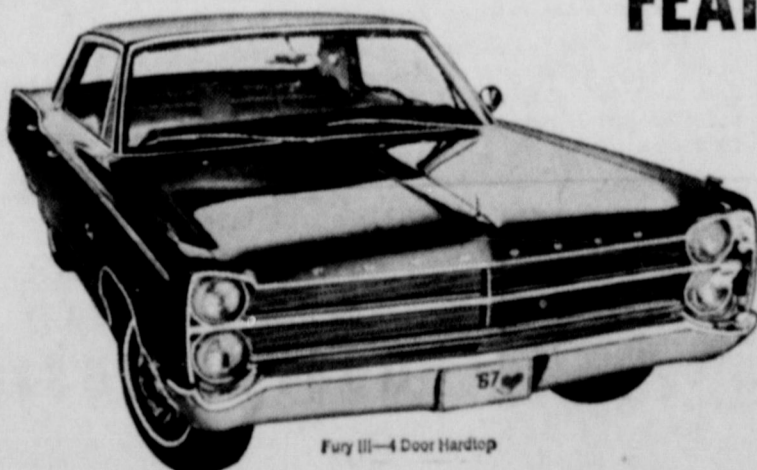
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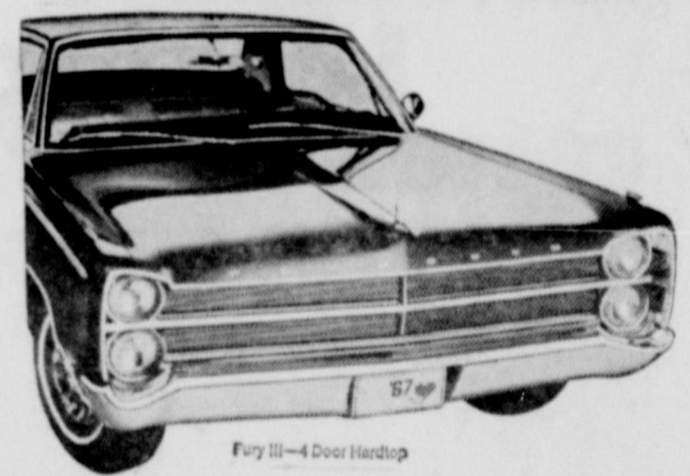
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Cotton Producers From Area Are Urged To Meet In Rhineland April 27

All Notaries Public Must Pay Fee and File Application

Secretary of State John L. Hill announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1967 and ends June 1, 1969, must pay the required fee and file a new application, oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between May 1, 1967 and May 15, 1967, inclusive.

Mr. Hill emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the Application to the Secretary of State.

Each person applying for a commission as Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age, a citizen of the United States and of Texas and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The required application forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

Secretary of State Hill further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term should apply to his County Clerk before May 20, 1967.

The required fee is \$4.00 which must be mailed to the County Clerk along with the Notary Bond and Application Form.
