More than 1,800 persons turned out Saturday for the Democratic Primary in Knox County with two contested races of local interest to the voters.

In the Knox County Sheriff's race, incumbent H.C. Stone was returned to office without a runoff, receiving a total of 1090 votes. Frank McAuley of Knox City received 237 and Don Daniel of Truscott had 511.

District Judge race for the 50th Judicial District showed Knox County totals for incumbent Joe Reeder Jr. as 1089 Judson Balch of Seymour with 496, and D.J. Brookreton, also of Seymour 235. Reeder and Balch will face each other in the June 3 election. The district includes Baylor, Cottle, King, and Knox Counties and the results of the other counties were not available.

There are several social programs where a mentally retarded child may be able to learn a trade, find a job, and be able to make a living for himself. However, what happens to the thousands of persons who have been mentally retarded since childhood to such an extreme that they are unable to learn much less provide for themselves. Administration has made it possible for some of these persons to receive social security benefits through their parents social security record for the rest of their lives.

When a working parent who has accumulated sufficient work credits under social security retires, dies, or becomes disabled and he has a mentally retarded adult child whose disabling condition has been continuous since before age 18 that child becomes eligible for social security benefits. For more information regarding adult disabled child's benefits, contact your nearest social security office.



The welcomed rainfall of 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 inches May 6 over the majority of Knox County will provide moisture for grain sorghum sudan crosses which have been delayed because of the lack of moisture. Weather permitting, many wheels will be turning planting operations by the time this weeks local news paper arrives.  
Cotton planting is not considered to be late at this time as the majority of the county crop is normally planted after May 15. The moisture will brighten the cotton planting outlook.  
Screwworm cases have recently been confirmed in Dickens, Fisher and Borden counties.  
Officials at the Screwworm lab near Millon and ranchers over Texas are very concerned about the rapid spread of this pest this spring. Knox County livestock and pet owners should make regular checks and practice control methods in an effort to keep down the spread of this costly pest. Larvae from any livestock or pets which may be collected and a sample mailed to the Mission Screwworm Lab., Box 969, Mission Texas 78572.  
Free mailing vials and cartons are available at the county agents office.






