Work Begins on New City Well

Work began Wednesday on the new city water well, according to Mayor Guy Glenn.

The well will be located near the Knox County Hospital, on two lots recently purchased by the city from Mrs. N. F. Mullins. John Shanks is contractor.

It is planned to build a concrete reservoir, with a capacity of about 250,000 gallons, near the well. Joe Ward, Wichita Falls engineer, is at present drawing plans for the reservoir, Mayor Glenn said.

Joe Simmons, local contractor, was awarded the contract for resurfacing the tennis courts, and work will begin as soon as cement arrives. Gravel for the project is already at the site.

Tentative plans have been made for the city park to be improved, Glenn said, with the work to include rebuilding the fence and repairing and repainting the bandstand. Additional lights have already been installed in the park.

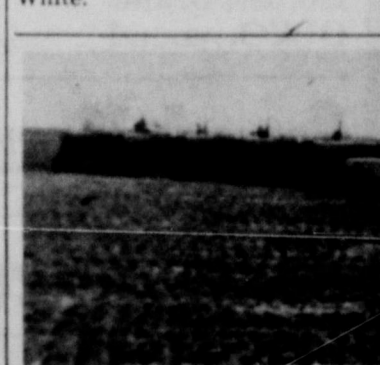

The Knox City Band was judged in Class D, since it is less than a year old, and scored Division III in concert playing and Division II in marching.

Haskell rated Division I in both concert playing and marching, and Division II in sight reading. Both Rochester and Haskell were judged in Class B.

The local band was not judged in sight reading since no Class D music was available.

Oil Notes

The James and Wilton Fair No. 1 Campbell-Carney, north of Knox City, has been plugged and abandoned at a total depth of 4,807 feet. Operators topped the Palo Pinto reef at 2,246, but the formation was hard and dense and failed to show oil in two drillstem tests. No shows were encountered in the Strawn. Operators set 240 feet of 10 3/4 inch casing Wednesday on the Fair Foundation No. 1 Roy Smith, about 2 1/2 miles north of town, and are waiting on cement to harden.

The Sunray No. 2 Frances Snelson is drilling below 4,000 feet.

The Dr. Sam G. Dunn No. 1 LouSamBob, wildcat on the Togo Moorhouse Ranch west of Knox City, is below 1,435 feet. This test, in the southeast corner of King County, is being drilled by the Leonard N. Schooler Drilling Co.

Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Co. has announced location for its No. 3 Clyde Grissom, in the Juliana McGregor field six miles west of O'Brien.

Munday Boy's Calf Wins County Show

Joel Smith, Munday FFA boy, showed a 1,075 pound prime beef calf to win the grand championship of the Knox County Junior Livestock Show, held in Munday last Thursday.

The Hereford calf was bred by the League Ranch of Benjamin.

The reserve champion was shown by Leon Johnson, Munday FFA boy.

Businessmen, ranchers and citizens of Munday, Knox City, Benjamin, Goree, Rhineland, Truscott, Gilliland, Vera and Red Springs sponsored the show and contributed the prize money totaling \$1,485. About 85 boys entered the show.

Charles Todd of Truscott showed the grand champion lamb and the grand champion yearling ewe. The grand champion dairy animal was shown by Bobby Lawrence of Munday.

Three grand championships in the poultry division, for cockerel, pullet, and trio, were all won by Don Haynie of Munday. He also took first place ribbon for broilers.

Members of the Knox City FFA chapter entered sheep, and hogs in the show, and won a number of honors. Barney B. Arnold, with his Southdown ewe, won first in his class and reserve champion ewe of the show. In the swine show a Hampshire gilt entered by L. C. Teague won reserve champion gilt and second in its class.

In the poultry show John Ed Smith won first place with a trio (two hens and a rooster). He also showed the grand champion rooster of the show. Leon Nolan showed a first place hen and a second place trio, and Charles Reed showed a second place rooster and third place trio. Hayden Reeves showed a third place hen and third place trio. In all, the boys showed 2 firsts, 2 seconds, 2 thirds, 3 fourths, 2 fifths, 2 sixths, 1 eighth, 1 ninth and 1 tenth.

The showmanship awards, furnished by the Knox County Farm Bureau, went to Dale Jackson of Vera in the beef cattle division, to Bobby Lawrence in the dairy cattle division, to L. C. Teague of Knox City in swine, and to Barney B. Arnold of Knox City in sheep. Jackson and Lawrence were presented with halters, and Teague and Arnold with belts.

W. C. Pallmeyer, Knox County Agricultural Agent, was superintendent of the show, assisted by E. R. Ponder of Munday, L. E. Groves of Knox City and Harold Freeman of Benjamin.

5. Active cooperation with all forces devoted to soil conservation.

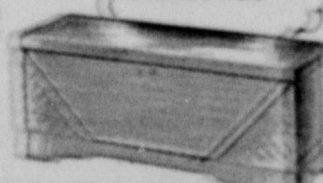
