## Funeral Today For Mrs. Bales

Funeral services for Mrs. Margaret J. Bales were to be held at the Knox City Four-square Church this afternoon (Thursday) at 4:00 p. m.

Mrs. Bales passed away about 4:00 a. m. Wednesday, August 6, following a stroke.

She was born Margaret Upchurch, in Conway County, Arkansas, on February 3, 1878. Following her marriage to Chas. Franklin Bales, they lived in Arkansas and Oklahoma. Mr. Bales died in Oklahoma in 1909, and his wife and children moved to Texas in 1912, settling in Montague County. Mrs. Bales had lived in Knox City since 1924.

Two children preceded her in death and four survive. They are: Ben O. Bales of Munday; Charlie Bales of Henrietta; W. E. Bales of Waco, and Mrs. Ethel Clinton of Graham.

Also surviving are two sisters, Mrs. May Davenport of Lexington, Okla., and Mrs. Janie Elliott of Morton; three brothers, W. A. Upchurch of Lexington, Okla., and T. R. and B. F. Upchurch of Norman, Okla.; seventeen grandchildren and 19 great-grandchildren.

Interment will be in the Knox City cemetery under the direction of Warren Funeral Home.

## Social Security Checks Due Increase

Nearly every family in the Knox County area now getting old-age and survivors insurance payments will receive more money beginning with the September payments due about October 3. If the increase does not show on a check when it arrives early in October, and an increase is due, a later check will make up the difference. It is not necessary for people already receiving benefits to apply for the increased payments.

Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls social security office, stated today that the recent amendments to the law will mean monthly payment increases ranging from \$5 to \$8.60 for practically all of the retired insured workers in this area. The average increase for retired workers will be about \$6. In general, benefit payments to wives, widows, children or parents will be increased proportionately; Tate pointed out, however, that the increases for dependents and survivors will be less than those for retired workers. In most cases, these increases will be about \$2 to \$5. In a few families the increase will go only to the retired insured worker.

"The reason for this," Tate explained, "is that the law has always provided limits to the total of benefits which may be paid to any one family in a month. In some cases, the increased benefit of the retired worker alone will absorb all of the permissible increase. Under these circumstances the full increase will be given in the check to the retired worker and the benefits to the remaining members of his family will remain unchanged."

The 1952 amendments to the law also provide for larger payments to most persons who will become eligible for benefit payments in the future. Tate said, and proportionate increases for dependents and survivors will be based on that of the worker.

## Mexican Labor Pact Explained to Farmers

Michael J. Gavin, Undersecretary of Labor, from Washington, was principal speaker at a Mexican Labor Conference held in Haskell Monday afternoon, which was attended by about 75 people.

S. N. Reed, president of the Texas Cotton Ginners Association, one of the sponsors of the meeting, attributed the light attendance to the drought.

Gavin told the group that the Labor Department had decided the country needed foreign labor despite some opposition, and Gavin believed an agreement had been reached which is economically sound and fair to all concerned.

William S. Tyson, solicitor, U. S. Department of Labor, told the group that the U. S. had to compromise on some things or not have a program at all, but that Mexico had also made many concessions. In all, 35 changes were made in the agreement.

Among other things, Tyson said, Mexico agreed to let the U. S. government jointly decide with Mexico on what grownters should be blacklisted from obtaining Mexican Nationals. Also, an appeal may now be directed to the Secretary of Labor and the Mexican Ambassador in Washington.

Another Mexican concession dealt with a laborer that "skipped". Before the agreement, a grower was forced to pay transportation for workers who departed without notifying the grower.

John W. Holland of San Antonio, head of the Immigration Service, said the entire labor agreement is in a precarious position because of the use of Mexicans who have entered the country illegally, and asked farmers' help in correcting the situation.

## LOCAL BOY SCOUT COMMITTEES NAMED

Knox City Boy Scouts have been divided into two groups—Troop 161 and Explorer Post 161—it was announced this week.

Explorer Post 161 is for boys over 14 years of age, and W. L. (Rip) Collins is Explorer Advisor. His assistant is J. G. Robin.

Troop 161, for younger boys, has Joe Murray Clonts as Scoutmaster, and Lincoln Bolin and Hayden Reeves as assistants.

The Troop-Post Committee for the ensuing year is composed of S. E. Park, Chairman; Otis Cash, Advancement; G. W. Coats, Finance; and U. L. Bennie, Camping. Rev. Oscar Bruce is Institutional Representative.

## TRUCKS HAUL OFF 84 LOADS OF TRASH

In spite of some confusion resulting from circulars being mixed, 84 loads of trash were hauled by trucks furnished by the city and County Commissioner Pete Knight, during the clean-up drive sponsored last week by the American Legion.

According to City Secretary Loyce Teague, Roy Reynolds is continuing to pick up trash missed by the trucks during the drive.

## County Democrats Want Shivers to Support Nominees

A majority of the delegates at the County Democratic Convention Saturday want the party, and its leaders, to support the Stevenson-Sparkman ticket right down the line.

This was indicated by passage of a resolution in opposition to Governor Shivers' stand, submitted by E. L. Park of Knox City.

The resolution, however, met strong opposition from the Goree delegation, who contended that such all-out support of the national nominees would be "giving our tidelands away".

Mr. Park and Roy Baker, both of Knox City, were elected delegates to the State Convention, to be held in Amarillo September 9.

## GRAHAM RESIGNS AS BOARD OF COMMERCE AND AGRICULTURE SECRETARY

L. W. Graham, who has served as secretary of the Board of Commerce and Agriculture since its organization six years ago, tendered his resignation this week.

The resignation was read to members of the Knox City Lions Club at noon today by B. B. Campbell, president of the Board of Commerce and Agriculture. Mr. Graham expressed his appreciation for the cooperation he has received as secretary of the organization, and pledged his assistance to anyone who may be obtained to replace him.

Mr. Campbell asked that a Lions Club committee be appointed to meet with the board and discuss plans for employing a successor to Mr. Graham, as well as plans for creating renewed interest in the organization.

## TEAGUE TO ATTEND FLY CONTROL SCHOOL

City Secretary Loyce Teague plans to attend a short course covering the practical aspects of fly control, in Anson August 19, 20 and 21.

The school, sponsored by the Texas Water and Sanitation Research Foundation, in cooperation with the City of Anson, will begin at 1:00 p. m. Tuesday, August 19. Thereafter, the daily hours will be 8:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m.

The curriculum will include pertinent information on pesticides, chemical formulations, spray equipment and procedures, sanitation as a means of fly control, a simple means of evaluating the effectiveness of a fly control program, organization of a fly control program, and biology and habits of flies.

Every civic club in the area, as well as every municipal government, was invited to have one or more representatives at the school.

## Youths Attack Truck Driver; Jailed at Benjamin

Four Oklahoma youths are in the Knox County jail at Benjamin, after assaulting and attempting to rob a truck driver near Benjamin last Thursday.

The truck driver, Clarence George, 35, of Seminole, Okla., was enroute to Brownfield with a load of drill pipe. He stopped, parked and went to sleep five miles east of Benjamin after driving most of the night.

He was awakened by a pop-bottle blow on the head about 9:00 a. m. to find the four boys attempting to rob him. He fought with the youths until they were frightened by an oncoming vehicle and fled in their car.

The unidentified driver of a pickup truck stopped and took George to Sheriff Homer T. Melton's office in Benjamin, after following the youths to see which route the youths took out of Benjamin.

Sheriff Melton and George gave chase, and the youths were overtaken about two miles south of Crowell, after hitting speeds up to 100 miles an hour.

The car had been stolen at 4 a. m. Tuesday in Muskogee, Okla., Melton said. In the vehicle was stolen merchandise taken in a series of burglaries in Oklahoma, Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas.

Three of the youths were 16 years of age, the other 19. They all gave Muskogee as their address.

George was treated at the Knox County Hospital for head cuts.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 35** providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon for in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, marking the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36** proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 41 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electors; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 41 to read as follows:

"Sec. 41. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon for in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

Each voter shall mark one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, marking the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

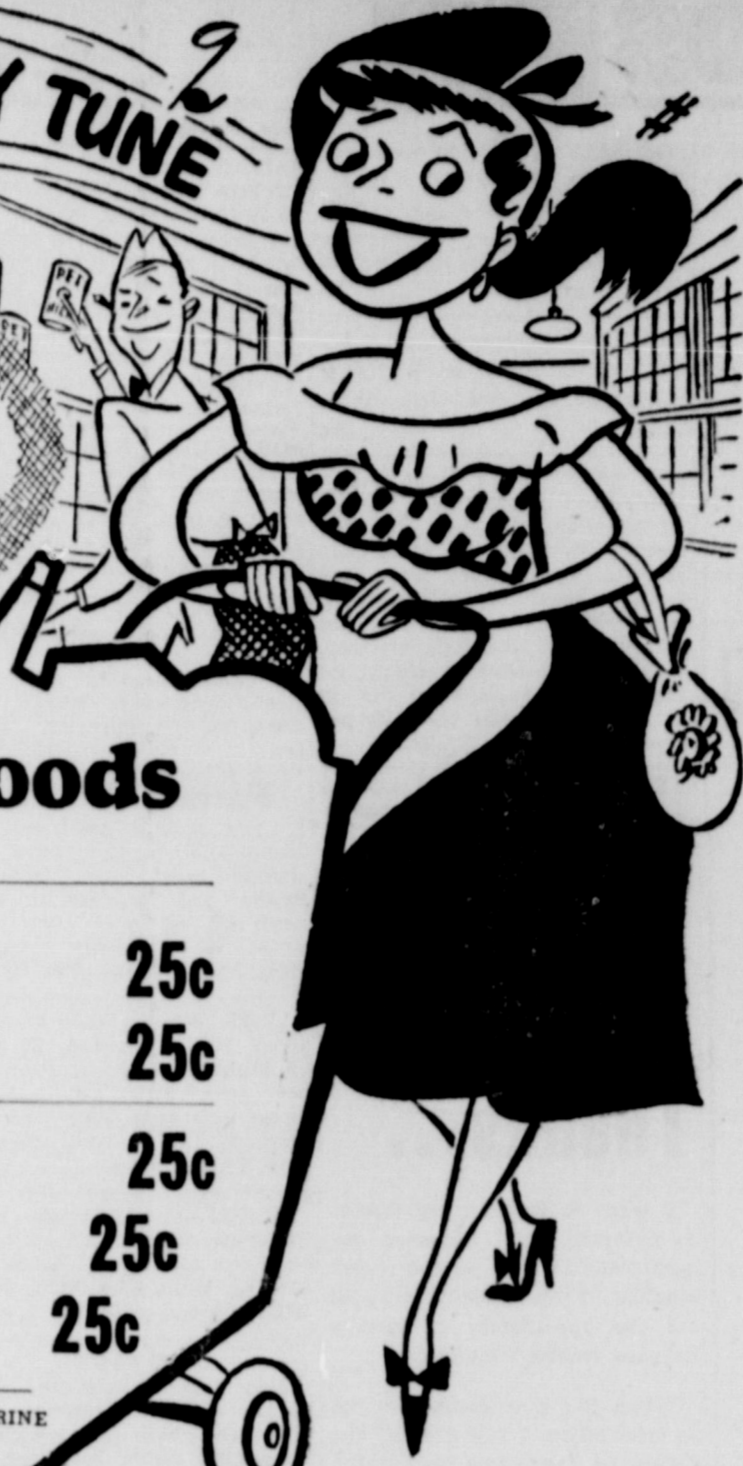
