Knox City's first bale of cotton was brought in about mid morning Tuesday by Clyde Voss, Charles Reese, manager of Brazos Valley Gin, has reported. The 1750 pound bale ginned out 450 pounds of lint with 890 pounds of seed. Reese said a premium price of 35c a pound will be paid by the gin. The Lankart seed was planted May 8 on the Hammons farm east of town.

Lunchroom personnel will be Mrs. Earnest Allen and Mrs. Clodeil Duke. Bus drivers will be teachers McLaughery and Beck, and Austin Hale will be school custodian. Supt. Skidmore said classes will be dismissed November 27 and 23 for Thanksgiving Christmas holidays will begin Friday, Dec. 19 and classes will resume Dec. 29. New Years day will be a holiday and there will be a long week end Easter when classes will be dismissed Friday and Monday.

Eight registered Duroc gilts will vie for county championship honors at 8:30 Saturday morning at Benjamin, County Agent Roy England announced this week.

The top gilt, together with the service boar for the program, will represent the Knox County 4-H swine breeding program at the District Swine Show in Iowa Park September 13. The district show is sponsored jointly by the Sears-Roebuck Foundation and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The county show Saturday will be judged by L. E. Groves of Guthrie, former vocational agriculture teacher in Knox City. England invited the public to observe the selection of the top gilt. Judging will be at the precinct barn in Benjamin.

## Warehouse for Grain Storage Being Erected

175,000 bushel grain storage warehouse is being constructed in Knox City by A. J. Mills, G. C. Carrouthers and Hubert Watson, all of Stamford, and M. M. Feld of Houston.

The four men recently built a similar warehouse at Rule, and have land leased at Rochester for another if demand justifies it.

The Knox City installation, located just west of the depot, is 60x140 and will hold 90 boxcar loads of grain. Workmen from Mitchell Engineering Co. of Columbus, Miss., started on the steel work this week, and the contract calls for the building to be completed by Sept. 1.

The warehouse will be used for government storage of grain. If all space is not used by local farmers, the Commodity Credit Corporation will ship grain in to use all available space.

## Classes to Start Monday At Improved School Plant

Knox City School students will be greeted by several major improvements, as well as the usual spotlessly clean halls and classrooms, when they go to school in the morning for registration.

Improvements in the system include a new band hall with private practice rooms, new lunchroom, redecoration of the elementary building, and the addition of dressing rooms and showers at the football field.

The old high school building was remodeled with space downstairs made into modern lunch-

room. The band hall is upstairs, along with private practice rooms and extra class rooms, if needed. The dressing rooms at the football field were constructed from lumber salvaged when the old lunchroom and band hall building was demolished. The building was the former Union Grove School building.

Supt. E. A. Youngblood said Wednesday that the facility is complete, and teacher assignments have been made. However, the assignments are temporary since several changes will be made if enrollment war-

rants, the superintendent said. The faculty will meet at 9 a. m. tomorrow, with teachers meeting with their principals. Students will register at 10 a. m. High school students will go to their assigned rooms, which will be posted on the bulletin board. Grade school students will report to their specified class rooms.

A general faculty meeting will be held at 1:30 Friday. Supt. Youngblood reminded parents of beginners of the two necessary papers they should bring to school on registration day. They are birth certificates and immunization records.

Supt. Youngblood said the buses will make their regular routes in the morning at a later hour than they will when classes begin Monday. The children will be picked up in time to reach the school before ten. The lunchroom will not be open Friday.

## Cloud Re-Elected To Legislature

Ed Cloud of Rule was re-elected to the State Legislature from the 83rd District Saturday, defeating Donnell Dickson of Seymour 3,160 to 2,381, according to unofficial returns. The total did not include 20 or 30 votes in a Haskell County rural box.

Cloud was high in the first primary in July, receiving 3,381 votes to Dickson's 2,348. A third candidate polled 1,568. The vote by counties Saturday was:

## Commissioners Are Re-Elected

Due to the high interest in the commissioner's races, more votes were cast in two Knox County precincts Saturday than in the first Democratic primary.

Over the county as a whole, the vote was about 75 percent of the vote in the first primary.

Commissioner W. W. Trainham was re-elected in Precinct 2, Benjamin and Vera, with 205 votes to 176 for his opponent, Clyde Beck. In July Trainham led Beck 171-113, while a third candidate received 87.

In Precinct 4 Commissioner George Nix of Goree defeated Billy Mitchell of Munday, 446-344. Nix led Mitchell 372-252 in the first primary, with 151 votes going to a third candidate.

Knox Countians also favored incumbent Ed Cloud, who was re-elected to the legislature over Donnell Dickson. The Knox County vote was Cloud 728, Dickson 553.

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN, Texas — Everyone wants harmony at the State Democratic Convention Sept. 9 in San Antonio.

Gov. Price Daniel, U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, National Committeeman Byron Skelton and Speaker Sam Rayburn—all say they want harmony.

Even National Committeewoman Mrs. R. D. Randolph, who has tirelessly needed Governor Daniel and the state committee good intent, harmony among Texas Democrats is hard to come by. Like a huge household of relatives and in-laws, the party always has many clashing personalities and viewpoints under one roof. In the past, there have been rump conventions and

separate rival delegations to the national convention.

It is the hope of avoiding this in 1960 that lies behind the cementing efforts. Many leaders for two years, more or less joined in by predicting "a spirit of good will" among delegates.

Despite all the expressions of content that a unified Texas delegation could have a key role in naming the next presidential nominee.

All the above-mentioned leaders are presently agreed on one issue—support of the party nominees. Point on which they part is whether the governor should have a veto over the state committee members selected by vote of district delegations.

Governor Daniel, following the practice of past governors, bumped some of the district-selected committee members in 1956 and submitted people more in line with his program.

Mrs. Randolph and Senator Yarborough, now joined by Rayburn, insist the governor has no right to do this.

But Governor Daniel has not promised he wouldn't. He said he felt no district should propose a committee member who is "dedicated to the sabotage of . . . duly elected officers of the party." This almost certainly refers to members of the Democrats of Texas (DOT), an ultra-liberal group that has heckled and hindered the governor and other official party leaders at every turn for the past two years.

Delegates from each of the 31 senatorial districts are allowed two state committee members—a man and a woman. It is estimated that perhaps six of these districts may be controlled by anti-Daniel forces. Therein lies the possibility for discord. If any of these districts proposes a DOTer for the state committee, the governor is not likely to "harmonize."

**HIGH HOPES** — Mr. Wilson went to Washington, his saddlebags full of multi-million-dollar hopes for Texas school children.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson personally delivered the Texas brief in the upcoming U. S. Supreme court case on Texas tidelands. At issue is whether the state or federal government owns submerged lands between the points 3 miles out and 10.5 miles out.

Wilson carried the arguments for Texas ownership in 40-year-old saddlebags that belonged to a heroic Texas Ranger. He declares optimistically that the case is jinxed—in Texas' favor—because the brief is dated Aug. 13, trial is set for Oct. 13, oral arguments will last 13 hours and 13 people worked on the research.

More seriously, he noted that Texas had spent "a big sum of money" marshalling its facts, that a bevy of top-notch legal minds from over the state, nation and two foreign countries had spent some 2,000 hours on the 400-page brief.

"We feel like we have an overwhelming case," he said. "We feel like we will win it."

**CITIES WIN OUT**—Cities and utility companies won the first round of a court battle to determine who pays the cost of relocating utilities for new interstate highways.

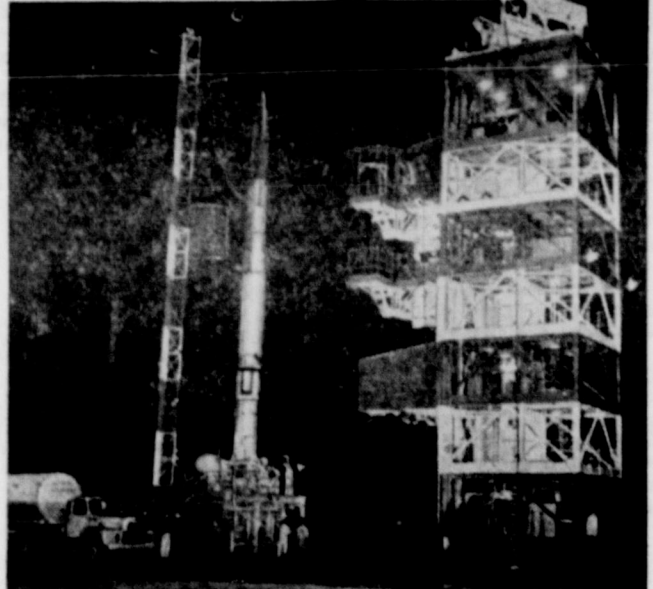
An Austin district court ruled that the cost can be paid from federal state highway funds, as provided in a law passed by the last legislature. State Highway Department is challenging the constitutionality of this law.

Ultimate decision will, of course, be made by the Supreme Court. Some estimate the relocation could run as high as \$100,000,000.

**PAROLE STAFF COMPLETE**—Board of Pardons and Paroles has announced the appointment of 10 new parole supervisors, rounding out the 40-man state-wide staff.

Adult parole staff was authorized by the last Legislature to allow for release of prisoners who show promise of "going straight." About 3,000 persons are now on parole in Texas, and more are expected to be released.

### Humble to Televis Game of Week on Sunday Afternoons

To celebrate its 25th year as sponsor of Southwest Conference football broadcasts, Humble Oil & Refining Company is adding a new feature to this fall's football presentations. It is a videotaped "Game of the Week" to be presented each Sunday afternoon during football season with Kern Tips narrating.

Announcement of this and other broadcast-telecast plans was made recently at a school for Southwest Conference announcers in San Antonio.

Besides the 11 videotaped games, there will be 70 broadcasts and four live telecasts of Southwest Conference games.

Live telecasts include the Baylor-Tech game, October 18; the SMU-Georgia Tech game, Oct. 25; the Rice-Army game, Nov. 8; and the TCU-Texas game, Nov. 15. These four games, selected by the Conference, will be telecast over a network of 24 stations.

More than 130 radio stations in Texas and New Mexico will be used for radio broadcasts of games played by the Southwest Conference, Texas Western and New Mexico University. These will originate from 25 stadiums in 16 states.

The announcers school was held in conjunction with the Southwest Football Officials Association convention in San Antonio. As a part of the school, the announcers attended sessions of the convention.

Instructors were Texas University head coach Darrell Royal and Kern Tips, one of the

nation's top sportscasters. Among announcers attending were Vex Box, Eddie Barker and Eddie Hill of Dallas; Bob Walker of Wichita Falls; Alec Chesser of Houston; Jim Wiggins of San Antonio; Jack Dale of Lubbock; Dave Russell of Beaumont, John Phelan of El Paso; and Connie Alexander of Albuquerque, New Mexico.

## STOCKER SHOW AND SALE SLATED AT FT. WORTH MARKET

FORT WORTH, Aug. 28. — Farmers and ranchers in Texas and the Southwest are torn between the horns of a pleasant dilemma as September approaches and the Fall trading season nears. They would like to hold many of their calves and yearlings on the good pastures, or feed them some of the grain they have made. Or, on the other hand, they would like to sell them at prevailing high

prices. Entries already on hand for the double-header stocker and feeder show and sale at Fort Worth stockyards September 4-5, indicate there will be a variety of good ones and plain ones on hand. Northern and Western stocker buyers are now making hotel reservations for this annual Fall livestock fixture of the Southwest, but will have to outbid many natives of the Southwest for the calves and yearlings.

Rains last week covered wide sections of the Southwest and assured grain planting on a wide scale, and freshened up pasture lands in general. The reaction was immediate as pens and alleys were crowded Monday with buyers, who in most cases were unable to fill their needs.

On the other hand, Monday's trade at northern markets was featured by strong to 50 cents higher prices on stockers and feeders and this was the first upturn in some weeks in that area.

All of this adds up to strong demand for the cattle and calves due in the sales September 4-5. Also in the seller's favor are the weights. Calves and yearlings are scaling 50 to 100 pounds above normal this year. Prices are currently \$4 to \$8 above those prevailing a year ago on stockers and feeders, the longer advance on young stocker cows and lightweight calves. Yearlings are \$5 above a year ago. Fleishy feeders are about \$4 above a year ago.

Herefords, whitefaces and crossbreds sell and show on September 4 while Angus, blacks and crossbreds sell and show on September 5. The shows and sales are jointly presented by the Fort Worth Market Institute, the Texas Hereford Association and the Texas Angus Association.


