The first Miss VRJC, who succeeds to college sophomore Peggy Jones as Vernon's representative to the Miss Texas Pageant, presented as her talent number, "I've Been Everywhere," a vocal number in which she portrayed a world traveler with bags packed and covered with travel stickers from around the globe.

## First Monthly Sales Tax Check Received

Knox City and other North Texas area towns have received the first monthly sales tax checks under Texas Comptroller Bob Bullock's new plan for sales tax disbursements.

The new monthly payments replace the old quarterly rebates and Bullock stated, "The quicker payments should be an asset to every city's financial operations and that because this money belongs to your citizens, we

have a responsibility to get it to you as quickly as possible."

Under the new monthly system, payments of less than \$500 will not be made, Bullock said. Monthly allocations of less than \$500 will be added to the next month and paid either when they top \$500 or at the end of each third month, regardless of the amount.

Area towns receiving checks are Knox City, \$1,346; Munday \$862; Breckenridge \$7,117; Childress, \$5,883; Holliday, \$1,729; Quanah, \$1,571; Seymour, \$1,475.30; Haskell \$2,769.43; Stamford, \$3,476.36; and Anson, \$2,454.10.

Area towns below the \$500 minimum are Benjamin \$38; Megargel \$42; Paducah \$135; Rule \$143; Rochester \$119.89; O'Brien, \$20.51; and Goree \$50.32.

The amount represents the net payment to the city less the 4.76% retained by the state.

### Hounds Win District Track

The Hounds won their third district championship Friday in Abilene. In probably one of the most exciting meets of the year, the Hounds had to come from behind to take the championship, Coach Jimmy Rogers said. After the field events, Aspermont held a 66 to 34 point edge on the Hounds, but they were able to qualify 13 out of 15 positions in the prelims in the running events and ended up taking the meet with 163 points to Aspermont's 130.

The Knox City Greyhounds qualified for regional in seven individual events and two relays.

Al Bateman qualified with a first in the 100, and 220 and second in the long jump. Jimmy Lynn was first in the 330; Robert Taylor first in shot, Bo Johnson first in the 440 dash, and Eddie Martinez first in the mile. The 440 relay team of Bateman, Charlie Flye, Johnson, and Cliff Ray was first and the mile relay team of Don Swearnger, Jimmy Lynn, Ray, and Johnson and also first.

## Annual Arts, Crafts Show Slated May 10

The annual Knox City Arts and Crafts Show is scheduled for Saturday, May 10, in the American Legion Hall.

The show is sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce and the Woman's Action League, with Mrs. Patsy Anderson serving as general chairman.

Entries will be accepted in three divisions, including children (through elementary grades), Youth (Junior High through High School), and Adult. Ribbons and Best of Show trophies will be presented in each division.

Major categories will be in Art, Handwork, Crafts, Col-

lections, and Miscellaneous. Rules for this year's show are as follows:

1. Entry fee will be 25c per entry for youth and children and 50c for adults.
2. Any entry taking a ribbon or trophy in previous local shows will not be eligible.
3. All work must be that of entrant.
4. All paintings must be either mounted or framed, ready for hanging. All collections must be suitably displayed.
5. Anyone desiring to sell exhibited work may do so with the stipulation they do not have the price displayed on the item before judging, and that it may not be removed from the premises until after the show. A small commission of 10% will be charged on all sales.
6. Show building will be open from 9 to 5 Thursday May 8, and from 9 until 10 a.m. on Friday, May 9. No entries will be accepted after that time. Judging will be at 2:00 p.m. Friday, May 9, and the building will be closed at that time.
7. Exhibitors are asked to pick up work at 5:00 p.m. on May 10.
8. Entry blanks may be picked up at the Chamber office in Knox City.

## County Voters

### Nix Pay Raise

Voters in Knox County rejected the proposed legislative pay raise Tuesday 250 to 239.

The state employees' retirement amendment won approval 292 to 205.

A total of 497 votes cast in Tuesday's election represented approximately 20% of the county's registered voters. Officials said the turnout was better than expected.

Voting by boxes included Benjamin, Amendment 1, for 38, against 15; Amendment 2, for 31, against 22; Truscott, Amendment 1, for 16, 18 against; Amendment 2, 8 for, 26 against; Gilliland, Amendment 1, 8 for, 20 against; Amendment 2, 6 for, 22 against; Vera, Amendment 1, 18 for, 16 against; Amendment 2, 11 for, 23 against; Goree, Amendment 1, 17 for, 16 against; Amendment 2, for 12, against 21; Knox City, Amendment 1, for 100, 65 against; Amendment 2, 82 for, 81 against; Munday, Amendment 1, 95 for, 55 against; Amendment 2, 89 for, 55 against.

Early unofficial returns Tuesday night showed Texas voters gave overwhelming approval to the amendment calling for increased benefits for retired teachers and public employees and also appeared to be on the verge of approving a pay raise for state legislators.

## SCS Marks Anniversary

April 27, 1975, marks the 40th anniversary of the Soil Conservation Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Forty years ago, the country faced tremendous problems brought about by erosion, floods, land damage, and violent dust storms.

On April 27, 1935, a new agency, the Soil Conservation Service, was created to combat the forces that threatened to lay waste to millions of acres of cropland. The Soil Conservation Service began working with landowners by demonstrating means of erosion control, but it became apparent that really effective conservation work was done better when landowners led the job themselves.

In 1937, President Roosevelt recommended that each state legislature enact laws permitting landowners and land occupiers to form units to be called Soil Conservation Districts. Rallying to the call, all the states, Puerto Rico,

and the Virgin Islands, enacted laws permitting formulation of districts.

Soil and Water Conservation Districts set out to focus attention on land and water problems on all privately-owned land, develop annual and long-range programs designed to solve the problems, and to enlist all the appropriate help available from public and private sources.

Now, over 3,000 conservation districts, covering 97 percent of all privately-owned lands, have formed in mutual concern to protect, conserve, and improve the world we live in.

Typically, a conservation district has five local supervisors, elected by local landowners. The supervisors work with the Soil Conservation Service district conservationist and other agencies in helping the landowner apply conservation measures on his land.

More than two million landowners are voluntarily planning and applying conservation measures in local soil and water conservation districts. They are helping to control erosion, improve water supplies, prevent floods, curtail pollution, and develop recreational areas.

L.D. Offutt, chairman of the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District, said the SCS has been giving technical help to landowners here since 1942.

The Wichita Brazos SWCD, organized August 6, 1942, was created to help the landowners in Knox County develop needed conservation measures. SCS assists the district under a jointly-signed agreement. About 650 land users are planning and applying conservation practices on their land with technical assistance of the SCS, Offutt said.

The scope of the SCS program has expanded since establishment 40 years ago. And the Soil and Water Conservation Districts have grown beside it, bringing a better life and future to everyone.

Miss VRJC's official car, a 1975 Caprice Classic convertible, will be furnished during her year's reign by Gordon Tidmore Chevrolet and Olds.

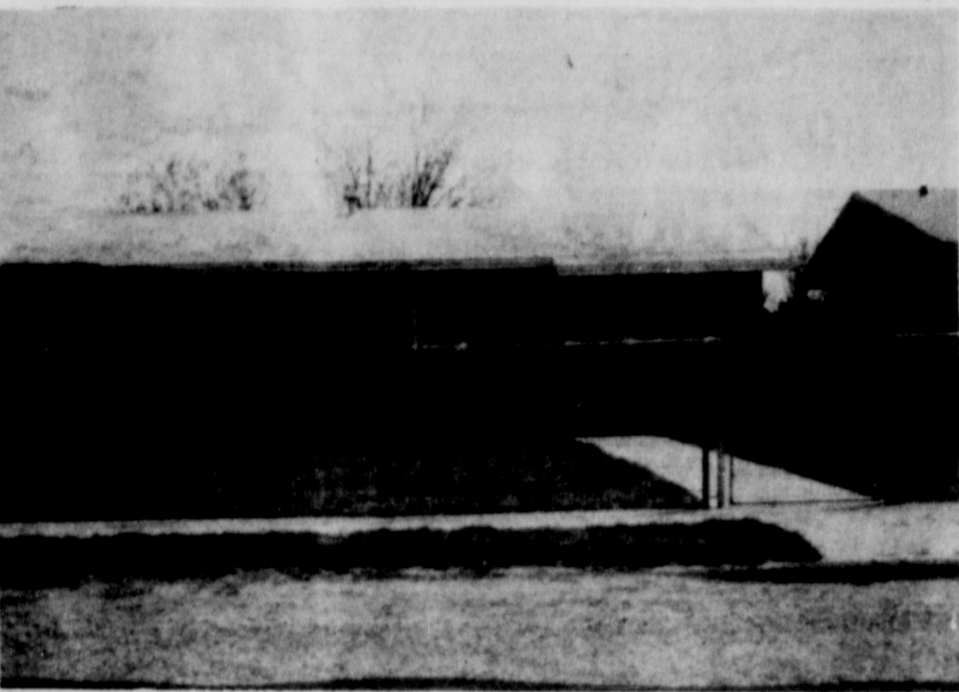

## Knox-Haskell Water Study Is Approved

Funds for a 40-month, \$237,000 study to discover the cause and cure of pollution of ground water in the Knox-Haskell County area have been approved by the Water Quality Board.

The board approved the hiring of Rollin W. Harden of Austin, a private ground water consultant, to carry out the investigations.

Harden previously served with the Texas Board of Water Engineers, predecessor of the Water Development Board, and as a consultant to William Guyton and Associates of Austin.

Harden stated that area residents feel they have an inexhaustible supply of water for irrigation, so long as it is not damaged by pollution. The study is intended to find the sources of pollution.

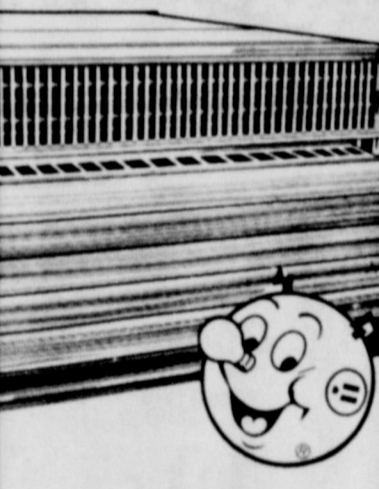

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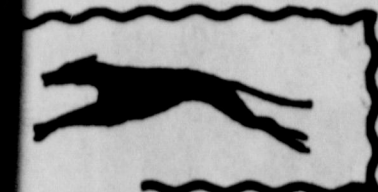
