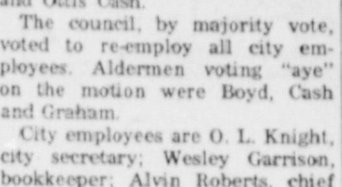

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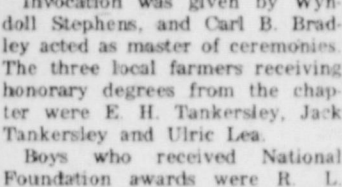
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## Junior Livestock Show Slated for Saturday

## Benjamin Lake To Open May 1

T. R. Ressel, chief of the Benjamin Fire Dept., said Wednesday that members of the department have been too busy to push the sale of season passes for fishing on the Benjamin Lake, and reminded all residents of the area that the lake will be open for fishing on May 1.

The season tickets, good for a man and his family, are good from May 1 through December 31. Those without season passes may purchase daily tickets for 25c. These tickets are for sale at Cartwright Grocery and Service Station, on the Knox City Highway, and at the Dolly Down Shamrock Station, en route to the lake.

The lake was stocked with 15,000 fingerling bass, and one caught recently by a five man "testing" the lake measured 12 inches. There are as so other fish of all kinds in the lake, Ressel said.

No swimming or water skiing will be allowed on the lake, but motor-line fishing and boats and motors will be allowed, subject to state laws.

"We think there's going to be some fine fishing in the lake, which has been closed for several years," Ressel said, "and everyone in the area is invited to try his luck."

## Plans Made to Control Salt Pollution of Brazos River

A long-range program for control of salt pollution in the Brazos River has just been announced by the Brazos River Authority, the state agency which is working for conservation of the river's water.

The campaign for a plan to eliminate much of the salt from Brazos water was undertaken many years ago by Lewis Mims of Houston, first president of the Brazos River Authority (1929-1941). Mr. Mims' persistent efforts to get a salt-control program going finally resulted in a study, recently completed, of the sources of salt pollution. As a result, engineers have been able to work out a plan for holding back much of the salt that now flows downstream. Details of the projected program have been announced by Herbert

S. Hilburn of Plainview, president of the B.R.A. The Authority now has information, the result of a two-year study, which pinpoints the area north of Jayton, near the corners of Kent, King and Stone-wall counties, as the source of 40 percent of all the salt in the Brazos River. Jayton is about halfway between Lubbock and Stamford.

The study, contracted by the B.R.A. with the Texas A & M Research Foundation, was made by Dr. Horace R. Blank, a professor in the college's Department of Geology. It began in August, 1954 and the various findings are being further developed by B. R. A. engineers and staff in collaboration with the U. S. Geological Survey and the State Board of Water Engineers.

Three Salt Flats Found A series of expeditions out the Salt Fork of the Brazos, from a point north of Knox City to the crockrock near Crosbyton and the Double Mountain Fork tributary to the eastern edge of the High Plains in central Garza county, uncovered three salt flats on the Salt Fork in the area north of Jayton as the major sources of pollution.

The principal source, which contributes 30 percent of the lower-river salt, is the Dove Creek Salt Flat. This 400 acre flat is in reality a widening of an intermittent stream surrounded by high bluffs. Here seeps and springs flow pure brine, the subterranean source of which is found in shales and clays underlying the thick gypsum beds of the Peacock formation in these counties.

The brine is surfaced by artesian pressure in quantities that slightly exceed the evaporation rate, and then flows slowly into the Brazos.

In two other flats, the Upper Croton Creek Flat and the Short Croton Creek Flat, the artesian pressure is less than the evaporation rate, and the brine leaves deposits of almost pure salt. In some cases it is pure enough for table use. These deposits are quickly dissolved during a heavy rain and are washed downstream. The distance they are carried depends on how heavy the water runs off during showers, and as a result, the salt has been redeposited in varying quantities up and down the entire tributary.

Tests made at the mouths of other tributaries in the same area indicate minor salt contributions. There was no evidence of contamination as a result of oil field operations in the area, as had been suspected. The water from wells is evaporated in pits (Continued on Page 2)

and no discharge or washing into streams was observed, although Dr. Blank pointed out some might exist in remote fields he did not visit.

The direct flows and washes of salt in the flats, together with washes of downstream deposits and minor flows from other tributaries, account for about 60 percent of all the salt found in the river at Richmond, Texas, in tests conducted by the U. S. Geological Survey.

### Water Usually Usable

The Geological Survey has reported that the overall average of chlorides (which are the elements in salt harmful to vegetation) was less than 100 parts per million from 1946 through 1952. Water that contains as high as 788 parts of chlorides per million is tolerable to the growth of rice at stages when irrigation is normally needed, according to studies of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

However, for various brief periods at different times, Brazos River water has contained chlorides as high as 400 to 500 parts per million. At its highest peak in September, 1951, the Geological Survey reports, chlorides in the water at Richmond reached 538 parts per million. Thus, it is the occasional peaks of salt pollution that are the real problems, and

the B. R. A.'s program to control salt is aimed at reducing the peaks.

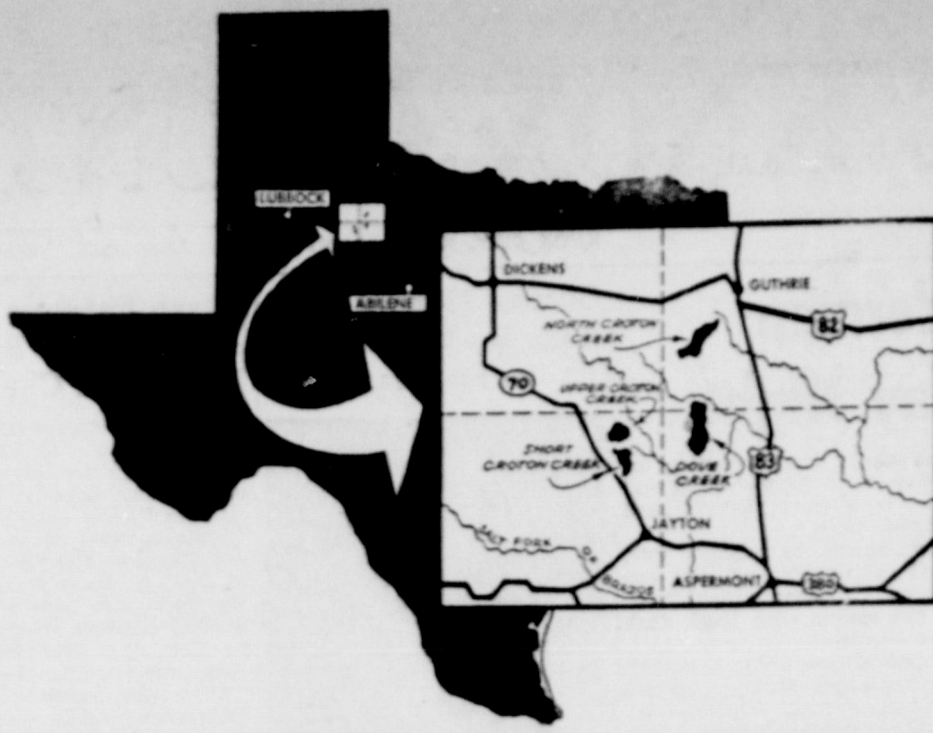
### Plans for Control Outlined

The Authority feels that, from the evidence revealed by Dr. Blank's study, the findings of its own engineers and results of studies made by the U.S.G.S. and the State Board of Water Engineers, it now has sufficient data to undertake counter-measures in reducing salt pollution.

The initial step of the proposed program is to be the construction of a small dam below the Dove Creek Salt Flat. This would be a low earthen dam with a concrete "grout curtain" imbedded deeply below the underflowing bed of the creek. It is felt that this dam will contain all the subterranean and surface flowings of brine and spread them into a lake for quick surface evaporation. B.R.A. engineers further point out that, not only will the flows be contained, but the actual pressure of the water contained will appreciably, if not completely, equalize the artesian of the brine seeps and brine springs, thus stopping the flow. It is hoped that this project will reduce the salt in the lower river by 30 percent, and if successful, could be easily applied to the other tributaries.

### Part of Long-Range Project

The control of salt pollution is

part of a long-range project in the B.R.A.'s program that calls for building five new dams on the river, between Whitney and Possum Kingdom Dams, and raising the level of Possum Kingdom reservoir fifteen feet. The next phase in the Authority's master program contemplates construction of additional reservoirs upstream from the Clear Fork, Salt Fork and Double Mountain tributaries, as well as development, possibly in conjunction with the Federal government, of the major tributaries entering the Brazos below Whitney Dam.

The overall program is intended to assure a constant, reliable supply of water for agriculture, industries and communities in the Brazos Valley. Of its total cost of \$181 to \$185 millions, the program allows \$7,500,000 for work to control salt pollution.

(Continued from Page 1)

They include amendments to speed up court procedure and to build a state office building. The latter will be started soon and will save the State hundreds of dollars in office rent each year.

Often called "Cotton George," Senator Moffett has vigorously championed efforts to broaden markets for farm and livestock products—especially cotton. He maintains that finding broader markets for farm and ranch products is the best long-range solution of the farm surplus problem.

Senator Moffett has shown strong interest in matters affecting his district, as well as those of statewide importance, including oil development, the schools, and war veterans. He is the author of the County Veterans Service Officer Law and other measures for veterans. He is regarded as being an independent thinker who votes his honest convictions upon legislative matters.

"I regard public office as a public trust, to be filled in the public interest," stated Senator Moffett. "I have never been offered a fee during my service in the legislature. I pay my own campaign expenses."

"I favor, and have voted for, bills requiring members of the Legislature to register the names of companies or persons from whom they receive fees. The people are entitled to such information."

"The last Legislature did the best job of tightening Texas insurance laws that has been done in fifty years. Fourteen hundred insurance companies were attempting to do business in Texas—almost as many as in the other 47 states. I voted for all the bills which closed the loopholes in our insurance laws, and if further strengthening is needed, I will support bills to do so."

"Our state hospital system needs more buildings to relieve badly overcrowded conditions. The system also needs to secure more nurses and doctors, and to increase the very low salaries of present employees."

"I expect to discuss other issues during the campaign."

"I have always voted a straight Democratic ticket, and will appreciate your vote and support in the Democratic primary. Thank you."
