## KCHS Band Wins Sweepstakes First Time Since 1967

## Angle and Baker Re-Elected Unusually Large Turnout Noted In City Election

Two contested races in the city election Saturday, one for the office of mayor and one for a one-year term on the council probably were responsible for possibly the largest voter turnout in the city's history.

Re-elected as mayor was Buddy Angle, who is beginning his sixth consecutive term. He polled 218 votes to Glen Humley's 108.

Incumbent councilman Bobby Baker, running for a one-year term on the council, had 183

votes. His opponent, Phil Dudney, had 174.

Running unopposed for the two year terms on the council were incumbent Carl Shelton and A. P. Denton.

Holdover council members are Lynn Worley and Celso Gonzales.

In the school trustee election, Jerry Benson and Henry J. Jones were unopposed.

Henry J. Jones was also unopposed in his re-election to the Knox County Hospital District Board, as was incumbent Clifford Cornett in his re-election as county school trustee for Knox County Precinct One.

Largest Sales Tax Check Is Received  
The City of Knox City has received the largest check from the state as its share of sales tax since the one-cent levy was assessed, according to City Secretary Faye Railsback.

Current check for \$4,941.31 was received March 28 for the quarter ending December 31, 1972. For the same quarter the previous year the check was \$4,142.46.

Total sales tax checks for 1972 were in the amount of \$17,607.63.

The School and City elections were held Saturday April 7 and they both report a very good turnout. There was 65 persons that voted in the school trustee election, which is very unusual, and the City had 40 people to turn out for their election. This is very very unusual for the City as last year there was only 13 that voted. In the school trustee race Alex Gohsey had 54; Ivan Rowan, 31; Johnny Reid, 19. Those receiving write-in votes were Ann Underwood, James Manning and Coy Hewitt. There were two trustees elected.

In the mayor's race A. A. Cox received 28 and L. A. Casey had 12. The councilmen were James Manning, 28; Demp Emerson, 26; Buster Hodges, 24; Johnny Reid, 15; and Juan Garcia, 10. There were three councilmen elected.

The City voted on the Local one-percent (1) sales tax and it carried 31-6. The City is hoping this will help out in repairing some of the streets and different repairs that need very much to be done.

COURTS SPEAK—Persons who have sexual relations with wives or husbands of others can be sued for damages, the State Supreme Court held.

The High Court turned down an appeal of a Dallas lawyer who lost his license after a jury found he asked a client for \$500 more than his legal fee, allegedly to prosecute an assistant district attorney.

The Supreme Court set a hearing April 25 over whether Austin could sell 32 acres of park land to a school district without an approving vote of local residents.

The Court of Criminal Appeals overturned convictions for sale of heroin (an 1,800 year sentence from Ector County) and possession of marijuana (25 years sentence from Tarrant County) due to judicial error.



about 35 percent which was an ACS high. These vital research projects and all ACS activities are financed by contributions from the American people during the ACS annual Crusade beginning April 1, and from bequests and legacies," Mrs. Feemster declared.

Public education programs received about 16 percent or \$11.3-million. "Here the emphasis is on impressing upon the American people the necessity of periodic health checkups to discover cancer at its earliest and most curable stage," said Mrs. Feemster, "as well as informing them about cancer's seven warning signals."

Another 10 percent or seven million dollars is devoted to professional education. These programs provide physicians, dentists, nurses and other medical personnel with information of the latest methods of detection and treatment of cancer.

"Patient and community service," Mrs. Feemster said, "received about 18 percent of nearly \$13-million for easing the heavy burden cancer imposes on its patients and their families."

Another 21 percent, or some \$15-million, supported fundraising and management of the Society's activities.

To date, the ACS has made more than 8,000 grants for research projects and personnel. "Many of the nation's major cancer research programs at the major cancer centers were developed with the aid of these grants," Mrs. Feemster said. "There are now 22 eminent scientists holding lifetime ACE professorships in leading centers of learning and research throughout the country."

During its history, the ACS aided in supporting the development of procedures like the Pap test that has helped cut the death toll for uterine cancer in half in the past 25 years. Advances in drug treatment and radiation which is taking Hodgkin's Disease out of the hopeless category were also aided by ACS funds.

"These figures show the use of the ACS dollar in each phase of the campaign to save lives, and carry forward the battle against cancer on different fronts," Mrs. Feemster said. "This combination of research, education, and service is produced by the money you give to the Cancer Crusade in this crucial war of the American people against one of the scourges of humankind. Remember, 'we want to wipe out cancer in your lifetime.'"

## Some SS Beneficiaries Need To Report Earnings

Many social security beneficiaries who worked in 1972 will need to file a report of earnings by April 16, according to Henry Chustz, manager of the Social Security Office in Vernon. "Most, but not all, of those people have received their report forms through the mail," Chustz said. "Those who did not should contact the Social Security Office in Vernon."

The "retirement test" for social security eligibility applies to most social security beneficiaries who received some payment, during the 1972 but who also worked and earned over \$1680 during the year. Exceptions are beneficiaries who were 72 years of age (or older) before last year, disabled workers, disabled widows and widowers, or disabled children.

Chustz stated that many people think that filing an income tax return is all they have to do. This will not work because tax returns are mailed to IRS instead of our office. We never see them. He also mentioned that many children, particularly students whose benefits terminated during 1972, went to work and earned over \$1680. These persons will need to file this report even though they no longer may be receiving payments.
