## Joe Reeder Jr. Sworn In District Judge Friday

Joe Reeder Jr. was sworn in as the 50th Judicial District Judge last Friday. The ceremony took place in the courtroom of the Knox County Courthouse in Bennington, Texas. Judge Lewis M. Williams presided at the bench while the Reeder family and other dignitaries paid tribute to his 31 years of service.

Reeder was sworn in as Judge Joe Arnold, juvenile court officer for Knox County, during the ceremony. He is the son of Judge Lewis M. Williams, who served on the bench while his father was in office. Reeder has been a district attorney in Bennington since 1946, taking over the office in January, 1947. When County Attorney Tom Bullington of Munday resigned to accept a position in the Attorney General's office in Austin, Reeder was named to fill his unexpired term, and at election time, Reeder ran unopposed.

Judge Reeder is a member of the State Bar Association, a member of the Bar Association of the 50th Judicial District, and formerly served on the Grievances Committee of the 13th District. He is also a member of the Masonic Lodge and an elder in the First Christian Church in Knox City. His wife is the former Maurine Davidson of Pine Bluff, Ark., whom he married in Little Rock on May 22, 1943. They are parents of two children, Mrs. Jinx Shaver of Rochester and Joe Reeder III, a senior student at Texas Christian University in Fort Worth. The Reeders have one grandson, R. A. Shaver IV, who will be three years old on December 26. Among associates and colleagues seated in the jury box for the ceremonies were 39th District Judge Ben C. Chapman of Haskell, his son, Charles Chapman, Dennis Ratliff, Bill Ratliff, and County Judge B. O. Roberson, all of Haskell; D. J. Brookreson II, Seth Cockrell, and Earl Garrison, all of Seymour; Clyde Boose and Mrs. Billie Montgomery, both of Munday, and Knox County Judge Sam E. Clonts of Knox City. Succeeding Reeder as county attorney is former Knox City resident Bobby D. Burnett, a spring graduate of the Texas Tech School of Law, who was sworn in Monday morning by Knox County Judge Sam Clonts.

According to Counts, the Chamber of Commerce has been interested in this move for some time, and the Women's Community Action League and also other women's groups will be asked for their support at next week's meetings, as further assurance that other door

Counts stressed that the help of men and women who have been active with other money raising drives is needed now to establish a United Fund that will cover all the areas now being supported by Knox City people's gifts. Counts said that although the first United Fund drive will not start until the fall of 1972, the organization should be completed by January 1 to enable the people who have been conducting separate drives to submit their budgets to the Admissions Board for the amount of money they would be entitled to through United Fund.

# Farm and Ranch News

PRUSSIC ACID A THREAT  
UNDER CERTAIN GRAZING  
CONDITIONS

Hybrid sorghum-sudan pastures, fast growing and excellent forage for livestock, can also be deadly during the fall grazing season.

The plant's own enzymes break down plant material and this results in prussic acid poisoning for animals which eat the forage, says Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The actual agent causing death is hydrogen cyanide.

Prussic acid poisoning generally occurs at two times. It is especially prevalent after a frost that has damaged plants. Also, poisoning occurs when plants perk up and begin fast growth after a very droughty period.

Hay that is improperly cured can also prevent prussic acid poisoning problems for a short time.

Hydrogen cyanide is very volatile and therefore stays in the plants for only a short time. But while it is present, animals must be kept off the pasture for a few days.

In severe cases, cows exhibiting symptoms when the veterinarian is called may be dead before he can arrive. He

will probably be able to save only those which are still breathing.

Farmers and ranchers should be on the lookout for nitrate poisoning that may occur during the late fall or winter pastures when there is a lot of cloudy weather.

Under these conditions, the plants, instead of growing and changing nitrates into proteins, just accumulate the nitrates. Animals must also be taken off these pastures until the plants have had a chance to grow and convert the nitrates to protein.

Armstrong stated that the blood of animals that have died from nitrate poisoning will be chocolate brown while those dying from prussic acid poisoning will be cherry red.

## PINK BOLLWORM ACTIVITY INCREASED

Pink bollworm larvae are now present in cotton fields in Knox County.

These larvae can be separated from boll weevil larvae which are also found in bolls by the presence of legs on the pink bollworm as a legless C-shaped white grub. The fall grown weevil grub is about 1-4 inch long while the fall grown pink bollworm is 1-2 inch long.

Considerable damage to later bolls has been caused by the

pink bollworm larvae in some fields. However, about 200,000 of these larvae overwintered in the soil in 1970. To prevent overwintering, fields should be harvested cleanly and completely to take as many pink bollworms as possible from the field to the gin. The larvae will be destroyed during the ginning process.

Piles of green bolls left in the field should be taken to the gin after these bolls have cured sufficiently. All bolls left in the field should be burned to hasten decomposition. Shredding of stalks and turning stubs under to a minimum depth of 4 inches will also aid in preventing pink bollworm larvae from overwintering.

Although no heavy infestation has been observed in the county, producers are reminded that store pink bollworm moths were trapped in Texas by October 7, that any year except 1969.

Further information on the pink bollworm is available at the County Agent's office.

## FALL WEED CONTROL

Fall is a good time to control such weeds as ragweeds, groundnuts, nightshades, ironweeds, coneflower and broomweed. Herbicides are effective in the fall when soil moisture is adequate and weeds are storing food in their root systems. Also, after crops have been harvested, there is little danger of damage from chemical drift. Effective herbicides include 2,4-D, 2,4-D-T, alvin, dicamba, picloram and mixtures of these.
