## Old School Building Damaged by Fire

A fire this morning damaged the old two-story brick building on the Knox City school grounds.

The fire was discovered about 9 a. m. by Mrs. Alton Fitzgerald. The building was filled with smoke, but according to firemen the blaze was apparently confined to a cloakroom in the east part of the building.

The building was being used only for storage of school equipment and for private music lessons by Mrs. E. Q. Warren and Mrs. Mabel Pyeatt.

According to George Davis, school custodian, all the school's athletic equipment was stored in the building, but he believed it was not damaged.

The school board has been planning to raze the building, and it is assumed the fire damage will not be repaired.

## Contractor Says Paving May Total Fifty Blocks

### Stores to Close Monday, July 4th

You can buy gasoline to get to the Stamford Rodeo, you can buy coffee to "get up on" Tuesday morning, and you can buy International Harvester parts, but that is about all you will be able to get in Knox City Monday, July 4th.

In a survey conducted Wednesday afternoon by Rip Collins, secretary of the Board of Commerce, almost all business men said they will be closed for the Fourth of July holiday.

Questioned in the survey were grocery stores, drug stores, tailor shops, hardware stores, service stations, cafes and garages.

The windows at the postoffice will be closed all day and no delivery will be made on the rural routes. Drug stores will be open Monday morning until daily papers are picked up or until 9 or 9:30 a. m.

The Knox City Clinic will be closed except for emergencies, and the bank will be closed from Saturday until Tuesday morning.

Present indications are that as many as fifty blocks of Knox City residential streets may be paved, Bill Ross of Pecos Valley Construction Co. said this morning.

The fifty-block estimate is exclusive of eight blocks on Main and three blocks on Central, where the present paving will be widened to 65 feet by the State Highway Department. Pecos Valley is now running the curb and gutter on Main, and the Highway Department will probably be ready to shoot asphalt within a few days.

There are still a few "hold outs" holding up paving of entire blocks, Ross said, but in general the project is going well and much has been accomplished in the past ten days without rain. Eighteen blocks have been curbed, and 25 blocks are ready for paving.

A screening plant will be moved in right after July 4, and the company will probably begin shooting asphalt by mid-July.

Tentative plans have been made to make a 65-foot street of the alley in front of the school, the contractor said. Plans are for the city to pave the 18-foot alley, and for the school district to pave 47 feet of school property.

## BENJAMIN CADET ATTENDING OFFICERS' TRAINING CAMP

Cadet Harry R. Cox, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Cox, who live near Benjamin, is one of 1100 Army ROTC cadets who arrived here June 27 to begin a six-weeks Artillery Reserve Officer's Training Corps summer camp at the Artillery Center of the World.

Cox, a graduate of Benjamin High School, is now attending Texas A. & M. College.

The six weeks field training is conducted at the completion of the students' junior year, and forms an essential part of an extensive four year college course in Military Science leading to a commission as a Second Lieutenant in the artillery branch of the United States Army Reserve.

During the six weeks period the cadets will undergo intensive field training, during which they will apply theory and techniques learned in the classroom. This practical training will be conducted under simulated combat conditions.

Use of radio, wire and visual communication will be stressed, as well as the operation of army motor transportation.

The cadets will observe the effect of all types of weapons including the atomic cannon.

The cadets will be housed in army tents, wear army uniforms, eat army food, receive army pay, in short, are in the army for six weeks.

## Club to Sponsor Safety Appeal

Mrs. C. G. Markward, president of the 1946 Study Club, which is affiliated with the Texas Federation and General Federation of Women's Clubs, has announced that members of the club will join members of the national organization in a series of chain telephone calls to appeal to Fourth-of-July holiday travelers to exercise care and courtesy in driving as a measure to prevent the disastrous toll of deaths from highway traffic.

Plans are for the calls in Knox City to be placed on Friday, July 1, Mrs. Markward said.

"In 1954 there were 348 deaths during the July Fourth holiday," she pointed out, "with ten times that many injured. Your call may be the means of preventing the dread long distance call reporting tragedy and heartbreak."

**USE OF COMMON SENSE WILL PREVENT DROWNINGS**

AUSTIN. — There were 397 drownings in Texas last year, according to figures released by the Texas State Department of Health. Over half of these deaths were among those under 25 years of age. Drownings dropped sharply after age 45, but occurred in each age bracket up to 90 years.

Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health, stated that most of these deaths could have been prevented if sensible precautions had been taken. This is the season of the year when many of us like to take to the water for a cool swim, for week-end boating or fishing trips. These are all healthful forms of recreation, if you follow common sense rules, don't get cocky about your ability in the water and don't take chances.

The safest place to swim is the municipal pool where a life guard is on duty. The water is treated to kill disease germs and is kept fresh by a continuous change of water. Also there is no danger of

wading into unexpected deep holes such as there is in ponds, lakes and rivers.

If you go boating and do not know how to swim always take along a life preserver. See that each child is so equipped. Be careful not to overload the boat. Standing up or changing seats in a small boat is dangerous. If you should capsize, stay with the boat.

Watch children carefully while they play around small pools or even buckets of water. Small children often drown in stock tanks, fish pools, ditches and drainage canals. They even drown in bath tubs, because thoughtless mothers leave them there to play without supervision.

Consciously practice safety precautions and soon avoiding accident hazards will become second nature to you. Swimming, boating and fishing are healthful exercise if you do them safely.

**"For the Remission of Sins"**

"Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" (Acts 2:38).

Primarily the reason that many do not understand the purpose of baptism is not that they cannot but that they do not desire to understand. The Bible teaching is plain, but men not satisfied with it have earnestly prepared the best arguments they could to show why we should not accept what the scriptures teach. Such arguments and evasions have been eagerly accepted by those to whom the Bible teaching is distasteful.

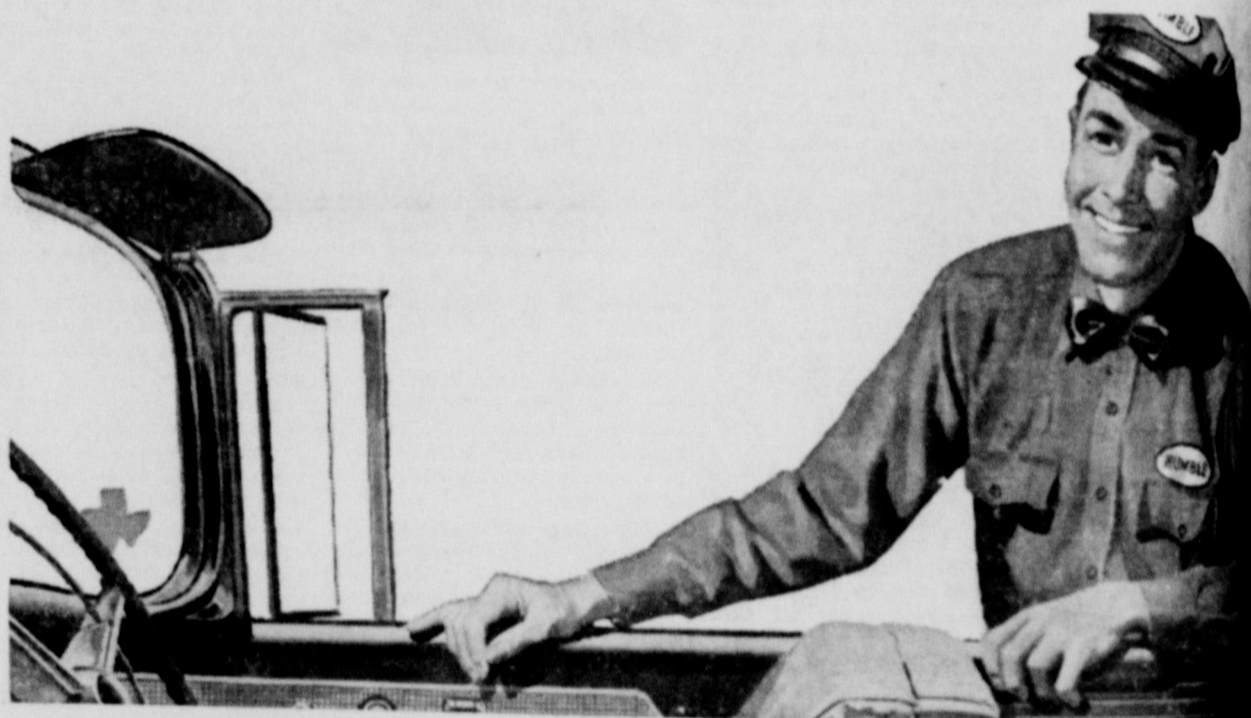
The Bible is so plain that the honest Bible student will find it easy to believe in the necessity of being baptized in order to secure the remission of his sins. In the text of our text baptism obviously stands between the sinner and the remission of sins. It is futile to argue that God put it in the wrong place.

Equally plain is Acts 22:16, "Arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord." Saul, after believing and praying, was yet in his sins. This passage shows a unique relationship between baptism and remission of sins that cannot be explained away. The discussions concerning this verse and the denials of it will fade into oblivion, but the teaching will yet be there.

1 Peter 3:21 teaches "The like figure whereunto even baptism doth also now save us." Whatever else might be said, if baptism is not related to a man's salvation, were the two so closely connected in this verse? Stripped of modifiers the verse teaches "Baptism doth save us." A man cannot teach "Baptism does not save us" and be preaching the same gospel Peter preached.

It is so much easier just to believe what God said than it is to evade the issue, argue against plain teaching, and defend human doctrine.

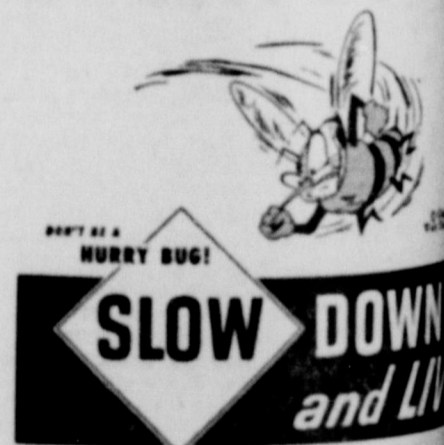

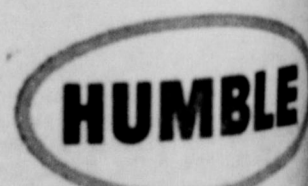

### Aerial Farming" sed Extensively

Agricultural aviation, which has been used a great deal by Knox county farmers for insect control, is coming a long way since the first experimental application of insecticide from an airplane in 1919. One cultivated acre out of every 10 is now treated by aircraft with insect spray, fertilizer, or other kinds of agricultural chemicals, according to Civil Aeronautics Administration. Aerial crop control is done in every state on more than 100 different crops. Private aerial applicator firms are operating more than 7,000 aircraft and spend annually 644,000,000 lbs. of dust-type chemicals and 80,000,000 gallons of liquid sprays. Aerial crop control, weed control and fertilizing add an estimated \$3 million to annual farm income. Despite the tremendous growth

in agricultural aviation, only recently have airplanes been specifically designed for this purpose. The Ag-3, the second agricultural plane designed and built for spraying, dusting, fertilizing and seeding by Fred E. Weick, internationally known aircraft designer and engineer at Texas A. & M. College, is now undergoing flight tests. The small 135 h.p. plane was built with emphasis on low speed, high maneuverability and pilot safety. Airplane spraying with new insecticides, particularly DDT, has provided the first practical means for controlling epidemic outbreaks of destructive insects in forests. During the past eight years, over 5 million acres of forest land have been successfully treated from the air, and control costs reduced from \$3 to approximately \$1 an acre. In Knox County most agricultural work has been done with Stearman—sturdy primary training planes—converted for agricultural purposes. But all types of

aircraft, including blimps, helicopters and bombers, have been used in various areas for different types of "aerial farming."

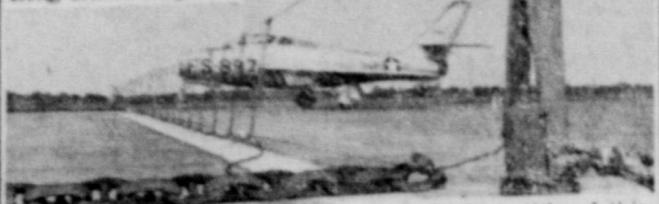

#### 165,000 TEXAS BOYS PARTICIPATE IN SCOUTING

Scouting in Texas has been expanding rapidly until there are now 165,000 youngsters enjoying the wholesome benefits of the program. And continuation of this rapid expansion will require additional funds next year.

That's what Gov. Allan Shivers said through his personal representative Jack Dillard, at a meeting of the Scouts' State Steering Committee in Austin Wednesday. Gov. Shivers had planned to address the meeting but was called to New York on business.

Purpose of the meeting was to hear progress reports and to crystallize plans for the Boy Scouts' annual one-day drive for funds, October 25. This drive takes place in areas where the Scouts do not participate in the Community Chest or United Fund.

"Even though we have a great number of youngsters affiliated with the movement, we will need to expand our efforts so that every boy in Texas wanting to be a Scout will be able to do so. There are now 772,950 youngsters in Texas outside of Scouting and thousands upon thousands of these boys will

become Scouts when the opportunity is provided.

"Our churches, schools and other youth-building institutions are all eager to use the program but they need our help in the organization of local units. Camping facilities must be greatly enlarged to provide outdoor experiences every boy craves. This, together with the need for stepping up the entire program, will cost additional money. We must raise this additional money by working harder in our campaign for funds," Gov. Shivers said through Mr. Dillard.

More than 100 Scout Officials and volunteer workers from all over Texas attended the meeting.

#### SPECIALIST ADVISES REST FOR PASTURES AFTER RAIN

**COLLEGE STATION**—Rest after a rain is the best prescription for droughty, overgrazed pastures. Since many ranches are carrying reduced numbers of livestock, producers should be able to defer one-fourth of their grazing lands without damaging the remainder, A. H. Walker, extension range specialist, says. This way many pastures can gain full advantage of recent soaking rains.

Pastures with most native grasses and vegetative cover will make the most recovery in a shorter period of time and should be deferred first, says Walker. Poorer pastures can be rested later since they may require several years to recover.

It's better to remove all livestock from a pasture than to leave it lightly stocked, he adds.

Defer for three to six months, or until frost. But if the grazing is needed sooner, wait at least until the growing grasses mature and drop a seed crop. Deferring promotes seed and plant reproduction in addition to increasing the vigor of existing plants.

The specialist recommends moderately grazing the pasture during the winter. This method provides some forage for livestock and helps distribute plant seed.

Many ranchmen looking over their bare ranges are considering

reseeding. In some instances reseeding may be warranted but deferment more often does the job cheaper. If as much as 15 percent of the "key" grasses are left, rest rather than reseed, the specialist suggests.

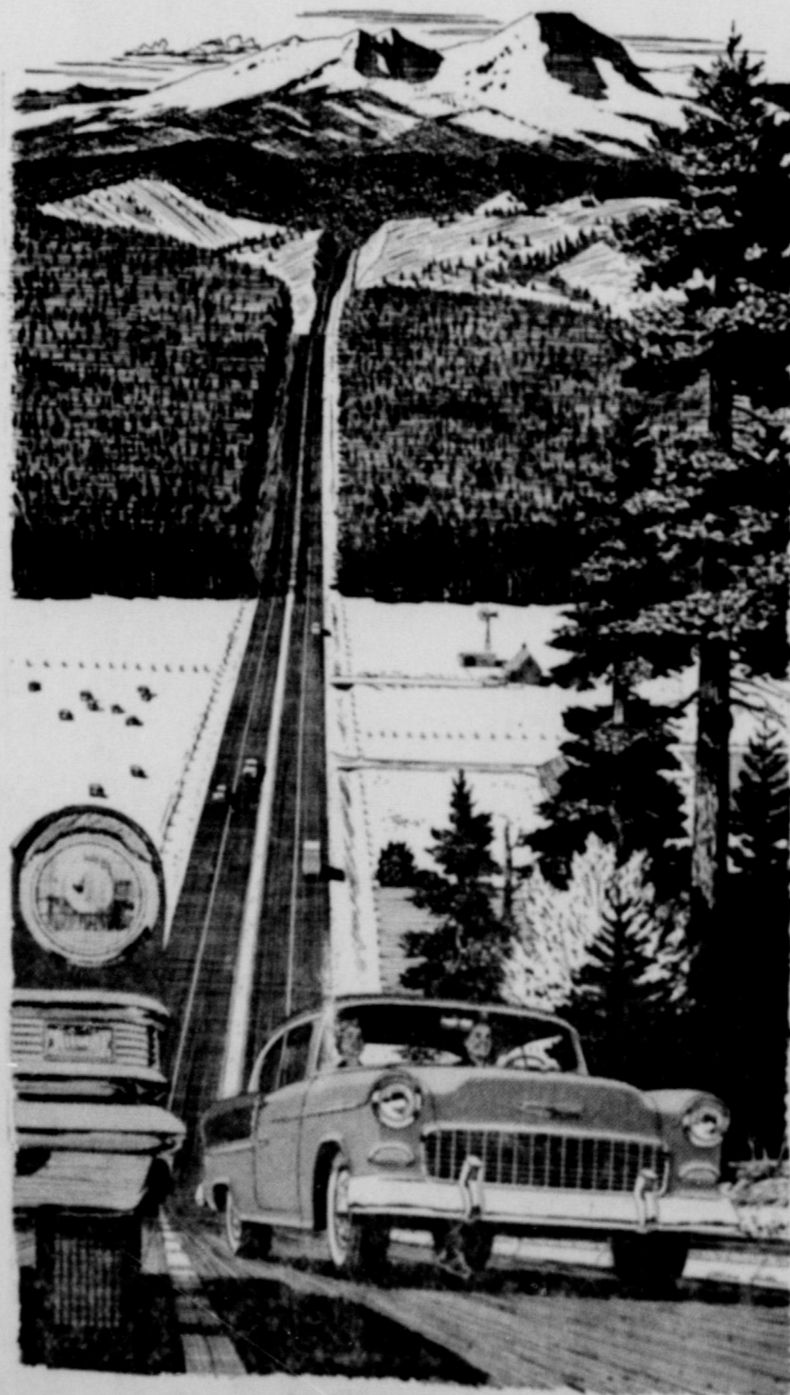
