THE ELECTION

Saturday, voters of Texas went to the polls and made their selection for state and county officers for the next two years. This election attracted more attention than any election since the days of Joe Bailey and Cone Johnson. W. Lee O'Daniel, who won the nomination in the first primary for governor, was the direct cause of this when be attempted to dictate whom the people of Texas should support for six state offices. Thousands of his supporters over the state resented his action and voted contrary to his suggestion. In Knox County in the first primary O'Daniel almost had a majority over all his eleven opponents, but in the last election the voters turned him downand defeated every candidate he recommended. We heard several hundred people say that they would not support the hand picked crowd, notwithstanding they were probably better men than the opposition.

The defeat of Walter Woodul for attorney general by Gerald Mann and the defeat of the veteran C. V. Terrell is evidence that the people of the state were not paying much attention to the governor-elect. There will be plenty of trouble in the next session of the legislature which meets in January, as there are only eight new members in the senate, and the people have not forgotten the trouble Jimmie Allred had with that body last year. The election of Jerry Sadler to the Railroad Commission post will change things around, as Ernest O. Thompson and C. V. Terrell have been running the Commission for the past few years, paying no attention to Lon Smith, Smith and Sadler will now team up and turn the tables on Thompson, which means that the oil situation will be handled different than it has been in the past.

There are only about seventy-five members in the lower house, and no one can predict at this time just what that body will do in regard to the old age pensions. The voters of Texas want an old age pension, but there are more than one hundred different ideas as to how they should be paid, and the Herald is sure of one thing-that they will not be paid thirty dollars each per month, as promised by the governor-elect. We predicted two months ago that this would be a hard winter on the old folks and we see no reason to change our guess now.

The defeat of Congressman McFarlane by Ed Gossett was a surprise to many of the voters in this district, but you must remember that the President came down and gave McFarlane the nod and you see the result. Maury Maverick and Morgan Sanders of the 3rd District also met defeat, This is more evidence that the people of Texas do not like to be told how to vote.

BUZZARD MOUNTAINS

Their stand is that the volume is "mixed" in the studio control room to show the same high-point on their indicator for both the sound and music (of course they use more technical terms) and that's that. You might try writing the networks about it. They still listen to the voice of fan mail.



THE RESERVE OF THE PERSON NAMED IN DRIVE SAFELY LABOR DAY

Unless motorists follow safe driving rules during the Labor Day holiday period, September 3, 4 and 5, Texas streets and highways will be marked with the mangled bodies of 17 victims of traffic accidents, state police warned today.

Using last year's Labor Day death figures as a guide, state safety officials predicted that at least 26 persons will lose their lives in Labor Day violence. In addition to 17 traffic deaths, five are expected to drown, two will be accidentally shot and two will die from

Traffic deaths last year rose to 21 in the three days of celcbration when thousands of vehicles carrying pleasure seekers jammed arterial highways.

In spite of precautions planned to forestell many tragic rashes, state police are foreasting that approximately 125 persons will be injured in accimaimed for life. State patroimen will guard all highway. closely, working double shifts with very little rest until the toliday period has passed hief Fred Hickman said. Spevial attention will be given to drinking drivers and those who violate the 45 mile-an-hour speed law, and weave in and out of traffic lines.

"Fast driving means death in collisions, when reasonable speeds would cause slight injuries," Chief Hickman admonshed, 'State officers will join with local police in preventing

as many casuaties as possible. Officials urged Texas people to guard against accidents in the homes, on huoting and fishing trips and while swimming and boating so that death tolls may be lowered.
