





Students Must Have Social Security Card For Vacation Work

With vacation time approach ing, more high school and colstudents will be seeking part-time and temporary em-ployment. Erton F. Tate. Disrict Manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security Office, stated that it is very important that such persons obtain social security cards before applying for work and that the names on their social security cards correspond with their present names-especially in the case of married women who have not had their names changed on their social security records Tate said nine out of ten jobs

are now covered by social security and in most cases this temporary employment will proty to the account of the worker, thereby building toward a retirement benefit upon reaching the ages of sixty-five. If these workers earn as much as \$50 during June, July, and August, they will acquire one quarter of coverage.







Possibilities for a good pecan crop were never better than at present, but in order to preserve this good possibility, it will be necessary to observe the trees very closely for signs of damage

from the pecan nut casebearer and apply the needed control measures when necessary. The casebearer strikes at the time when the ends of the small pecans turn brown, following pollination. The small, Greenishwhite eggs can be found attached to the nuts if the casebearer

is present. This is the proper time for applying DDT as a spray at the rate of 3 lbs. of 50% wettable powder per 100 gallons of water, sprayed liberally over the entire tree.
