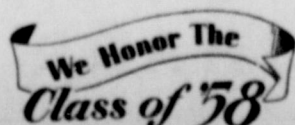

Students Must Have Social Security Card For Vacation Work

With vacation time approaching, more high school and college students will be seeking part-time and temporary employment. Erton F. Tate, District Manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security Office, stated that it is very important that such persons obtain social security cards before applying for work and that the names on their social security cards correspond with their present names—especially in the case of married women who have not had their names changed on their social security records.

Tate said nine out of ten jobs are now covered by social security and in most cases this temporary employment will provide a quarter of social security to the account of the worker, thereby building toward a retirement benefit upon reaching the ages of sixty-five. If these workers earn as much as \$50 during June, July, and August, they will acquire one quarter of coverage.

Tate went on to say that these workers and the employers have important responsibilities in seeing that the worker's wages are reported correctly for social security, and the only way this can be done is for the worker to have his correct social security card when he begins working.

Highlights From State Capital

AUSTIN, TEXAS. — At least one segment of Texas economy — highway constructing — is booming. One reason: the Texas Highway Department isn't letting grass grow under its feet in getting federal emergency projects under way.

Low bids tabulated at the Department's May letting totaled \$19,187,933. State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer, in opening the May letting, said that about \$25,000,000 in road projects would be up for bids next month.

This figure, if reached, would set a new record.

A big chunk of this upsurge comes from Texas' \$36,000,000 share of the Federal Emergency Fund, authorized by Congress this year to get extra money into the economy fast and provide needed roads. All of this work must be put under contract by December.

Texas Highway officials hope to beat the deadline by several months. Greer announced that \$8,000,000 of the May lettings represented the first of the extra federal projects. He noted with quiet pride "the speed with which the projects were made ready." Bids were taken just four weeks after the federal bill was signed. Department officials expect all the \$36,000,000 to be under contract by the end of the summer—bringing record or near-record lettings for the next few months.

A short time back monthly highway lettings of \$9,000,000 to \$12,000,000 were about average. Time was, too, when the emphasis was mainly on the need for fine, new roads to accommodate the growing stream of fine, new cars. Today, there's also emphasis on the number of people who'll be put to work, the money they'll spend on groceries, cars, and clothes.

HIGH TENSION — With millions involved, the highway lettings are scenes of high tension. Sunburned, sport shirted contractors, plus materials men and insurers flock to the Department's hearing room where the sealed bids are opened and read, item by item.

Department personnel have an electronic computer to add up the item bids and determine the low bidder. Results are announced later in the day. But contractors or their representatives take down the bids on the spot and make rapid calculations.

It isn't hard to spot the man who's just realized he missed a million-dollar job by bidding a few hundred dollars high. Typical muttered comment: "He can't do it for the money!"

Questions About Proposed Lake

(Continued from Page 1)

very short time.
 McMahon read a list of questions and answers from a brochure that will be mailed to voters in the district next week. The questions and answers, in part, were as follows:
Q What is North-Central Texas Municipal Water Authority?
A A separate governmental unit (like your city) for the purpose of producing and distributing water to the member cities. The Authority was established by Special Law, H. B. 494.
Q What is the adequacy of the water supply?
A The engineers estimate that in the year 2,000 A. D. — with twice our present estimated population of 16,625 — and after a seven year growth — we will have a one year supply of water twice our normal consumption.
Q Will the water be of good enough quality to taste good, eliminate excessive damage to plumbing, air conditioning units and not

require excessive amounts of soap and detergents?
A Yes. The quality should be as good as, or better than, Paint Creek water, Stamford Lake?
Q What is the estimated cost of the completed project?
A \$6,550,000. This is for the system, financed and in operation.
Q Who will run the Authority?
A The Authority will be run by a Board of Directors composed of two members appointed by the City Council of each member city.
Q Will the Directors be paid a salary?
A No. Directors may be paid, not exceeding \$40.00 in any month, for attending Directors' Meetings, and for expenses for looking after Authority business if authorized by the Board.
Q Will any property outside the boundaries of an incorporated member city be included in the Authority?
A No.
Q How will we pay for construction cost?
A Vote and sell bonds.
Q What will each city pay for treated and filtered water delivered in each city's overhead storage tank?
A 30c per thousand gallons, thus each city will be relieved of all water production cost and pumping expense into overhead storage.

Q Will sale of water by the Authority pay its operating expenses and retire the bonds?
A No. About 75% of such cost will be paid from sale of water.
Q Will the Water Authority levy an ad valorem tax?
A Yes. 1959-1965, you will pay the Authority about the same amount of money you paid your city in 1957, give or take a little. After 1965, taxes begin in a yearly decrease, and are eliminated after 1989. After settlement of bonds, water rates are subject to a major reduction.
Q How will taxable values and tax collections be handled?
A The Directors will appoint a tax assessor to equalize all taxable property values throughout the Authority. Your Equalization Board will be composed of one representative from each member city and you will probably pay your taxes at your own city hall.
Q What is our voting procedure?
A (1) June 17th election is to confirm your city as a member of the Authority. (2) At a later date each city will vote — in its own separate election:
A To approve issuance of the bonds, and
B To approve a water purchase contract.
Q What happens if one or more cities defeat any of the above three propositions?
A That city will automatically be out of the Authority and will have to look elsewhere for its future supply of water. Costs are too great for the member cities to build sufficient capacity for a town that may want to come into the Authority at some future date. The engineers will revise the system to accommodate a smaller number of member cities.
Q What are the qualifications to vote?
A (1) Confirmation election June 17, 1958; If you are qualified to vote for your City Councilman, you can vote in the confirmation election.
(2) Bond and Water Contract election; In these elections you will have the qualifications under (1) above plus taxable property on your city tax roll.
 A copy of the Engineer's Report, Our Special Water Authority Law and a Financing Study is on file with you City Secretary.

Farm and Ranch Notes

By Roy England, County Agent

Possibilities for a good pecan crop were never better than at present, but in order to preserve this good possibility, it will be necessary to observe the trees very closely for signs of damage from the pecan nut casebearer and apply the needed control measures when necessary. The casebearer strikes at the time when the ends of the small pecans turn brown, following pollination. The small, Greenish-white eggs can be found attached to the nuts if the casebearer is present. This is the proper time for applying DDT as a spray at the rate of 3 lbs. of 50% wettable powder per 100 gallons of water, sprayed liberally over the entire tree.

Weeds have become quite a problem in pastures over the county, and one of the most economical methods of eradicating them and aiding the recovery of our native grasses is through the use of sheep in the grazing problem.

Sheep will graze practically every type of weed found in this section when they are in a young tender stage, and will very effectively control them when properly stocked. Sheep also have the advantage of returning a dual dividend in the form of both wool and a lamb crop.

TAKES PART IN NTSC TRAINING PROGRAM

DENTON. — Student teachers from North Texas State College are working in 25 cities in this area this semester as part of their preparation for teaching careers.

Dr. C. M. Clarke, director of teacher education, reported that 328 NTSC students are enrolled in the School of Education program. Most of them are assigned to cooperating public schools in Denton, Dallas, and Tarrant Counties.

Under the guidance of the classroom teacher and a college supervisor, the students assist in planning and carrying out the regular instruction program as a part of their work toward earning teaching certificates.

Among those enrolled in the program is Harriet Jean Spenny, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Perry C. Spenny of Knox City. She has been teaching eighth grade speech at Denton Junior High School.

Auto Dealers Start Plan to Eliminate Car Hub Cap Theft

A statewide drive to halt the theft of automobile hub caps has been inaugurated by the authorized new car dealers of Texas.

Public service awards from the Texas Automotive Dealers Association, the state organization of factory authorized new car dealers, have been given dealers participating in the program for agreeing to inscribe the serial number of new automobiles on each of its hub caps.

This public service effort, done by the dealer without cost to the new car purchaser, will help assure the buyer that his hub caps will not be stolen and should save motorists thousands of dollars a year by drastically reducing the number of automobile accessory thefts, officials of the new car dealers association believe.

Dealers who have joined in this statewide campaign include Stephens Brothers Chevrolet Co. of Knox City.

This plan to remove a primary temptation to steal is advocated by police authorities as a real help to the automobile owner and to police in eliminating automobile accessory theft. Records show that 95 percent of hub cap stealing is attributed to youths. When they are successful in this theft, they sometimes move up to more serious theft.

The simple device of engraving an automobile's serial num-

ber on each hub cap makes easily identifiable as to a particular car and no question that they will be replaced if they turn up on other than on the proper mobile.

TADA President J. White, Houston, who announced this plan to the TADA Directors, pointed out that loss in one metropolitan area from hub cap theft is estimated to be \$15,000 a month. He served that automobile accessory rates are bound to rise unless this theft loss is to a halt.
