#### Brother of Local **Boys Receives** Medal Posthumously

Word was received here recently that 2nd Lieutenant Austin C. Jenson of Coolidge, brother of Rob and Bob Jenson of Knox City, had been posthumously awarded the Navy Cross, highest award given by the Navv.

The citation notes that on November 29, 1950, near Yudam-Ni, Korea, Lt. Jenson sacrificed himself for his men. His platoon was pinned by small arms fire and Lt. Jenson stood upright, firing at the enemy to draw hostile fire while his platoon moved to a key position and later drove off the enemy. He was fatally wounded.






