Tax Equalization Board Named for School District

A board of equalization was named at the regular meeting of the Knox City school board Tuesday night.

Appointed were Claud Richardson, C. C. Hoge and Roy Smith, with Claud E. Reed as alternate. The final hearing of the board of equalization was set for July 27 at 9 a. m.

The trustees authorized Supt. Chas. E. Silk to serve as a representative of the board with power to assign all instruments and take other actions necessary to participate in the national school lunchroom program. Board members voted to send Mrs. Chas. E. Silk, supervisor of the school cafeteria, and Mrs. Pete Knight and Mrs. L. V. Worley, lunchroom personnel, to a summer lunchroom workshop to be held in Lubbock July 9-13.

Supt. Silk was instructed by the board to ascertain furniture and equipment needs and to make plans for a furniture showing and bidding to be held at the school.

The superintendent was also authorized to prepare a financial statement of the various operating accounts of the school district, as of June 1, and to make a report to the board and submit the statement to the Knox County Herald for proper publication.

Other business transacted included the approval of all current bills.

M System Operators To Ask for New Trial in Food Price Suit

A jury found in favor of the plaintiffs Tuesday in a suit filed by G. M. Speck and J. M. Stockton, Rochester groceryman, against O. W. Causey and J. M. Edwards, operators of Edwards M System store here.

Causey and Edwards have announced that they are filing a motion for a new trial on the grounds that the evidence was insufficient to support the findings of the jury.

The plaintiffs alleged that last November Causey, as manager of the Knox City store, advertised Crisco shortening below cost, and that they were refused when they attempted to buy the store's entire stock. They asked for an injunction under a new state law concerning the limitation of sales.

The case was tried in 50th Judicial District Court Monday and Tuesday, with Judge Lewis M. Williams presiding. The jury was composed of 10 men, including two Negroes and one Latin American, and two women. They were Joe Warren, Guy Bradley, Claud Reed, Joe Rios, E. H. Nelson, A. L. Roder, Burton Thomas, Marcelus Johnson, Mrs. Joe Lane, Boyd Meers, L. D. Welch and Mrs. Helen Myers.

The plaintiffs were represented by Royce Atkins and Dale Condon of Haskell. Judson Balch of Seymour was attorney for the defendants.

Knox County Democrats Back Senator Johnson

Knox County Democrats decided to "shake shivers" at the party conventions Saturday and Tuesday, and got solidly behind Senator Lyndon B. Johnson in his bid for control of the state delegation to the national convention.

Elected delegates to the state convention, which will be held in Dallas May 22, were Leroy Melton of Benjamin, C. R. Elliott of Munday and B. B. Campbell of Knox City, all avowed Johnson supporters.

The delegation is instructed to vote as a unit, and to support Johnson as leader of the state delegation and as favorite son

candidate for president. All was harmony at the county convention Tuesday, it was reported, with no dissenting votes. The convention also passed a resolution commending Sam Rayburn.

Precinct Meetings
The precinct conventions Saturday, as well as the county convention, drew record-breaking crowds that overwhelmingly favored Senator Johnson.

Thirty-eight voters attended the convention in Precinct 9, where E. L. Park was elected chairman and Mrs. Bob Robertson secretary. Some Shivers sentiment was present but 32 voted for the resolutions favoring Johnson.

Named delegates to the county convention were Park, C. J. Reese, Abe Watson, J. H. McGee and L. C. Teague.

J. C. McGee was elected chairman of Precinct 9A, and Mrs. J. C. McGee was named secretary. Delegates to the county convention were McGee, R. B. Howell, B. B. Cochran and B. B. Campbell.

In addition to the resolutions for Johnson, the convention passed a resolution commending Sam Rayburn "for his long years of faithful service to the nation as a whole, to Texas in particular, and for his loyalty to the Democratic party." The resolution was later adopted at the county convention.

Other Precincts for Johnson

Johnson backers were also named at other precincts in the county. At Benjamin Collins Moorhouse was elected chairman and delegates to the county convention were Sam Leaverton, Leroy Melton, Billy Joe Sams and Buddy Bumpas.

The two Monday precincts named 10 delegates to the county convention, instructed to support Johnson. Delegates from Precinct 6 were E. H. Nelson, R. M. Myers, C. R. Elliott, Welton Leflar and Tuck Whitworth. Precinct 6A delegates were R. D. Atkinson, J. C. Harpham, Bruce Burnett and Russell Penick. A total of 38 persons attended both conventions.

Precinct 6 had a two to one margin for Johnson, while Precinct 6A was described as "nip and tuck."

Funeral Held for Local Man's Sister

Mrs. Clause, 68, died Thursday, May 3, at Orange, Texas. She suffered a stroke about 18 months ago and had been bedfast the past five weeks.

Cancer Crusade Quota Topped

In three hours and as many coffee breaks, Knox City's quota in the 1956 Cancer Crusade was over-subscribed by \$93.11, it was announced Tuesday by Dr. T. P. Frizzell, crusade chairman for Knox County.

Otis Harbert and E. R. Carpenter were the volunteer workers locally. They solicited contributions last Friday, beginning at 9 a. m., and topped the \$300 quota before noon.

Dr. Frizzell expressed his thanks to those who donated to the fund and to Harbert and Carpenter—"who will be in line for re-appointment next year for a job well done."

Other communities in the county had not reported to the chairman Wednesday.

Committee Studies Endowment Plan For Perpetual Cemetery Care

Members of the Knox City Cemetery Committee are investigating the possibility of starting an endowment fund to furnish perpetual care for the local cemetery.

At a recent meeting of the committee Judge Ben Charlie Chapman of Haskell explained the program that is being used in other area communities. Judge Chapman was instrumental in setting up the plan for the Haskell, Stamford and Rochester cemeteries.

He explained that it is a long-range plan, and it will be years before enough money accrues from the interest on bonds to fully maintain the cemetery, but he added that the sooner the program is started, the better.

The committee began investigating the endowment plan after learning that the tax proposal submitted to the county commissioners recently was unconstitutional. According to Attorney General John Ben Shepherd's office, no tax money can be spent on a cemetery unless the cemetery is owned and controlled by the county.

The committee announced that the city has purchased five acres of land adjoining the west side of the present cemetery, and the plans are to develop this plot under the endowment plan.

Joe Reeder Jr. was appointed to further investigate the endowment plan, and a report will be made to the public in the future.

Funds Needed Now

In the meantime, members of the committee say, funds are desperately needed to keep the cemetery in a presentable condition. "So far we have not had enough money to hire a caretaker," they said, "and unless more money is paid in soon, people will have to care for their own lots."

"It has been said that the civic pride of a town can be judged by the way its local cemetery is kept," one committee member added. "Let's not let ours look worse than our own premises."

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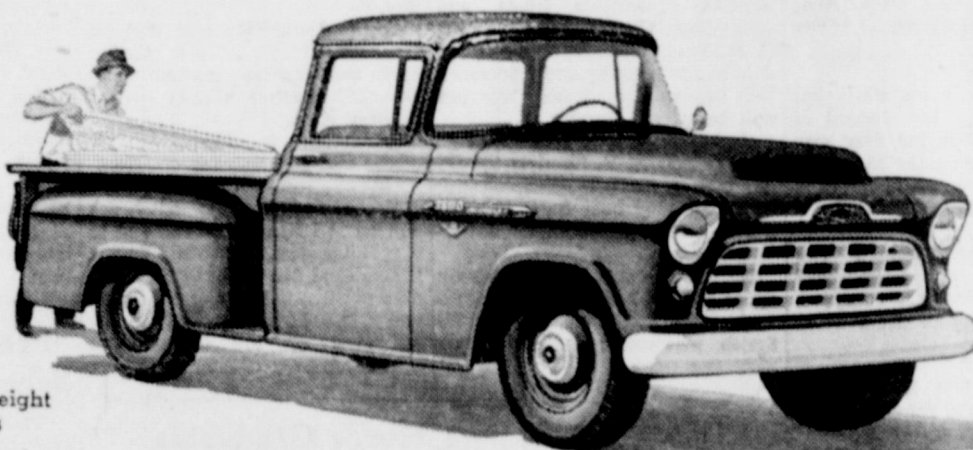

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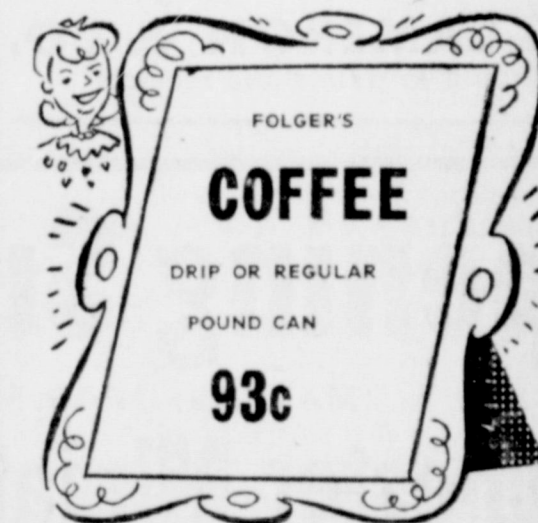

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1954 Farm Income Figures Released

The value of products sold in 1954 by operators of 837 farms in Knox County was \$6,422,457, according to a preliminary report of the 1954 Census of Agriculture published by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The value of all crops sold was \$5,506,416, including \$5,505,169 for field crops, \$830 for vegetables, and \$417 for fruits and nuts.

The value of all livestock and

livestock products sold was \$916,041, including \$2,544 for dairy products, \$41,387 for poultry and poultry products, and \$872,110 for livestock and livestock products.

Information on the value of farm products sold is presented for each county in a preliminary State report, copies of which may be purchased from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C., at 10 cents each.

Guide for Controlling Insects Available From County Agent

Cotton producers who apply insecticides at the proper time may expect an increase in yield of at least 100 pounds of seed cotton an acre for each treatment. This is a return of about \$6.00 for each dollar spent for insect control, according to F. M. Fuller, extension service entomologist.

As an aid for cotton farmers in their fight against insects, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has just released its 1956 Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects. It is L-218 and is available from the offices of local county agents.

Covered in the guide are suggestions on early and late season control and early stalk destruction and farm cleanup; timing of insecticide applications; seed treatment with systemic insecticides and general information on spraying and dusting.

Also listed are the insects that are best controlled by early season or late season programs along with the recommended amounts and/or mixtures of the various insecticides for both dusts and sprays are given along with timely suggestions on timing of applications and when to begin and stop the use of insecticides.

The guide was prepared under the direction of Fuller with the assistance of C. F. Garner, assistant extension entomologist and other members of the entomology department of the Texas A & M College System. All recommendations listed are based on the results of research work.

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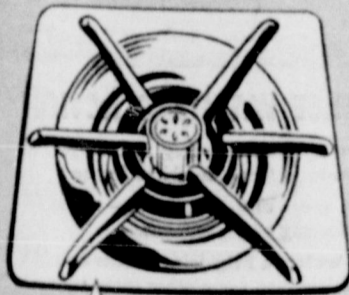

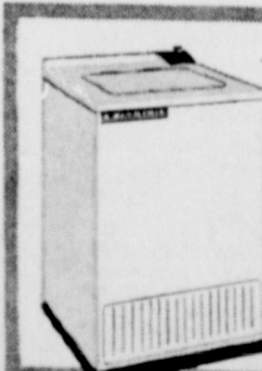

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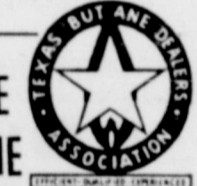

COTTON ADVISORY COUNCIL ASKS FOR MORE RESEARCH

Investigations of new chemical treatments, improved finishing materials and the possibility of modifying cotton fibers by means of nuclear-energy radiations to give cotton new versatility and improved textile properties have been urged by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Cotton Research Advisory Committee.

The committee, established under the Research and Marketing Act of 1946, is composed of 15 members representing every phase of the cotton industry.

Texans on the committee and attending the annual meeting recently include Roy B. Davis of Lubbock; Burris C. Jackson, Hillsboro, and Audrey L. Lockett of Vernon.

The group also asked for research on the irrigation of cotton grown in humid areas, improved weed control—both mechanical and chemical, better processing methods for cottonseed oil and meal, and other work to aid utilization and marketing of cotton and cottonseed and to reduce the cost of production.

Further work on methods for controlling the pink bollworm and an expanded program of basic and applied research in cotton breeding to improve fiber quality and increase production efficiency also were suggested.

Fiber research urged included determination of the economic need for improved bale wrappings; development of more practical and economical methods and equipment for automatic sampling of cotton bales and revival of Government statistical services. On seed, the committee asked for a consumer survey dealing with margarine; determination of effects of present chemical sources of feed nitrogen on markets for proteins from agricultural sources and a study of the impact of price-support programs on cottonseed and soybean industries.
