Faculty Complete

The 1972 Fall school term for Knox City schools will begin August 14 for teachers with a general faculty meeting at 9:00 a.m. in the vocational and kindergarten building.

Students will register Tuesday morning, August 15, from 9:00 until 12:00 with classes to begin August 21 for a full school day from 8:30 until 3:40 p.m.

Senior registration is scheduled from 9:00 until 9:45. Juniors are to register from 9:45 until 10:30. Sophomores will register from 10:30 until 11:15 and freshmen will register from 11:15 until 12:00. Elementary teachers will be in their respective rooms during registration if there are those who wish to pick up lists of needed supplies.

Teachers for the coming year include Mrs. Joanna Delgado, Early Childhood Education and Mrs. Margie Clonts, Kindergarten. Mrs. Jan Lankford will assist with Early Childhood education and Kindergarten. Primary teachers will include Mrs. Louise Nemletz, first grade; Mrs. Hazel Long, second grade; and Mrs. Judy Allen, third grade. Teachers for the middle grades will include Mrs. Earlene Austin, fourth grade;

Mrs. Mary Frances Shannon, fifth grade; and Mrs. Virginia Casey, sixth grade. Mrs. Casey will also teach high school Spanish and public school music for grades five, six, seven and eight. Mrs. Frances King will instruct the primary resource students. Mrs. Idella Escobar will be the teacher's aide for Mrs. King's room. Mrs. Frankie Baker and Mrs. Molly Chapman will provide modified academic classes for vocational and secondary students. Mrs. Leona Burkham will serve as aide for these classes.

Seventh and eighth grade classes will be departmentalized with Mr. Mullins teaching the science classes, Mrs. Mullins language arts, Mrs. Lankford social studies and mathematics.

The programs for the migrant child will be merged as much as possible into the mainstream educational plan with Mrs. Florence Morgan as teacher of the program.

Judging the revue were Miss Vicki Cavander, Young County Home Demonstration Agent from Graham, Mrs. Barbara Elliott, Haskell County Home Demonstration Agent, and Mrs. Amelia Perry, 4-H leader from Haskell county.

Four classes were entered, beginners including eight and nine year olds that had never sewn; juniors, ranging from eleven to thirteen, not having sewn only one year; advanced juniors, eleven to fourteen with most having made several garments; and seniors, fourteen years and older. Judging was based on the girl's posture, poise, grooming, and attitude; the outfit on the girl considering general appearance, becomingness, fit of garment, and accessories; construction; and record books, according to Mrs. Elaine Carmichael, Knox County Home Demonstration Agent.

teach vocational agriculture and Leonard Morgan will teach coordinated vocational academic education. Jimmy Rogers will teach driver's education and Terry Skillabower will teach the health and safety class from which the drivers take their driving time. Mrs. Vera Newton will teach homemaking I and II and will add a new vocational cooperative training program to her department. She plans also to offer for the first time a co-educational home making course called home and family living designed to give both boys and girls some of the fundamental attitudes and understandings necessary for the establishing of their own homes. competitive athletics will be taught by Coach Mullins, Coach Rogers, and Coach Jerry Lowrey for the boys and by Coach Skillabower for the girls. Coach Lowrey will also teach high school social studies.

The school lunch program has been changed at the state level for this school year, making it necessary for those who receive reduced price or free lunches to complete new application forms, school officials said. These forms will be sent home by the students or may be obtained at the high school principal's office. Serving schedules will begin with breakfast from 7:45 until 8:15 and lunch from 11:20 until 12:50. Mrs. Jewell Worley will again supervise cafeteria operations.

Bus drivers Leroy Davis and Roger Butler will run their routes the same as last school year beginning on Monday, August 21. The routes will not be run for registration. Mr. Davis will go west to Dewey Darr's back to Tommy Richardson's then by the U.S.D.A. Plant Materials center and return to school. Roger Butler will drive north to Herring's, then east by Espinoza's and so on until he has completed the east route. Both routes will reverse at the beginning of the spring school term.

Truman White has directed an expanded national youth corps program during the summer months so that the grounds and facilities are in top shape for the opening of school. This fact, the addition of new courses, and the added training which teachers have taken this summer set the stage for an excellent school year ahead.

Father-Son Team In Terracing Program

Reduced silt pollution, control of sheet erosion and more water for crop production are some of the benefits expected from a soil and water conservation program south of Munday.

A father and son team J.C. Rensau Jr. and John Rensau, who operate the 850-acre farming and livestock operation near Munday are in the process of an extensive terracing and leveling program on 160 acres of cropland.

J.B. Rensau explained that the work is being done to make better use of rainfall and to stop sheet erosion in one of their fields.

The terraces under construction are the new small level parallel terraces with intervals which are level from terrace to terrace Arche Lieb of the Soil Conservation Service, reported. The level intervals between terraces will vary from 80 feet to 120 feet depending on the slope of the land, Lieb said.

When the job is completed water that used to run off will be distributed evenly over the field and stored for crop use.

Rensau plan to crop the field to small grain and legumes this fall to build organic matter in the top soil which may have been lost on some areas during construction.

Planning and design assistance was provided to Rensau by personnel of the Soil Conservation Service working in the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District.
