## Farmers Now Receiving Set-Aside Farm Payments

Farmers received the first payments under the set-aside program July 19, 1972 since the program was established in 1971. According to county Executive James E. Anderson, the first payments for the set-aside program are \$75,960, and \$1,000,000 in total.

Payments under the set-aside program are made to farmers who agree to set aside part of their land from production in order to meet a national objective of balancing supply and demand in certain commodities. These payments help to offset the loss of returns from cropland that otherwise would be used for income-yielding production, and on which the farmer is obliged to continue to pay taxes and apply needed conservation steps, according to officials of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Payments to producers are limited to \$5,000 per person for each of three crops—feed grain, wheat and cotton—under the Agricultural Act of 1970.

Nationally total payments are expected to be about \$1.7 billion. Total 1972 farm set-aside program payments in Knox Co. are expected to be about \$1,000,000.

Feed grain producers in the nation ultimately will receive about \$1.3 billion, cotton producers about \$825 million, and wheat producers about \$1 billion. Preliminary payments to wheat producers are limited by law to 75 per cent of final payments. Final wheat certificate payments will be made after December 1. Food grain and cotton farmers may or may not get a final payment, depending on market conditions.

The expedited farm program payments are made possible by streamlined procedures inaugurated in 1970 by ANCS. The action enabled farmers to receive the entire payment due them in the 1970 and 1971 programs six to eight weeks earlier than ever before.

These early payments help many producers reduce their need for long-term credit and cut the amount of interest paid. The flow of cash at this time will again be of major significance to rural communities and the U.S. agricultural economy, USDA officials said.

Burial was in the Benjamin Cemetery under the direction of Smith Funeral Home.

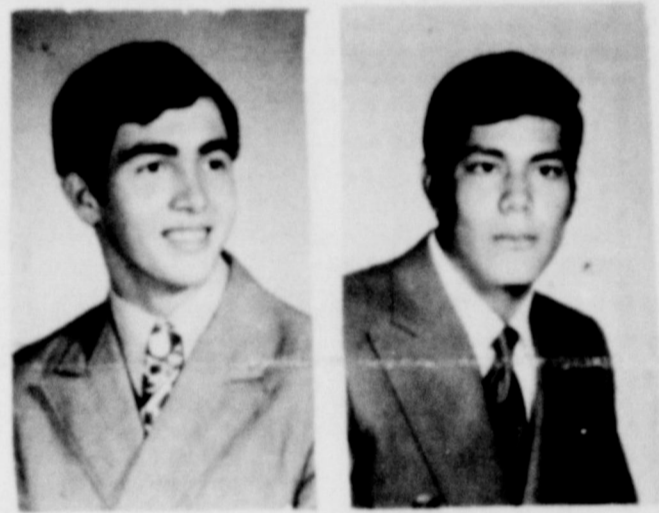
Mr. Duke, 61, died Monday July 17 at 7:30 p.m. in the Brazos Valley Care home in Knox City where he had been a patient the past year.

**New SS Increase Due In October**

The 20 per cent increase in social security benefits signed into law on Saturday, July 1, by President Nixon will bring an estimated additional \$26,940,000 monthly in to Knox County with \$83,000.00 for Knox City, according to Henry Chustz, manager of the Vernon Social Security office.

At present 1450 persons in Knox County are receiving \$134,000' in monthly social security payments. Included in this amount are 450 persons in Knox City receiving \$41,500.

Chustz emphasized that persons receiving payments will not be required to contact his office for the increase which

will be computed automatically. Recipients will receive a notice in the September check telling them of the increase in benefits, Chustz said, and the October check, which will cover the September period, will include the increase.



#### Fight Crime at Home

Rising crime rates are a constant source of dismay, not only to the FBI, politicians and policemen, but to anyone who owns a home. The news analysts present the frightening statistics, but they rarely offer sound advice on combating crime. Here are some ideas to make your home safe from intruders:

### E. Thomas New State Conservationist

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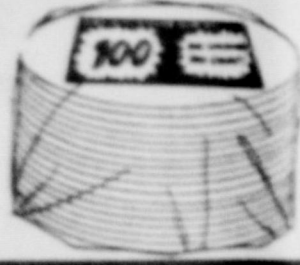
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
