## Approved For Federal Programs

# Hospital Reinstated

After sixty long days, the Knox County Hospital was granted final approval to again participate in all federal governmental health programs.

In a surprise move June 1, 1976, the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare removed the local hospital from federal programs involving health care and it was not until last Wednesday, October 6, that the hospital was again reinstated.

Glen Rumley, hospital administrator, said that inspections, surveys, and written questionnaires from six different government agencies had to be satisfied before final approval was granted.

After Dr. R. G. Howell closed his practice here on May 31, the hospital was without a doctor until Dr. W.F. Thompson arrived from Springfield, Missouri, to be-

gin his practice on August 9. Medicare, Medicaid, and other government regulations will not allow a hospital to function without 24 hour emergency room coverage at the very least, the hospital administrator explained.

Dr. R.L. Newsom, in addition to taking care of his patients at Munday, also took care of patients in the nursing homes both in Knox City and Munday during the interim, but, due to physical limitations, as well as the distance from the hospital, was unable to take care of any emergency patients at the hospital.

The administrator commented, "I feel the whole ridiculous mess could have been avoided if big government would have half a heart and would grant hospitals our size a sixty to ninety day grace period to clear up their problems, especially if they find themselves without the services of a doctor. Surely officials do not believe we would have tried to operate the hospital without a doctor or try to run some fictitious charges by them for services."

Nevertheless, Rumley reports that the hospital is again fully approved and "growing bigger and better" everyday.

On Thursday of last week, nine persons underwent surgery at the Knox County Hospital, which incidentally is more surgeries in one day than any hospital official can remember. According to the

administrator, six to eight persons were working together as a team and everything went "as smooth as glass."

Dr. Newton Neufeld of Springfield, Missouri, who also holds a Texas license and has since 1952, performed the operations, along with Dr. Thompson.

Members of the hospital's board of directors expressed their thanks to all of those in the area who supported the efforts made to attract a new physician to the Knox County Hospital. The administrator said, "There just wasn't one or two, or a dozen for that matter, it just took all of us working together and we're thankful to the people we serve."

## Defensive Driving Course Set Nov. 8

## No More Swine Flu Shots To Be Given

Dr. W.F. Thompson's office was notified early this week by the Texas Department of Health Resources in Abilene to suspend the swine flu vaccination program here until Monday of next week. However, Dr. Thompson said that he does not plan to administer any more of the swine flu shots here.

The nationwide swine flu vaccination program was halted in eight states Tuesday less than two weeks after it began, while health officials in Pennsylvania try to determine the cause of the deaths of three elderly persons who received the shots in Pittsburgh in the same hour.

Locally, Dr. Thompson's office had already used all the swine flu vaccine on hand.

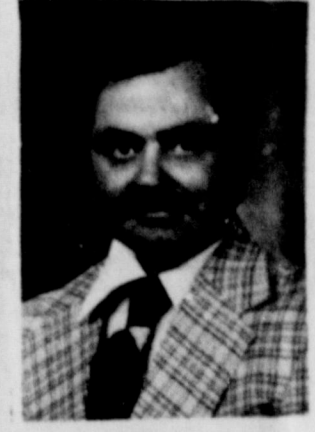
## Bouldin Joins McM Staff

## Munday Airport To Be Dedicated Friday

Formal opening of the new Munday municipal airport will be held Friday, October 15, on the air strip three miles northeast of Munday. The 3200 ft. paved, lighted strip with beacon light is now operational and available to the public. This is the first phase of construction on the site. Plans are in the making for hangars, a communication system and other facilities.

The total cost has been \$201,000 with 75% of the costs being furnished by the Federal Aviation Administration, the Texas Aeronautics Commission, the City of Munday, and private contributions made up the balance needed. It was begun in October 1971 and completed in March this year.

Dedication of the air strip will begin with a fly-in at 9:00 o'clock Friday morning with coffee and doughnuts served to the early arrivals. Congressman Omar Burleson.

# Your Social Security

Quarterly wage reports and social security contributions for household workers are due by November 11, according to Carl Reister, Social Security claims representative in Vernon.

"If you pay a household worker \$50 or more in cash wages in any three-month calendar quarter for work around your house, you must send a report of the wages," Reister said.

Quarters are January-February-March, April-May-June, July-August-September, and October-November-December. Wage reports and social security contributions for the third quarter of 1976 are due by November 11. This date would be October 31, but that falls on a Sunday this year.

The reports may be filed on a form available at any Internal Revenue Service office. "Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees (for Social Security)," Under the current social

security contribution rate, the employee and the employer each pay 5.85 percent of covered wages.

Social security contributions help build retirement, disability, survivors, and Medicare protection for 15 million household workers, including maids, cooks, cleaning women, gardeners, babysitters, and babysitters, according to Reister.

Persons who employ household workers can get a free copy of the booklet, "Social Security and Your Household Employees," at any social security office.

# NEWS OF AGRICULTURE

**By TOMMY ANTILLEY**  
 Certified seed purchased after January 1, 1977 will be certified only for genetic identity.  
 This means that the seed has been produced and processed under standards and procedures established by the Texas Seed and Plant Board and enforced by the Texas Department of Agriculture to assure that the variety is as represented by the certification label accompanying the seed.  
 Since the new certification standard is concerned only with the genetic identity of the variety, it does not consider such quality factors as purity, inert matter, other crop seed, weed seed, noxious weed seed and germination percentage. However, the Texas Seed Law still requires that seed quality information be truthfully labeled on a separate analysis label accompanying the seed.  
 Remember, both labels tell the complete story about the seed.  
 There were a number of reasons for the change in seed certification standards:  
 To assure a more dependable supply of seed officially certified as to genetic identity.  
 To establish uniformity with the Federal Seed Act.  
 To encourage international seed trade.  
 To encourage competition for producing higher quality seed.  
 To allow production of certified seed having quality characteristics for different market needs.  
 Producers buying seed for the 1977 planting season should look for the new genetic certification label

along with the analysis label accompanying the seed. Each of the labels has a specific purpose. The certification label means the variety is properly identified while the analysis label provides seed quality information. Producers must read the labels carefully to determine if the seed meets their requirements.

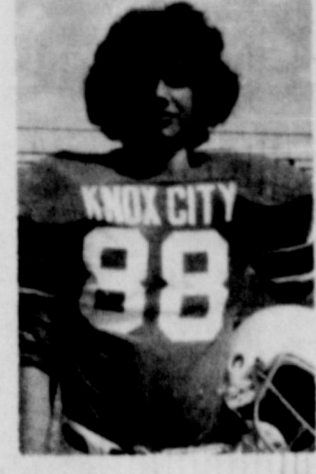

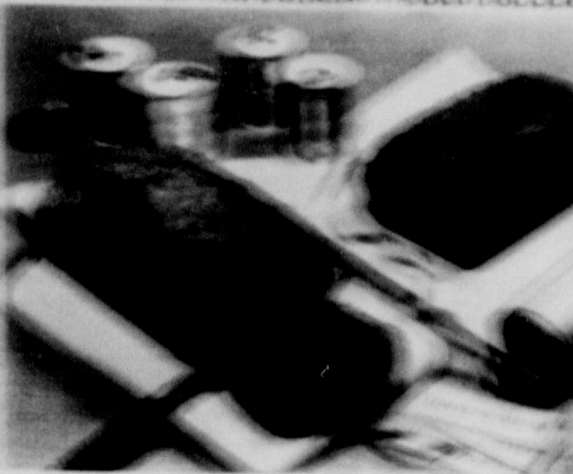

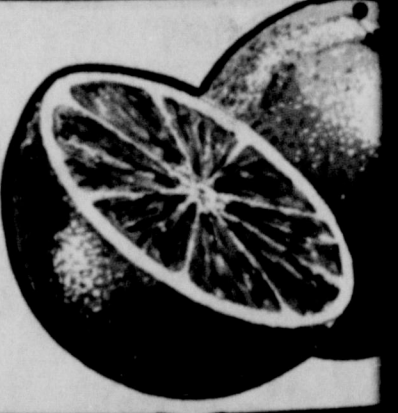
