Funeral services for Cellya Dean Bishop, 14, were to be held this afternoon (Thursday) at 3 o'clock at the First Baptist Church with Rev. Billy Frazier, pastor, officiating. He will be assisted by Rev. E. V. Becker of Stephenville, former pastor of the local church.

Cellya Dean died in Wichita General Hospital Tuesday night, July 19 at 9:45, of a malignancy. She was admitted to the Knox County Hospital June 30 and later transferred to the Wichita Falls hospital.

She was born in O'Brien August 30, 1940, and attended her first year of school in O'Brien. She had attended the Knox City schools since, graduating from grammar school in May of this year. She was captain of the Junior High basketball team and a twirler for the Junior High pep squad. She had planned to attend a band school in Abilene this week.

Cellya joined the First Baptist Church when she was ten years old. She was regular in attendance and active in Sunday School and Training Union work, serving as group leader in Training Union.

Survivors are the parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. N. Bishop; one brother, Shelby; her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. N. Qualls of O'Brien and Mrs. Ethel Bishop of Sweetwater; and two great-grandmothers, Mrs. Julie Allen of Sweetwater and Mrs. Addie Brooks of Brownwood.

Interment was to be in the Knox City Cemetery under the direction of Mansell-Smith Funeral Home of Rochester.

About 45 O'Brien youngsters received the first polio shot, and Mr. Stark expects most or all of them to have the second shot.

## Safety on Farm To Be Stressed Week of July 24-30

The week July 24-30 should be for every Texan on and off the farm a practice period in prevention of accidents. The period has been designated as Texas and National Farm Safety Week.

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Committee believes that accidents on farms do not occur because farmers and their families are more careless than other citizens. But with excess work and fatigue they often neglect necessary precautions in working with power equipment and edged tools, and in keeping in good repair articles which are used frequently.

Prevention of accidents has a deeper importance than merely keeping people fit to do their work. The waste of human lives, the pain and sometimes permanent crippling resulting from accidents, and the disruption of family life when a member is injured are of even greater consequence.

The distressing thing, points out the committee, is that so large a part of accidents which are happening daily could be avoided by caution and common sense safeguards.

Hazards to life and limb in homes and farm buildings are many and obvious. A systematic check will reveal them, and knowledge of them is an urge to remove them. Falls cause more injuries in the home than any other type of accident. Looking before stepping could reduce such accidents, suggests the Safety Committee.

Finally, the committee suggests that these seven days should take on special significance. It is time that farmers and their families and neighbors pooled their efforts toward making their industry as safe as any other in the nation. And as stated in the theme for Safety Week: "Your Safety Is in Your Hands."

## Doctors Ready to Give Second Polio Shots

Dr. D. C. Eiland, county health officer, said Wednesday that Salk polio vaccine has been received for the second round of shots in Knox County.

Scheduled to receive the shots are all children who were in the first and second grades last school term, and who received their first shots in April.

The program for the second inoculations is being started in Abilene, Dallas and other communities this week.

Dr. Eiland said he has been in communication by telephone with experts in Austin, Dallas, Abilene and Wichita Falls and that the opinion of these men is that it is safe and important to give the second shots at this time.

Dr. Eiland quoted the experts as being in agreement that there is less danger in taking the second shot at this time than there would be in having paralytic polio without the shot. "The experts agree," Dr. Eiland said, "that no first shot should be given during the season when polio is prevalent. All agree that later in the year, when the disease is not prevalent, that the three shots should be given to all children as soon as the Salk vaccine is available."

It was recommended by the county health officer that each parent discuss the situation with his own physician.

The Knox City Clinic, Dr. Eiland's office in Munday and Dr. R. L. Newsom's clinic in Munday will cooperate in administering the shots. The vaccine will be furnished by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and will be administered free of charge by the Knox County doctors. This arrangement applies to the first and second grade pupils who have already received their first shots.

There will be no group vaccination, as there was during the school term, Dr. Eiland said. Instead, parents may take their children to their family doctor at their convenience. No shots will be given after August 10, however, since any unused vaccine must be returned to the National Foundation at that time.

## 1909 Newspaper Found In Cornerstone of Old School

A 46-year-old copy of the Southwestern Journal, predecessor of the Knox County Herald, was removed from the cornerstone of the old high school building when workmen began wrecking the building Friday.

The paper, which was in a good state of preservation, was dated July 23, 1909. It was the twentieth weekly issue of the publication. Editor was Luther B. Hammock, who later published the Herald, and who died several months ago in California.

Printed in a magazine format, the paper consisted of ten 11x16 inch pages and was neatly printed and well-edited.

The first page was devoted to the title and a statement of the paper's principles: "Fearless in the Right... A Journal of Unselfish Observations, Concise Sincere Perceptions Devoted to the Uplifting of the Southwest, Containing Discussions on Current Events, Social, Economic, Political and Religious."

The inside pages contained 18 advertisements of business and professional men. Advertisers included the McLain Company, composed of J. H. McLain and W. J. Jones, J. A. Hammock, photographer, E. B. Warren, attorney, S. H. Owens, blacksmith, Joe Pate Furniture Co., J. L. Williams, contractor and builder, W. F. Alford & Son Livery, Feed and Transfer, Dr. Ira J. Culver, drugs and medicine, J. O. Smallin, general hardware, J. C. Woodriddle, lumber, First National Bank, E. C. Couch, cashier, C. H. Mahan Music Co., Wm. Cameron & Co., J. H. Lanier, dry goods and groceries, and Palace Barber Shop—Parks and Shaw, proprietors.

Editorially, the paper urged that an election be called on incorporating Knox City. Apparently a similar move the preceding year had failed, and the editor indicated that some people were afraid a "stock law" would be passed if the town was incorporated. "Wise councilmen," the paper stated, "will surely pass no ordinance that will be detrimental to the general citizenship."

A news story announced that the cornerstone of the new school building would be laid Saturday, July 24, under the auspices of the Odd Fellows Hall.

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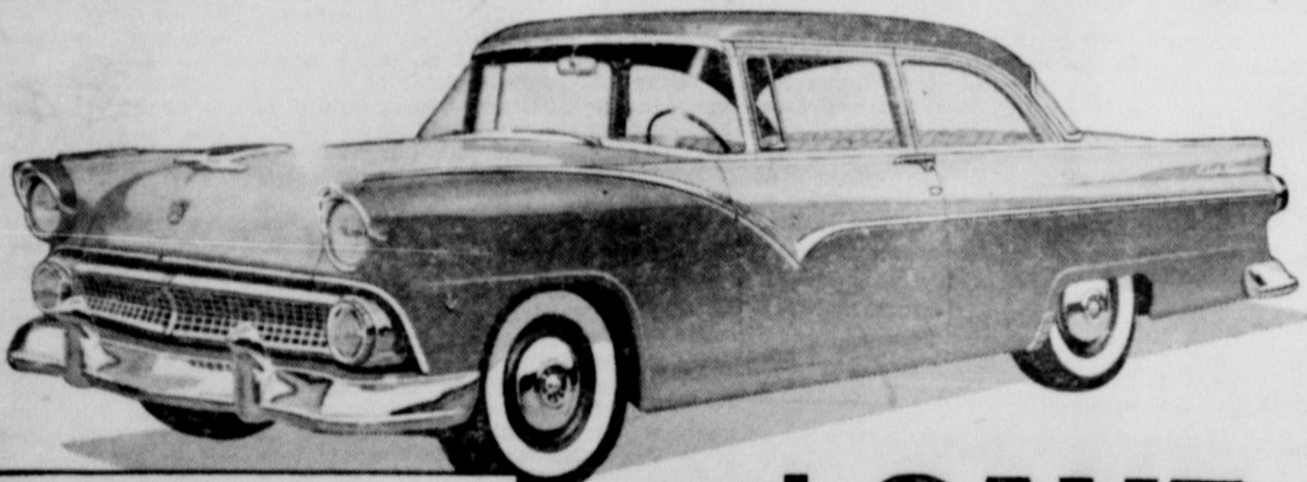

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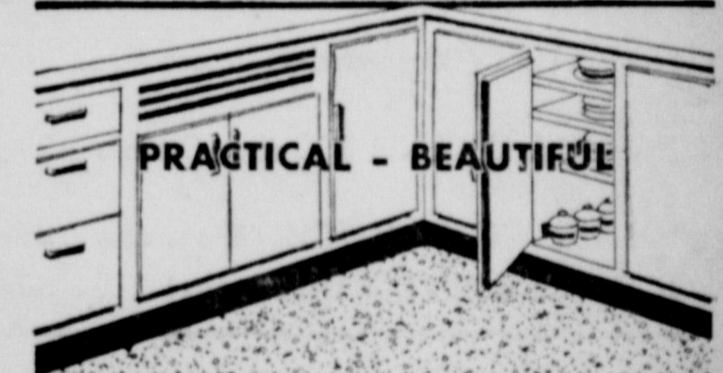

(3) **"THE SECURITY OF BELIEVERS"** — Can you, by searching the scriptures, find in them the teaching that a saved man cannot fall from grace? "Ye are fallen from grace" (Galatians 5:4). "Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall" (1 Corinthians 10:12).

Remember that the more thoroughly you search the scriptures the more completely the truth will be confirmed. Remember that if you have the truth you have nothing to fear from investigation. Search the scriptures daily and obey them fully.

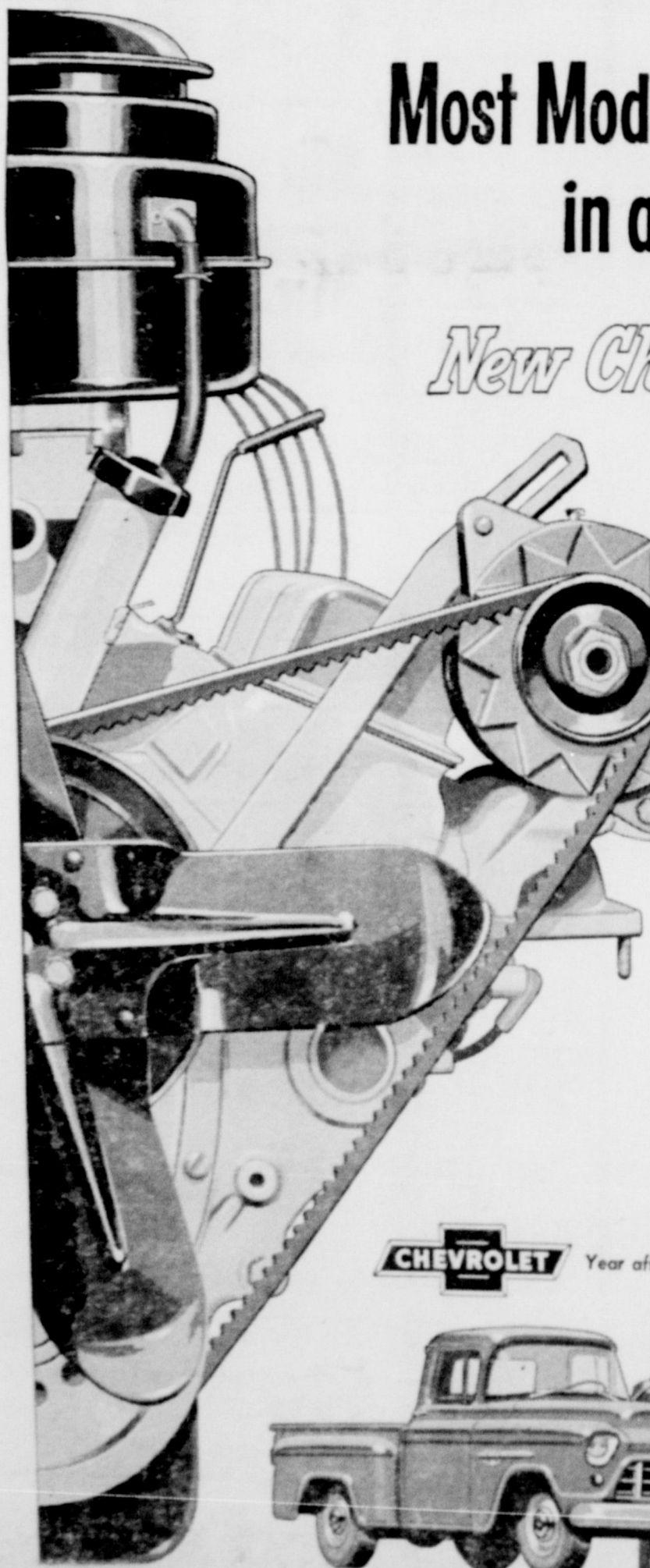
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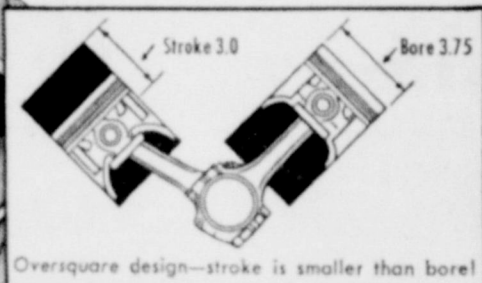

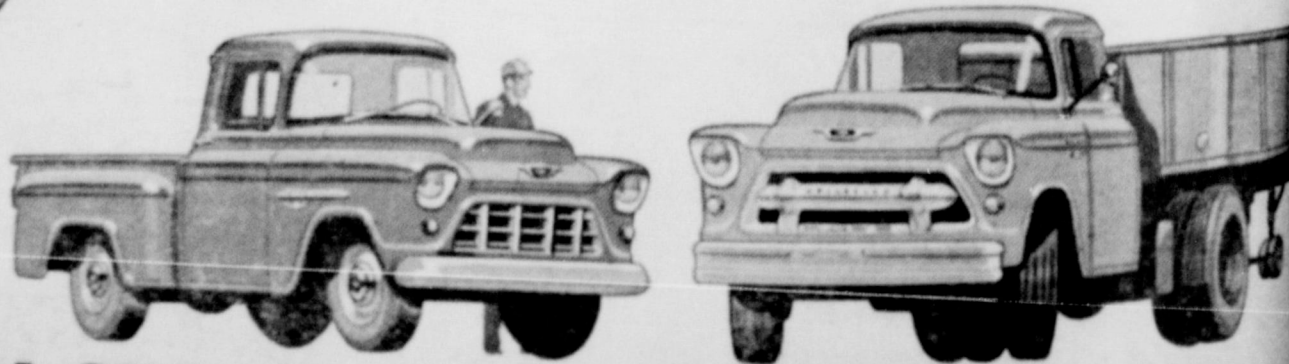
