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## Fruits of Lay Witness Mission

### Community Services Planned For Weekend

This weekend will provide the people of Knox City with an opportunity for community-wide involvement and sharing as the churches of the community once again meet in joint services at the First Baptist Church Sunday morning at 11:00 o'clock.

The joint worship service and other planned weekend events this weekend are an outgrowth of the Lay Witness Mission held here in June, when it was decided that the churches would join in a community-wide worship service once every three months.

Guest speaker for the joint service will be Louie Hernandez, who teaches radio math and radio and TV repair at South Plains Junior College at Levelland. Formerly a violinist with the San Antonio Symphony, Hernandez will also present several selections of sacred music during the service. He will be accompanied by his wife, Myra, on the piano.

The joint service will also feature the Joy Choir of Aldersgate United Methodist Church in Abilene, which is composed of a group of junior high and high school students.

The sixty voice Joy Choir will

also present a concert at 7:30 o'clock Saturday night in First United Methodist Church. Everyone is invited to attend this concert.

A covered dish supper for the choir members and all community youth will be hosted by the Methodists in Fellowship Hall at 6:00 p.m. Saturday evening prior to the concert. Following the concert, there will be a fellowship period for local and area youth and choir members in the Fellowship Hall.

A sandwich luncheon at the First Baptist Church following the joint worship service Sunday morning is also planned. Women of the various churches involved are to be contacted regarding duties. Also, each family attending the luncheon is asked to bring enough sandwiches for their family plus some extra for food for the choir.

The concluding event of the weekend community participation will be a sharing program at 7:00 o'clock in First United Methodist Church Sunday night. This will be similar to the sharing service following the Lay Witness Mission, with everyone invited to attend.

## Community Shower Set Saturday

### Hackney Home Destroyed By Fire

Friends and neighbors are hosting a community shower for Bonnie and Elwood Hackney Saturday afternoon from two until four in the Community Center.

The Hackney's farm home ten miles southeast of Knox City was completely destroyed by fire last Thursday afternoon about 3:00 o'clock.

It was believed the blaze started from a trash fire that caught a storage building on fire that caused the house to burn.

Volunteer fire departments from Knox City and Munday answered the call, but by the time they arrived, the blaze was out of control. The stucco walls were all that were left standing, and the Hackneys were able to salvage some of the family

photos and a few business records in a file were not completely destroyed. A few pieces of blistered furniture were also removed from the house by the firemen.

Wendell Partridge, who was working in a nearby field, noticed the shed afire and tried in vain to confine it before it spread to the house but was unable to do so. He reported the fire from his in-laws' home, the Adolph Havrans, who are neighbors of the Hackneys.

Bonnie and Elwood bought their place in 1946 and moved there February 10, 1947. The house had undergone several changes and remodeling since. However, extensive remodeling had just been completed the day of the fire, with new carpets,

drapes, and furnishings. The carpet was laid the day before and furniture was put back in its place Thursday morning.

Bonnie was at work in the offices of Dr. R.G. Howell and Associates, and Elwood had left home only a few minutes earlier, it was reported.

For those friends who need assistance in selecting gifts for the couple, local merchants will be able to help with suggestions for items and colors needed.

The Knox City Greyhounds downed the Merkel Badgers 18-6 at Merkel last Friday night in a continually falling light rain.

Stanley Newton got things rolling when he scored the first TD for the Hounds on a fumble recovery from eight yards out. The extra point run failed.

Minutes later, on an end sweep, Charlie Flye's speedy footwork put the Knox City Greyhounds in paydirt a second time.

The try for extra points again failed, bringing up a half-time score of Knox City 12-Merkel 0.

The chilly, wet second half began as the Badgers kicked off to the Hounds, only to have Knox City's Flye race 85 yards with the pigskin for another Hound touchdown.

The try for points failed again.

The Badgers got the ball rolling in the third quarter, and scored at the end of a 50 yard drive when Merkel's Jim Land

crossed the goal line from eight yards out.

The Badgers' extra point try failed, making the final score, Knox City 18-Merkel 6.

In other area games Friday, Paducah fell to Childress 39-6, and neighboring Munday was trounced by Rule 29-0. Benjamin nailed McCaulley 38-14, and O'Brien whipped Highland 50-0 in a game called in the third quarter.

The Hounds meet the Quannah Indians Friday night at Quannah. Kick-off time is set for 8 o'clock.

The Indians finished last in their district last year, but have 10 returning lettermen and the desire for a better season, plus an edge in size, with team members such as Bennie Garza at 225, Brad Smith at 180, and Steve White at 190. Other Indians to watch are Mike Melton and Ronald Ingram.

# Field Day Slated In Vernon October 4

Livestock producers, conservation leaders, and other interested persons are being invited to attend the annual Brush Control and Range Improvement Day at Vernon October 4.

Arche Lieb, district conservationist for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service at Knox City, said he hoped a group from the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District would attend the event.

Air conditioned buses will be used to tour the Waggoner Ranch during the morning of October 4. After a catered lunch, an afternoon program will be held in the Wilberger Memorial Auditorium at Vernon.

Speakers from SCS, Texas A&M University, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and the Brush Control and Range Improvement Association will discuss new developments and problems in management of brush.

Several prominent livestock producers will also be on the program.

With increasing demands for meat, we must find ways to increase livestock production from our native grasslands, Lieb said.

A well-rounded grassland improvement program applied to all the rangeland in Knox County could greatly increase beef production.

To get this improvement a combination of brush management, range re-seeding, periodic rests, and other modern range improvement methods are needed.

Much of the technology for accomplishing this job is already known and in use here in the Wichita Brazos SWCD, Lieb said.

However, we must continually search for new and better ways of doing business. We also must solve some of the

economic, environmental, and related problems associated with brush control and grassland management.

Some of the speakers scheduled for the field day include Edward E. Thomas, state conservationist, SCS; Dr. L.S. Pope, Associate Dean for Administrative Affairs, Texas A&M University; Dr. J.C. Miller, Director, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station; Joe Norris, range conservationist, SCS. Livestock producers on the program include John Matthews, Abilene, and Rob Brown, Throckmorton.

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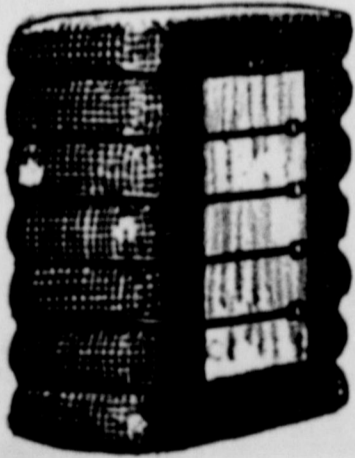

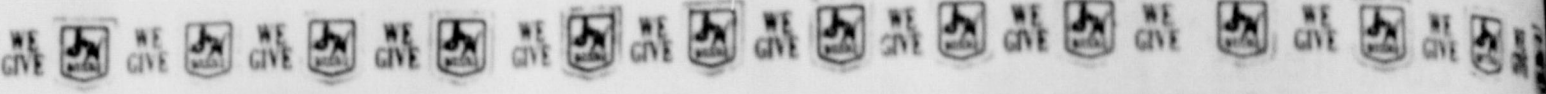

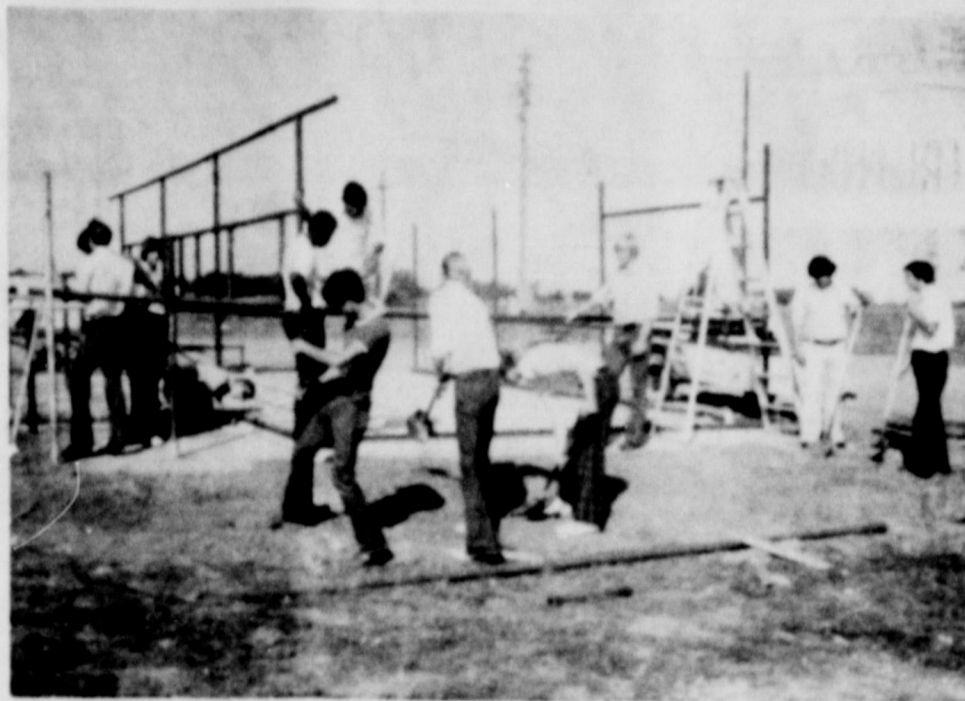

The 15'x30' building is to be on a slight rise at the north end of the field and will face south. It has a raised concrete floor, with a six foot wide covered apron in front of the serving windows. A three-foot-wide walk will run down the east and west sides of the building.

The exterior of the building is to be finished in blue corrugated metal, with a white metal roof, according to Burkham.

Plans call for the interior to be insulated and finished with paneling.

Guides are being installed to create in and out aisles to channel patrons past the serving windows, which are to be located at the front of the building.

The serving windows are to be set at a more convenient height than those in the present stand. A raised counter for a coffee urn is to be located at each window with the coke

machine to be centrally located at the serving windows on a raised counter. A narrow counter top will run across the length of the building under the serving windows for easy placement of cups and other items. The ice-cream box will be located on the west wall, with a storage counter running across the back, or north side, of the building.

The hot water heater, the sink, stove, and refrigerator will occupy the east wall.

The popcorn machine will be placed in the center of the building, with easy access from any serving window.

Located beside the popcorn machine, in view of patrons at the serving windows will be display racks on which items for sale will be shown.

According to Burkham, the new concession stand will be ready for business before the football season is over if the weather and availability of construction materials permit.

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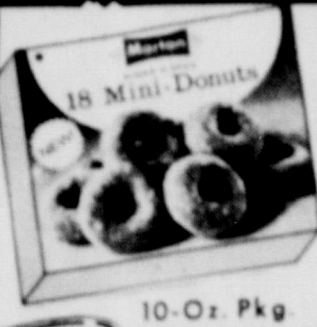
