the Vernon Social Security office, advises that one item of special interest to military men and women and their dependents is a provision in the new social security law which promises greater protection for them and their families.

Under the old law only a person's military base pay was counted toward social security benefits. Starting with January 1968, an additional \$100 will be counted for each month in which the person in military service is receiving active duty

Since social security benefits are based on average earnings over a working career, you and your family may be able to receive higher benefits later because of the additional cred-

Coronado, came to traverse the area, Some two hundred years after this era of exploration on the rolling plains, Buffalo hunters moved into the area, Accompanying the Buffalo hunters were the miners who searched for copper in the

mountains along the Brazos. Shortly after the extermination of the Buffalo on the rolling plains, cattlemen from East Texas pushed their herds into the area. Farmers moved into the area perhaps a decade after the cattlemen had come. Until now the rolling plains had been free grazing with no fences. The farmers began to cultivate and fence the land.

It was at the time the farmers began to enter the rolling plains that the state of Texas issued approximately 1,270 acres of land to Rebecca E, Farrow. This issue of land was made Feb. 12, 1883, the land being located in the south part of Knox County and north part of Haskell County. Rebecca Farrow was a widow of a general in the Confederate Army and the land was

issued on this basis.

On Jly 21, 1884 the land was transferred to J. S. Bounds. In May of 1886 this tract of land was surveyed by W. A. Jones, the district surveyor.

On May 17, 1888 T. G. Carney purchased the south half of this tract of land(approximately 635 acres) from Bounds, Mr. Carney, of Hill County, purchased the land for \$1,583.00.

Mr. Carney moved from Hill County to his newly acquired land in present Haskell County. Many settlers at this timelived in half-dugouts across the prairie but Mr. Carney built a house. The house was constructed somewhat east and southeast of the present school plant. The lumber was secured by swapping one or more twoyear old mules for the needed timber to build the house. The

lumber was hauled in by wagon


and team, to the building site. In 1889 Mr. Carney put the land just east of the present school plant in cultivation. The work was done with oxen. The land is still being worked to-

This is the means by which Mr. T. G. Carney secured the section on which the future town of O'Brien, Texas would be built. The story of the many early settlers who came to the area before the building of the town is the topic of discussion which will follow.

Aerial spray work should begin 40-90 days after green growth at the buds is noticed. Generally, beyond 90 days after leafing begins, spraying should not be done. Spraying should be done after the leaf color has changed from light green to dark

"When the leaf color is beginning to change is the optimum time for spraying for best control of mesquite using 2,4,5-T," the range specialist

If there is an effective rain during the spray season, postpone spraying for a week to ten days or until new growth at the tips turns a dark green color. Aerial spraying should not be stopped if there is only a light shower, Hoffman said,

"When the leaves are light green color, they are developing and using food reserve stored in the root system, After the leaves are fully developed and turn a dark green color, the food flow is reversed from the top back to the root system," Hoffman said,

"At this stage," the specialist said, "application of 2,4,5-T should be made so the material will be translocated down to the root system to control the trees."

Huffman pointed out that the mesquite is to be able to grow more grass rather than have have been dead trees. Unless more grass is grown, it is not economical to

control mesquite, he s-id. For more information concerning mesquite control, contact your local county agent and pick up MP-386 which outlines chemical and mechanical control methods for mesquite, Hoffman advised.

Administration on January 1, 1966. Approximately \$1,059,070 was advanced in the 1967 fiscal

Currently 108 farmers in Knox County are using the supervised credit services of the Farmers Home Administration. The supply of Farmers Home Administration credit, which supplements the credit supplied by banks and other private credit sources is one of the measures recommended by President Johnson to provide family farmers an opportunity to earn parity of income.

Farmers Home Administration loans can be used to buy land, refinance debts, acquire livestock and equipment, pay fertilizer and fuel bills and pay other expenses connected with acquiring, improving and operating farms. "These loans have enabled farmers to stay in business who would otherwise have had to give up and go to the city. They have helped young formers get established. They have enabled farmers to keep going after drouth conditions brought about the need for emergency loans in the county", Mr. Boone noted.

Loans are made only to families who are unable to obtain adequate credit from other The program is tailored to individual family needs and loans are accompanied by technical assistance in farm and money management.
