## More Social Security For Men In Service

Edwin Draughon, Manager of the Vernon Social Security office, advises that one item of special interest to military men and women and their dependents is a provision in the new social security law which promises greater protection for them and their families.

Under the old law only a person's military base pay was counted toward social security benefits. Starting with January 1968, an additional \$100 will be counted for each month in which the person in military service is receiving active duty pay.

Since social security benefits are based on average earnings over a working career, you and your family may be able to receive higher benefits later because of the additional credits.

The Congress recognized that under the old law, the social security protection of a worker might be impaired during a period when he is in military service, because of the relatively low earnings covered under social security. This new provision seeks to take into account the value of payment in kind - such fringe benefits as food, housing, and clothing, and medical services, which are in effect part of the serviceman's earnings.

These earnings credits will automatically be credited to your social security account, and you do not have to make any kind of application to receive them. They will not mean additional social security contributions from your paycheck but will be attributed to the general funds of the Treasury.

The Fandangle Sampler is, as its name implies, a sample of the Fandangle, Albany's well known outdoor summer musical.

## Legalized Betting Is A Bad Deal For Texas

All those engaged in retail trade should carefully consider the effect pari mutuel horserace betting could have on legitimate business in their communities.

Proponents of pari mutuel betting claim that it will stimulate business in Texas. But the record in other states shows, on the contrary, that many businesses suffer after horserace gambling is legalized.

It is not difficult to understand why retail stores should experience decreases in time payments, increases in bad checks, and slumping sales during the racing season.

Business — real business — fills a need. Horserace betting produces nothing of value. It does not feed, clothe, house or transport people.

Profits from pari mutuel horserace betting do not go back into the community. They go into the hands of the wealthy people who are able to finance a race track.

gambling reduces the disposable income of families who would otherwise spend more for useful products and services. Pari mutuel horserace betting, proposed in the referendum on May 4 ballot, will drain away wages, savings and investments from Texas business into enterprises which serve no human need.

Local business firms cannot even hope to supply equipment to the race tracks. Nearly all the mechanical and electronic equipment needed must be rented from one firm. It cannot be purchased.

Senator Estes Kefauver wrote in his book, "Crime In America", "Whenever gambling is allowed to exist, legally or illegally, money is taken out of normal and legitimate channels of commerce, and when gambling is minimized, legitimate business flourishes."

There is abundant evidence to support this statement. Gambling is bad business. Gambling is bad for business. To keep Texas business good, keep pari mutuel horserace betting out of Texas.

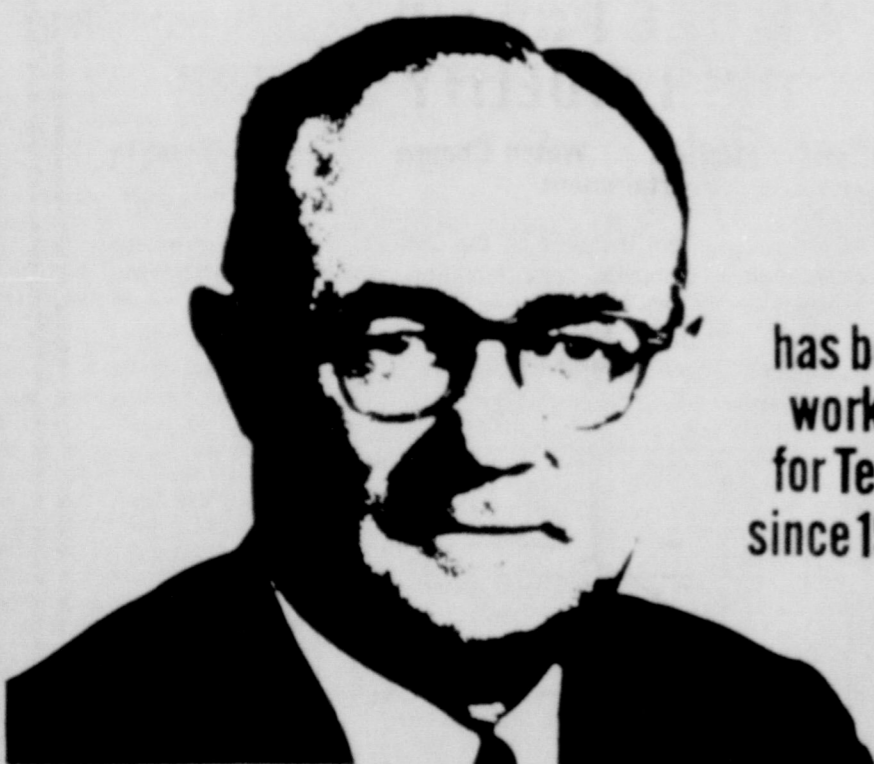

On July 21, 1884 the land was transferred to J. S. Bounds. In May of 1886 this tract of land was surveyed by W. A. Jones, the district surveyor.

On May 17, 1888 T. G. Carney purchased the south half of this tract of land (approximately 635 acres) from Bounds. Mr. Carney, of Hill County, purchased the land for \$1,583.00.

Mr. Carney moved from Hill County to his newly acquired land in present Haskell County. Many settlers at this time lived in half-dugouts across the prairie but Mr. Carney built a house. The house was constructed somewhat east and southeast of the present school plant. The lumber was secured by swapping one or more two-year old mules for the needed timber to build the house. The lumber was hauled in by wagon and team, to the building site.

In 1889 Mr. Carney put the land just east of the present school plant in cultivation. The work was done with oxen. The land is still being worked today.

This is the means by which Mr. T. G. Carney secured the section on which the future town of O'Brien, Texas would be built. The story of the many early settlers who came to the area before the building of the town is the topic of discussion which will follow.

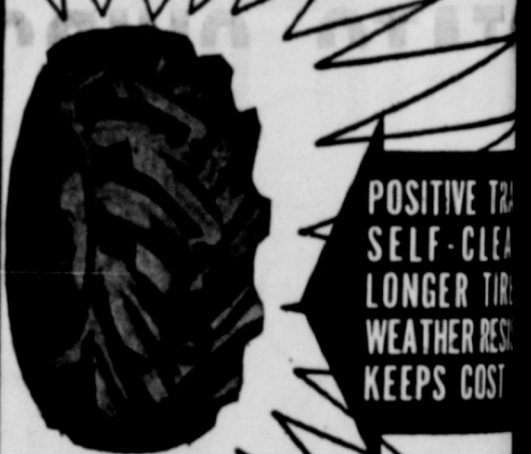

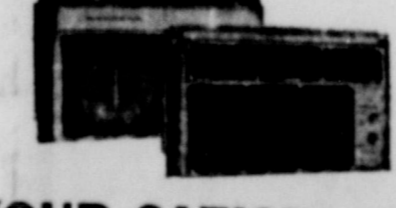

#### CONDITIONS STATEWIDE FAVOR EFFECTIVE MESQUITE CONTROL

The best condition in 20 years now exist for controlling mesquite, reports a range, brush and weed control specialist at Texas A&M University.

G. O. Hoffman, Extension specialist, said that mesquite started budding about April 8 around Abilene, northwest to the Caprock and into the Spur, Wichita Falls and up to the Chil-

dress area, and also in the Ozona-Fort Stockton area.

"It takes the mesquite tree from 30-50 days under normal growth conditions to mature before it is susceptible to foliage application of 2,4,5-T applied by airplane," Hoffman said.

Aerial spray work should begin 40-90 days after green growth at the buds is noticed. Generally, beyond 90 days after leafing begins, spraying should not be done. Spraying should be done after the leaf color has changed from light green to dark green.

"When the leaf color is beginning to change is the optimum time for spraying for best control of mesquite using 2,4,5-T," the range specialist said.

If there is an effective rain during the spray season, postpone spraying for a week to ten days or until new growth at the tips turns a dark green color.

Aerial spraying should not be stopped if there is only a light shower, Hoffman said. "When the leaves are light green color, they are developing and using food reserve stored in the root system. After the leaves are fully developed and turn a dark green color, the food flow is reversed from the top back to the root system," Hoffman said.

"At this stage," the specialist said, "application of 2,4,5-T should be made so the material will be translocated down to the root system to control the trees."

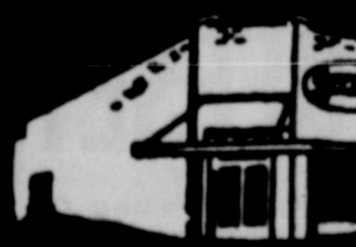

## Hints Offered For "Mum" Production

Proper planning now can assure a strong, sturdy plant to support the flower heads of blooming chrysanthemums this fall, says E. E. Janne, Extension horticulturist at Texas A&M University.

Large clumps of small green plants will soon appear where plants were carried over from last fall. Dividing these clumps and saving only the best ones to

replant is best. The entire clump should be removed from the perennial border with a spading fork or shovel and placed in the shade, out of the wind, while the beds are prepared for the coming season. Fertilizer should be incorporated into the soil at the rate of two to three pounds per hundred square feet of bed area. Several inches of coarse spagnum peat moss or well-decomposed compost should also be added over the entire bed.

Raking and leveling the bed after spading is important in order to assure removing all trash and debris. The selected plants from the clumps can be spaced about 18 inches apart. As each is set, water it thoroughly. After planting, the beds should be watered thoroughly such as coarse wood bark, or provide an attractive mulch to conserve moisture and encourage growth.

Each time a new plant is set, the top set should be removed to encourage growth of the leaf axils. This should be done until mid or late May, no further pinching is done.

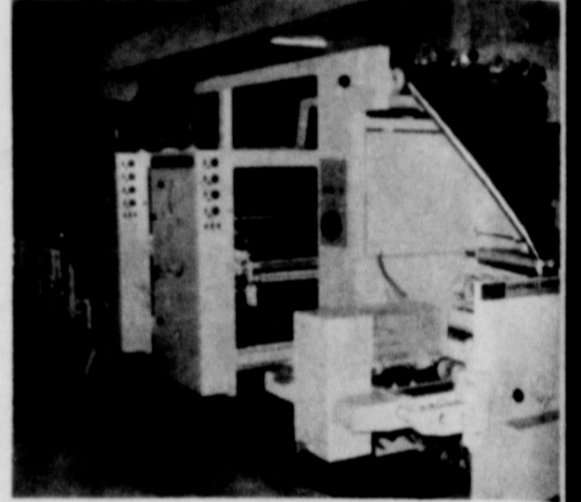
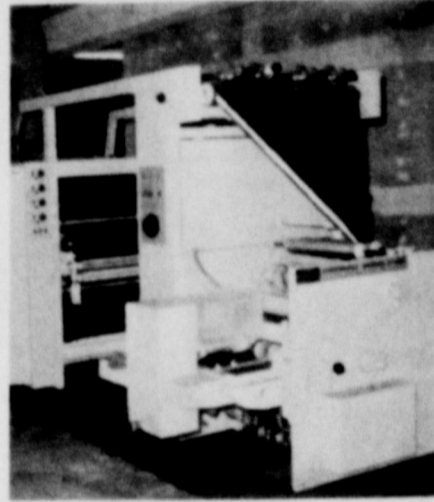

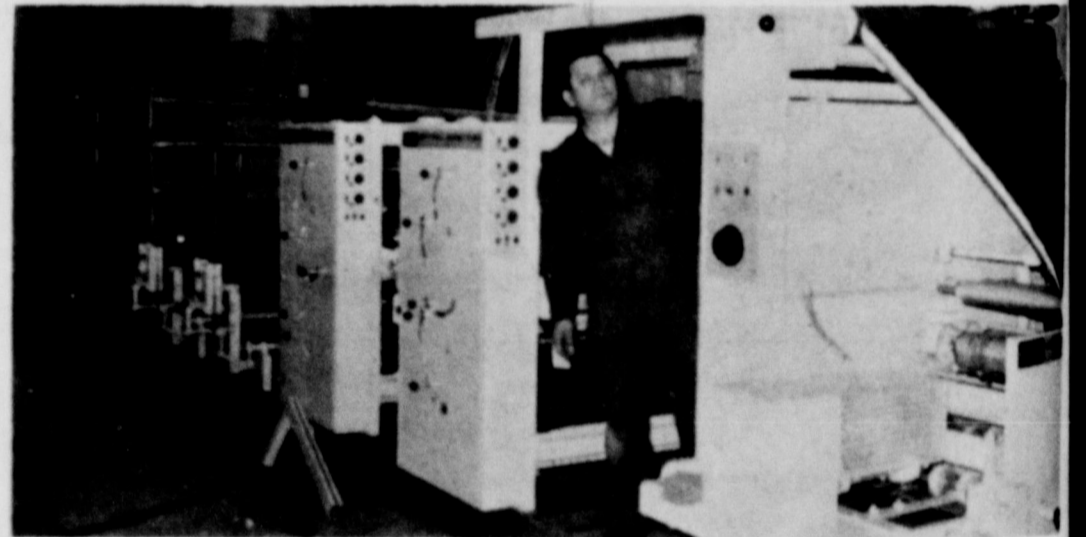

### FHA Loans Total Over 2 Million For Knox County

A total of \$2,767,910 in loan funds has been used in Knox County to support family farms since Joe T. Boone became local supervisor for Farmers Home

Administration on January 1, 1966. Approximately \$1,059,070 was advanced in the 1967 fiscal year.

Currently 108 farmers in Knox County are using the supervised credit services of the Farmers Home Administration. The supply of Farmers Home Administration credit, which supplements the credit supplied by banks and other private credit sources is one of the measures recommended by President Johnson to provide family farmers an opportunity to earn parity of income.

Farmers Home Administration loans can be used to buy land, refinance debts, acquire livestock and equipment, pay fertilizer and fuel bills and pay other expenses connected with acquiring, improving and operating farms. "These loans have enabled farmers to stay in business who would otherwise have had to give up and go to the city. They have helped young farmers get established. They have enabled farmers to keep going after drought conditions brought about the need for emergency loans in the county", Mr. Boone noted.

Loans are made only to families who are unable to obtain adequate credit from other sources. The program is tailored to individual family needs and loans are accompanied by technical assistance in farm and money management.
