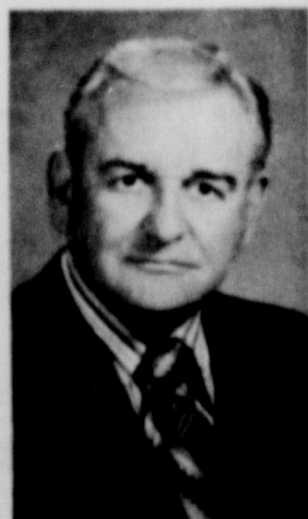
Annual TSTA Meeting to Be Held Here
