## ARMISTICE DAY DULY OBSERVED IN KNOX CITY

All Stores Close and Appropriate Program is Carried Out on November 11th.

Last Saturday, November 11th, was Armistice Day, a day which should be set apart by all loyal Americans as one of true devotion to our community and our flag. To our boys who offered their services and their lives for their country and for those of us who remained at home. Some of these boys made the supreme sacrifice and never came home after having gone overseas and to the front to fight in the world war for America and her allies. The most that we can do in honor of these boys is very little compared to what they did for us.

The day was appropriately observed in Knox City. All places of business, except the hotels and restaurants, were closed all day and a splendid program was carried out by the American Legion and National Guards. A parade was formed, headed by the Knox City Band, and marched south to Main Street, thence east a few blocks, and then back north to Fourth Avenue, where they turned west and marched back to Central Avenue. The American Legion and National Guards boys were followed in the parade by several of the Confederate Veterans of this place.

Following the parade all of the ex-soldiers, including the members of the above organizations and their wives and sweethearts, the Confederate and Federal veterans, were invited into the Armory, where a big turkey dinner was awaiting them. After dinner was served there were talks by Capt. C. S. Nusbaum, Prof. B. M. McKeown and Prof. Frazier, superintendent of the Haskell school, readings by Misses Marjorie Frizzell and Orietta Arnold and a vocal solo by Mrs. G. T. Harberger.

In the afternoon there was a basketball game at the ball park, a report of which appears elsewhere. Altogether it was a day of enjoyment and we are sure that everyone was glad to have a part in showing to our soldier boys that their service was truly appreciated and that we were glad to honor them by commemorating the day that in so much to them when they received the glad message that they had won the victory and that they could soon return to their homes and their loved ones.

## OFFICERS CAPTURE 3 STILL BOOTLEGGERS AND SEVERAL GALLONS OF CORN WHISKEY

On last Friday Sheriff W. S. Britton and his office force, accompanied by City Marshal G. T. Harberger of Knox City, went to Rhineland, where they captured two real good copper stills, 25 quarts of whiskey, 125 gallons of mash and two men.

The same officers were called to a community 9 miles east of Murday on Saturday, where they captured about 20 quarts of corn whiskey, one still and one man. The three men captured in the two raids were placed in the county jail at Benjamin to await their trial for bootlegging and operating illicit stills.

Knox City has a good force of officers who are worthy of complaint for their service in enforcing the law, and believe they have the co-operation, of our citizenship, for without this we do not believe they could have accomplished the results that they have in their work.

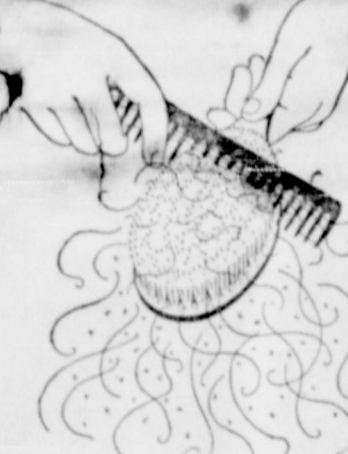

Milam County's cotton crop, according to ginning reports, has reached a total of 31,000 bales, which exceeds the 1921 cotton crop by about 9,000 bales.

The turkey season has opened at Flatonia, with 23c the local price. A large number of turkeys are in the hands of the raisers. The farmers are holding for higher prices.

The cotton crop of Brazoria County this year is showing a great improvement over last year. The ginnings on November 1 last year were 135 bales; on the same date this year 217 bales had been ginned.

An analysis of Franklin County was made this week by soil experts of the soil improvement commission in progress in thirteen Eastern counties and plans laid for the improvement of worn-out lands.

### Afraid of the Light

"And men loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil."

No, we are not going to preach a sermon to you, but are going to try to state a few facts.

We sometimes here it said that some men are afraid to attend a public meeting of some kind, for fear they will be called upon to contribute money for some cause. There are, without doubt, men of this class. But it is our belief that there are as many and probably more men who stay away from such meetings for fear that light may be thrown upon their path and show them that their ideas of certain things may be wrong. Men who are afraid that they may be convinced that they have been walking in darkness, that they have chosen darkness rather than light.

A writer, we do not call to mind who it was, has said, "Where ignorance is bliss, 'tis folly to be wise." This perhaps is true, we cannot say, but we have our doubts, so far as the real facts are concerned. But at any rate, it seems that there are some people who rather than see and here those things that may enlighten them set'te down to a narrow life of ignorance and prejudice, assuming that such a life, with its small ideas and selfish purposes, is proof that they are walking in the "nar-

row way" that leads to that life which has no end, the life that is eternal.

Fellow citizens, let us have broad minds, let us seek the light and lend a helping hand to those about us, making them feel and know that we are their friends and that it is a privilege, an honor and not a burden or a humiliation to live among us. These are some of the things that we must do in order to accomplish the task that we have set out to accomplish of building here a great community.

THE KLAN ISSUE

By Rev. W. F. Lynch, O'Brien, Texas

The heading of this article is the topic of the day in many ways. And as a topic for discussion it has become an issue involved in action as well. It has gone from that of a moral standpoint to that of political and religious as well.

Like many other issues of the day, it can not be let alone and will not be allowed to stay where it properly belongs. Hence the issue has to be met from almost every angle or position in life. It was bad enough for it to have gotten into politics, but still worse when it begins to creep into religious affairs so far as what is commonly called Protestantism.

Therefore the future of some things great in our state and nation as well is going to call for some discretion in the use of words and wisdom in action.

Let it be understood that the writer is not a Klansman, neither do I expect at this time ever to be so far as membership is concerned, but so far as principle is concerned I am one from every view point.

And my dear reader, if you are a Christian or true American, you are, too. As I see it, where I differ from the Klan, is the manner of organization and of carrying out their purposes in some respects.

Let us notice the causes for this organization. War had its origin in hell. Old Satan is the instigator of all trouble, sorrow and destruction. War has for its aim destruction in many ways. War does not stop at the destruction of life and property, but character and home life as well. Home is man's little heaven on earth. But to be that it must have peace, virtue and love.

War means the agonies of hell turned loose on earth. When once turned loose men are unable to resist its influence in ordinary ways. The ways and means used under ordinary conditions will not resist the effects of old Satan in war. To meet the devil in war called for extraordinary efforts, so to meet what has sown during his career in war call for unusual efforts.

In no time in the history of the world has there been so much sown of such a variety as was practiced throughout the world during the World War.

The ordinary restrictions placed upon men through the ordinary laws by ordinary men were not sufficient to check the growth of this variety of evil. When I say evil I mean all classes that you read of during and just after the war, from murder and the robbing of our government on down to the many petty thefts and extortions of all kinds. Love had taken its flight on angels' wings back home to heaven. Mercy had become a virtue obsolete and unknown. The devil had used the opportunity to root well Catholicism into all governments and had not exempted our own good Nation. The Jew had used the opportunity in commercial affairs. Homes were being broken up for the want of Love.

What was to be done? Preachers and churches with the law seemed powerless. Preaching love to Satan and his sworn agencies would not accomplish anything any more, it seemed. The Lord quit trying to convert Satan when he cast him out of heaven, and Satan has some agents in the forms of men and women that the Lord does not spend any more time on, especially in ordinary ways. Love and Mercy preached in the ordinary way from heaven would never have taught Germany anything. The extraordinary methods had to be used and America had the class of young men that could do it.

Now will we fathers whose sons have died in foreign lands allow the devil to continue his work upon their good homes and dear families that they will be left behind and die for? We will be scared coward unless we take care of the situation. But the question comes, how? As has just been argued, ordinary means will not do. Extraordinary and extraordinary conditions.

This brings us up to the Klan question. Some of our American

people saw that this was the plan or rather the last resort to save the situation from moral and religious ruin.

Is it not a fact that the Knights of Columbus had preferences during the war that other religious organizations did not have?

Is it not a fact that they (the Knights of Columbus) used funds that were left in their hands at the close of the war to further continue the cause of their order independent of the government?

Is it not a fact that our government does not deal with religious bodies, yet at the same time this order and the mother of it, the Catholic Church, is continually feeling for places to control in our governmental affairs? It is also an undeniable fact that the Jew is endeavoring to lay his hands on the wealth of the world that he may have control to his National glory when he returns to Palestine.

Reader, if you are not aware of these two facts. That the Pope of Rome is endeavoring to rule the world not only religiously but politically as well, and that the Jew is determined to gather up the wealth of the world for his future Nationality in Palestine, you are a little behind the movement of the times. The Pope has never renounced his former claims to rule the world. The Jews have never given up their idea of Nationality and a Messiah yet to come.

These two questions enter into this Klan proposition. Suppose we enumerate some of the things they stand for.

First, they stand for all the principles of Christianity.

Next, they stand for white supremacy.

Third, we may mention, they stand for America and its people first above all other nations and people.

Fourth, to protect our government from the hands and power of religious denomination that is governmental control of public affairs.

Fifth, they stand for the protection of the homes of the people against the common vices of the day. They stand for the enforcement of law and order in the truest sense.

Sixth, they stand for the observance of the Sabbath day and true and perfect submission to the constitution of the United States as it now stands.

Reader, don't you stand for all these? Do you know some people that do not? I do, and they are fighting the Klan, too.

The evil conditions that are and have been for some time so prevalent over the country are consequences of the World War. These conditions have forced upon us, in the judgement of some, the Klan organization. The question that should be discussed is the remedy and not so much the organization. This organization has the principles, but does it have the right means for the remedy? Instead of rising up to kill the Klan we should come with a better remedy and ask for their cooperation. Do

not kill a man who has good intentions but bad plans. Come to his assistance and help him in his intentions and use your judgement for better plans. This is my argument about the Klan. You are bound to be in accord with its principles. If we can not do that, let us keep our mouths shut, especially as long as they are doing the good they are.

If we do not like their plan, and I can not endorse all of it, it is up to us to provide a better one and until we do this, suppose we keep quiet and do not bring this question into our churches, schools, politics and everywhere else. We are face to face with the things they oppose, whether you see it or not. For my part I am in favor of the churches of the country looking after the moral side and the officers looking after the moral side with them. But the power during this war tide in places as well as others, in many instances became toward the evil crowd.

The Klan is not here to judgement. It is an extra institution to meet an extra condition and when that is will have accomplished its end and if continued it will be in different circumstances of meeting the three true American ought to be pure Catholicism, pure Americanism, pure Protestantism, pure Democracy.

## NATIONAL CELEBRATION OF ARMISTICE DAY

IN WASHINGTON IT WILL BE OC-CASION OF SIGNIFICANT CONTRASTS.

### PRESIDENT HARDINGS VIEWS

Thinks Day Should Cause Recogni-tion of Duty of U. S. in Its Foreign Relationship.

Washington—A day of austere sim-plicity, of significant contrasts—this will be Armistice Day, 1922.

Whereas, a year ago, President Harding, accompanied by the most distinguished diplomats of Europe and the Orient, American diplomats, soldiers and distinguished civilians, did homage to the Unknown Dead at Arlington, with oratory and sym-phony, this year, the tribute will be complete in its simplicity.

Accompanied by the Secretary of War and the Navy, the Presi-dent will place a wreath on the Unknown's tomb and will pass the White House across the Potomac River.

This, the President will be a precedent in the memora-tions of the Nation's history.

Whereas a year ago, Presi-dent Wilson, accompanied by the members of the cabinet, the chief officers of the Army and the Navy, and women witnesses, in a procession, this year, the tribute will be complete in its simplicity.

### POINCARÉ OUTLINES WAR DEBTS

Should Not Have Germany Pays Reparations, He Says

Paris.—Premier Poincaré's policy that France should be required to pay her war debts until she collects the war indemnities due her from Germany is unanimously in-dorsed by the Chamber of Deputies.

The Premier received a unanimous vote of confidence after he and de-pu-ties had emphatically declared their policy regarding payment of war loans.

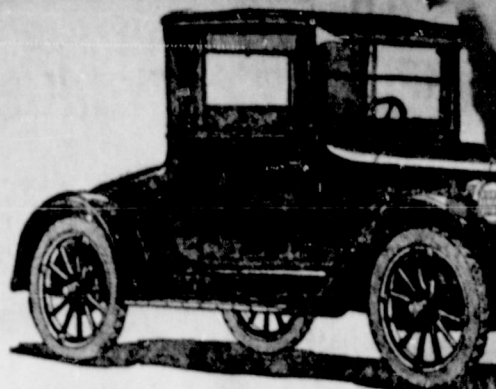
"I will tell the allies," Premier Poincaré declared, "that it is unjust to demand that we pay the war debts contracted in the common cause while we are not paid the reparations due us."

The question of war debts and reparations must be treated together, as they can not be solved otherwise, the French Premier insisted. He intimated that the international com-mittee of bankers headed by J. P. Morgan might be reconvened.

Poincaré's attitude toward the debt question was stated in blunter and more concrete terms by Deputy Le-mire.

"We furnished the blood and the United States the money," he said. "We should repay the United States only what we borrowed previous to her entry into the war. The other loans must be cancelled, especially England's, as it was to our joint in-terest that we furnished the men and the equipment before England was fully mobilized and before the United States entered the war. That must be counted."

Kemal Insisting On Evacuation. Athens.—Detachments of British and French troops have occupied the customs houses at Constantinople. Mustapha Kemal had just previously dispatched a new note insisting that the allies evacuate the Turkish capital. Italian residents were said to be packing preparatory to a hurried departure.

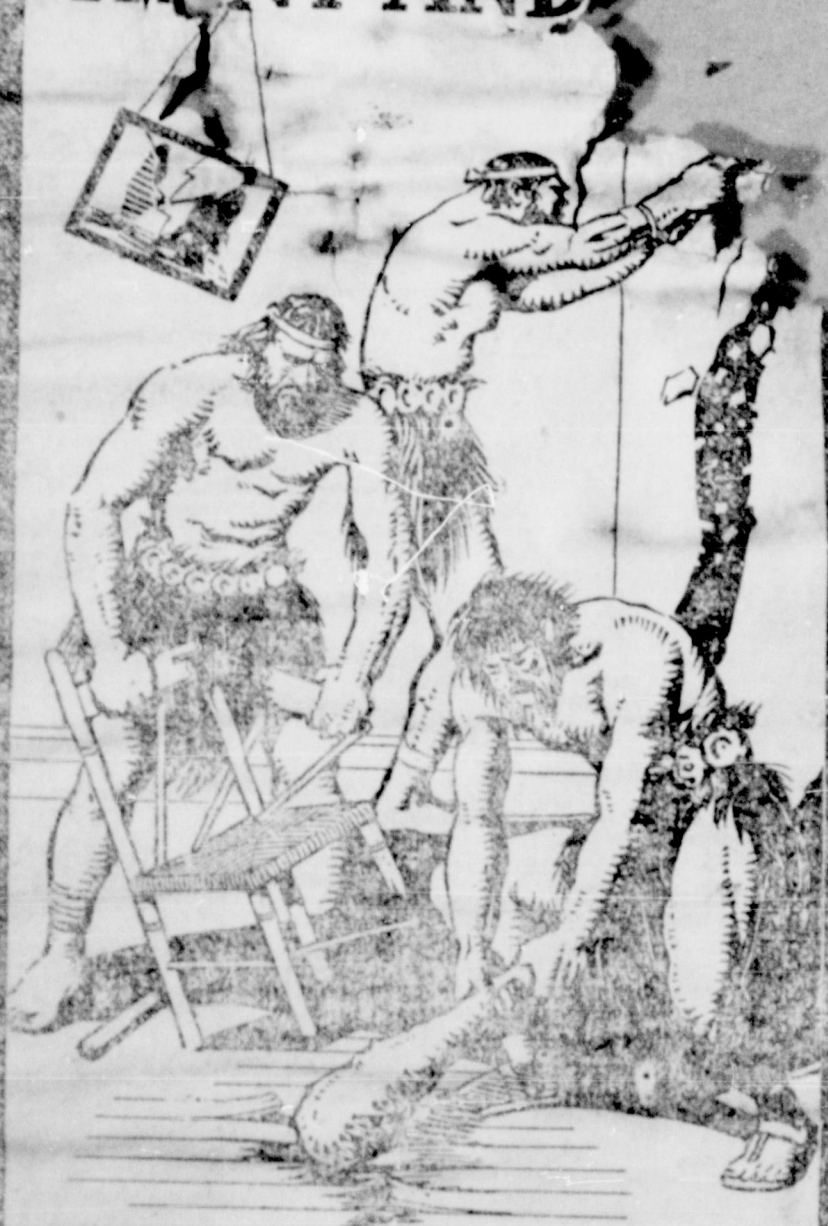
