The Premier received a unantmous vote of confidence after he and deputies had emphatically declared their policy regarding payment of war

"I will tell the allies," Premier Poincare declared, "that it is an inst silk, to demand that we pay the war mix debts contracted in the common spot cause while we are not paid the

The question of war debts reparations must be treated together, as they can not be solved otherwise. the French Premier insisted. He intimated that the international co mittee of bankers headed by J. P. Morgan might be reconvened.

Poincare's attitude toward the debt question was stated in blunter and more concrete terms by Deputy Le-

"We furnished the blood and the United States the money," he said. "We should repay the United States" only what we borrowed previous to her entry into the war. The other loans must be cancelled, especially England's, as it was to our joint is terest that we furnished the men and the equipment before England was fully mobilized and before the United States entered the war. That must be counted.
