Cities Service Oil Company set casing at 6309 feet. The well is producing from the conglomerate formation and a two hour drillstem test on January 14 showed a possible twenty-four hour potential of 456 barrels of oil with no water showing. Bottom hole pressure was 3100 pounds.

Dr. Joe L. Cash, who is in his fourth year as associate professor of English at McNeese University in Lake Charles, Louisiana, has an article appearing in the current issue of "Louisiana English Journal," the official publication of the Louisiana Council of Teachers of English.

Dr. C.M. Byrne, head of the Department of Languages at McNeese, adds that "the

article is an expansion of a paper which Dr. Cash read at the last meeting of the College English Association of America."

Entitled "A Defense for Silas Marner and a New Approach for Teaching the Novel," Dr. Cash's thesis is that English teachers may spend too much time comparing a work like "Silas Marner" to our own century or making it immediately relevant instead of attempting to find more serious and enduring literary themes which do exist in it.

"An archetypal approach to the novel allows the simultaneous teaching of several facets of literary awareness by means of a comparison of 'Silas Marner' with 'Oedipus Rex,'" Dr. Cash said.

Dr. Cash, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ottis Cash, is married to the former Lydia Cone, who teaches sixth grade in the public schools there. They are the parents of two children, Josef, who is almost ten, and Sarah, two.

Joint Election Set By City, School, Hospital

The City of Knox City, the Knox City Independent School District, and the Knox County Hospital District will again hold their respective elections together this year and have set the joint election for Saturday, April 3, in the Community Center. Polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

In the city election, the terms of councilmen L.V. Worley, Celso Gonzales, and Charles Auburg will expire. At this time, none of the incumbents have indicated whether or not they will seek re-election.

Holdover council members are Mayor R. Kenneth Crownover and councilmen A.P. Denton and Vernon Bridges.

City Secretary Faye Rallsback said that any eligible person who desired to file may do so at the City Hall. To be eligible, a person must have resided in the State of Texas the past 12 months and a resident of the city the past six months.

School board members whose terms are expiring are Jerry Benson and Henry Jean Jones.

According to Mrs. Mary Beth Smith, business manager of Knox City Schools, no one has filed as yet.

Holdover members with one year remaining are Allen McGaughey and John L. Grindstaff Jr.

John Crownover, Dr. R.G. Howell, and Doug Meinzer

will serve another two years.

Forms may be picked up at the school from Mrs. Smith for the school election, but all completed applications must be filed with Knox County Judge Sam E. Clonts at Benjamin to be eligible.

In the hospital election, the terms of Richie Smith of Munday and Vernal Zeissel of Rhineland will expire.

Henry Jean Jones of Knox City is the holdover member.

According to hospital administrator, Glen Rumley, no one has filed.

Filing deadline for the hospital election is 25 days prior to the election date.

Anyone wishing to file as a candidate must be 18 years of age or older, must be a registered, qualified voter of

the district, own land subject to taxation by the district, and submit a petition to the secretary of the board, Richie Smith, in Munday. The petition must contain the names of not less than 25 qualified voters residing within the boundary of the hospital district.

Petitions for the positions may be picked up at the Knox County Hospital.

Deadline for filing in the city and school elections is March 3.

Absentee voting by personal appearance will begin March 15 and continue through March 30. Mrs. Rallsback will serve as absentee voting clerk for the city and Mrs. Smith will serve in this capacity for the school.

Dennis Earp, Day Care
Licensing Representative of
Vernon has asked the News to
publish the following release in
the interest of working
mothers and baby sitters.

The new Child Care Act,
Senate Bill 963, states that it
is unlawful for a person to
operate a child care facility
without a license or registra-
tion through the State Depart-
ment of Public Welfare. This
includes those persons who
are caring for or babysitting for
six (6) or fewer children in
their homes, either full-time
or part-time.

Those whose children are
now being cared for at an
unlicensed facility, or a "non-
registered" home, or those
who are caring for unrelated
children in their homes and
have not obtained a license or
registered through the State
Department of Public Wel-
fare, are asked to contact
Mrs. Earp at the Day Care
Licensing Division, Third
Floor Courthouse, Vernon,
Texas 75384. She can give
each working mother a list of
currently licensed child care
facilities in her area, and
unlicensed facilities can obtain
information on how to
"register" or acquire a day
care license.

Eight Accidents Occur In County

COUNTY JUDGES COMMISSIONERS

The 18th annual conference of the County Judges and Commissioners of Texas will deal with issues that are today's problems, such as ambulance service, solid waste disposal and law enforcement. The conference which will be held February 3-5 at Texas A&M University will also feature discussions on national and state legislation, agricultural markets and policy, the state comptroller's office and the Jail Standards Commission, announces a county officials program specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

PRUNING TREES

Improper pruning of trees can be just as bad or worse than not pruning them at all. On the other hand, proper pruning can turn a tree or shrub into a beautiful plant specimen. Ten pointers to consider as far as the pruning operation is concerned are:

1. Do not top trees. Topped trees often die because the topped branches cannot heal, thus letting in decay fungi and bacteria. Also, side branches below topped stubs are usually weaker and are subject to wind damage.

2. Prune at the right season. Prune deciduous trees and shrubs, vines, ground covers and evergreens during the winter. However, an exception is that spring-flowering shrubs such as azaleas, forsythia, bridal wreath and gardenias should be pruned after flowering.

3. Use proper tools. Hand shears can handle twigs under one-half inch in diameter. Long-handled lopping shears are needed for timber one-half to one inch in diameter. Branches larger than one inch in diameter should be cut with a pruning saw.

4. Make all cuts flush with the trunk. Stubs don't heal properly and the decay and deterioration spreads down the trunk of the tree until wind topples it.

5. Seal big cuts with pruning paint. Use pruning paint on cuts larger than one inch in diameter to ward off insects and diseases.

6. Repair damaged plants at once. Plants should be kept healthy year round; this means pruning damaged twigs or branches.

7. Use common sense when pruning. Watch for limbs that may fall over power lines or damage other property.

8. Always prune after transplanting. Pruning is especially important for balled-and-burlapped plants; this compensates for roots lost during digging.

9. Beware of the door-to-door pruner. If you can't

10. Have a reason for pruning. Don't prune just to pass the time of day.

Following these simple guidelines can save many headaches, heartaches and "butchered" plants.

Drivers Should Check Address On License

The Texas Department of Public Safety advises that all Texas drivers should examine their Texas drivers license to verify that the address on their license is correct. If his address is incorrect, it will be necessary to contact the local Drivers License Office as soon as possible. It is a misdemeanor offense for not changing your address within 10 days after moving. This particular law is going to be enforced more strictly in the future. The procedure for changing an address on a license is to have a duplicate license made with a new picture and a one dollar fee.

The Drivers License Law, V.C.S. 6687b, Sec. 20, states that whenever any person after applying for or receiving an Operator's, Commercial Operator's or Chauffeur's license shall move from the address named in such application or in the license issued to him or when the name of the licensee is changed by marriage or otherwise, such person shall within ten (10) days thereafter notify the Department in writing of his old and new addresses or of such former and new names.

of the the number of any license then held by him, and such person shall apply for a duplicate license as set out in section 14.

Section 14 states that in the event that an Operator's, Commercial Operator's or Chauffeur's license issued under the provisions of this Act is lost, destroyed or there is a change in pertinent information, the person to whom the same was issued may obtain a duplicate or correction thereof upon furnishing proof satisfactory to the Department that such permit or license was lost or destroyed or upon the supplying of the required information which has changed, together with proof acceptable to the Department supporting such change, and upon the payment of a fee of one dollar.

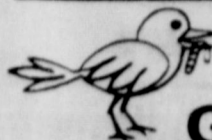

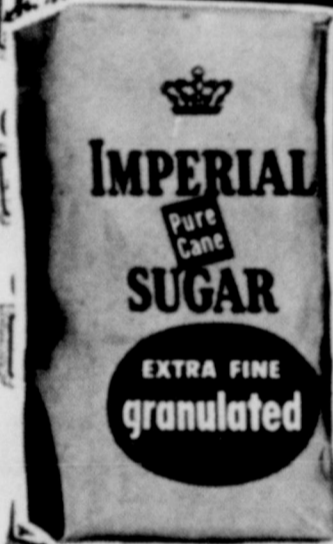
