Alsup Named To **UT Honor Roll**


AUSTIN - Approximately 655 University of Texas engineering students have been recognized as honor students for the spring semester.

Boll weevil diapause programs got underway this week in both Knox and Haskell Counties with an approximate combined 33,000 acres to receive six applications of Crysthyon 2-L crop insecti-

The A-1 Flying Service of Levelland, owned by Don Hogue, had four Piper Pawnees preparing to take off Tuesday afternoon from the Knox City Municipal Airport for the Knox County farms that are participating in the program. About 16,000 acres have been contracted.

a capacity of 400 gallons. Pilots for the New Mexico firm are Paul Powell and Leon Hardwick.

This is also the fifth year for this firm to participate in the boll weevil diapause programs and they have pre-Angelo, Midland, Odessa areas.

The diapause program enables cotton producers to help themselves with matching funds available from the Texas Department of Agriculture. The diapause control program helps farmers to increase production by killing boll weevils before they leave the cotton fields in the fall. thus preventing over-wintering.



PROCLAMATION

Hunting and Fishing Day

Since the turn of the century, hunters and anglers have been the leaders in nearly all major conservation programs. 



Farm-Ranch News BY HERMAN COLLIER

WEATHER AND CROPS

Moisture received was very spotted this past week over Knox County with small scattered areas reporting one to two inches, but in general the majority of the county remains dry

Summertime high temperatures returned the last half of the week and by the weekend grain sorghum harvest was active again. Producers with grain to harvest were glad to see harvesting weather prevail again. As an average Knox County farmers are harvesting a fair grain sorghum crop.

Cotton is opening at a fairly fast rate recently and if hot dry weather hangs around for a while some producers will be considering preparing some dryland fields for harvest soon. Many cotton producers have signed up for the fall cotton boll weevil diapause control spraying program. This program could be of great benefit to Knox County if all producers would participate by greatly decreasing the number of boll weevils going to winter quarters. Some fields were hit early this summer by boll weevils coming out of winter quarters and some of these where early controls were not applied have a very poor crop. There are several fields of fairly good cotton in the county where the insect situation has not gotten out of hand.

KNOX COUNTY HAS BEEN GOOD TO ME

With considerable reluctance, I am transferring from Knox County to Limestone County after serving as your County Agent the past nine and one-half years.

Even though this transfer was asked for there are many reasons I hate to leave. Knox County farmers and ranchers are progressive and do not hesitate to try new crops or practices when they feel there is a possibility to improve. New wheat, grain sorghum, cotton, guar or Irish potatoe varieties developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations, Commercial Companies or Experiment Stations from other states will get a good trial by Knox County producers when they see the varieties have promise. Fertilizer use has increased great'y in the county in recent years with a very high percent of producers fertilizing wheat and grain sorghum.

Producers and other interested persons have been a lot of help in getting result demonstrations established on both field crops and brush control. I am very grateful for their interest and effort they have made to help.

To the many 4-H'ers. parents and other 4-H leaders who have assisted so much, I would like to sincerely thank you for doing so much. I am very proud of the showing 4H'ers have made in our County Junior Livestock Show, County 4-H Horse Show and even district, regional and state shows.




