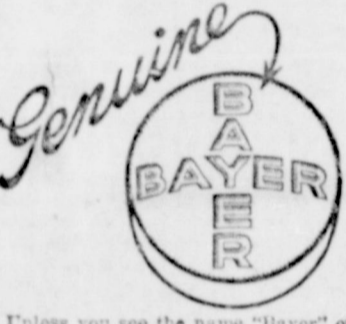

LIQUORS FOR SALE ON SHIPS ILLEGAL

OPINION ON SUBJECT IS RENDERED BY ATTORNEY GENERAL DAUGHERTY.

ALSO AFFECTS FOREIGNERS

Ruling Applies to Alien Ships as Well as to Those of the Shipping Board.

Washington. — All vessels, American or foreign owned, are prohibited from having liquor on board in American territorial waters under an interpretation of the prohibition amendment and the enforcement act, handed down by the Department of Justice. Moreover, the transportation or sale of intoxicants on American craft, wherever operated, was held to be inhibited.

American territorial waters were construed to include those not only within the three-mile limit of continental United States but also those within the same limit of the Philippines, the Hawaiian Islands, Porto Rico, the Virginians and Alaska.

The law would not apply in the Panama Canal Zone as that zone is specifically exempted by the statute itself.

So far as American ships are concerned the sale or transportation of liquor will cease at once, or as soon as those vessels reach their home ports. In the case of foreign ships, the decision will become operative as soon as the necessary regulations can be prepared and promulgated by the Treasury Department.

Court action looking to a final determination of the application of American dry laws to foreign ships entering American ports was foreseen by both Attorney General Daugherty and Chairman Lasker of the Shipping Board.

Chairman Lasker was of the opinion that the first move of foreign lines would be to seek an injunction restraining the Government from enforcing the law. He said it was reasonable to suppose that the courts would grant such an injunction with a result that foreign ships would continue to arrive with liquor on board until there was a final decision by the highest court.

Publication of the opinion of the Department of Justice followed a White House conference to which President Harding summoned Mr. Daugherty, Secretaries Hughes and Mellon and Chairman Lasker.

In a divided opinion the court confirmed the authority of prohibition agents to prevent such a transfer and, in the view of the Attorney General, went so far as to hold.

Eighteenth amendment and the Volstead act repealed a prior existing treaty with Great Britain.

RAIL SHOPMEN FAIL IN COURT PROCEEDURE

Strikers Lose in Technical Maneuvers Against Injunction.

Chicago, Ill. — Attorneys for the striking railroad shopmen failed in two technical maneuvers against the Daugherty injunction in Federal Judge Wilkerson's court.

Judge Wilkerson overruled a motion for a bill of particulars in the injunction suit and refused to grant the shopmen's request that he pronounce the case one of "extraordinary public importance" so that three Circuit Court Judges might be appointed to hear it immediately. The court declared it had no jurisdiction on such a request.

Both the motion and the request had been made by Donald R. Rieberg, counsel for the shopmen. Rieberg also filed the formal answer of the shopmen to the Government's petition to have the strike injunction made permanent. The answer denied the Government's charges in detail and alleged that the railroads themselves had conspired to force the strike.

Blackburn Easterline, Assistant Solicitor General, declared he would in due time ask that a master in chancery hear the evidence. In order to expedite final disposition of the case, "Attorney General Daugherty is simply playing for time" was Rieberg's answer to the recent declaration of Solicitor General James M. Beck, that the Attorney General "would be very glad to expedite an appeal to the United States Supreme Court."

Turks Fire on U. S. Destroyer.

London—Reuter's has received the following from a semi-official source in Athens: "According to the newspapers an American destroyer engaged in embarking refugees at Alvali was bombarded by the Turkish gun-boat, north of Smyrna, opposite Mytilene."

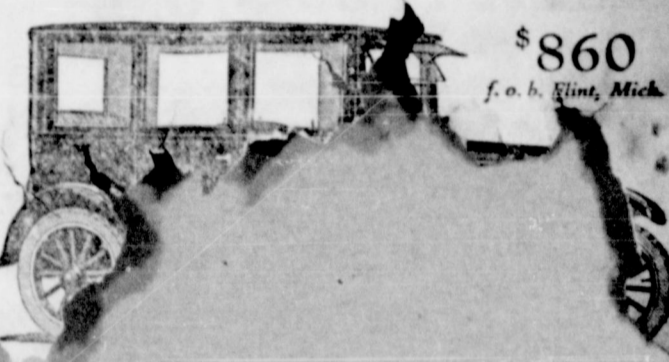



Geo. Peddy is reported to have said in a campaign speech that nine-tenths of the bootleggers of the country belonged to the klan. In another campaign speech he is reported to have said that Earle Mayfield is the best klansman on earth, and that should Mayfield deny that he is a member of the klan he (Peddy) could produce 100 affidavits within fifteen minutes from as honorable men as there are in the state of Texas, swearing that they had sat beside Mayfield in klan meetings. If Mayfield is the best klansman on earth, and if those representing the klan are as honorable men as there are in the state, why is Mr. Peddy bolting the Democratic ticket and asking the voters of the state to do likewise and thus scratch the name of an honorable man in the November election and give their support to him for U. S. Senator? But it is our prediction that the Texas Democracy will show them on November 7th, even if we do have to write the name of our candidate on the ticket.

A Timely Sermon.

Rev. J. W. Hawkins, pastor of the Methodist Church, preached a very interesting sermon last Sunday night. This was a special sermon on topics that should interest everyone who is concerned in the welfare of the young people, and especially those who are vitally concerned in the spiritual welfare of the rising generation. The preacher discussed various things that can be made an influence for good or bad upon the young people of today, and some things that can only be an influence for bad. He impressed the fact upon his hearers that they—each one of us as citizens of the town—are responsible for the influence that these things will have, and that it was no more nor less than our duty and for our own better welfare as well as the welfare of the boys and girls of the community that we see to it that these things that can be made an influence for good are taken advantage of, and that all conditions that have a bad influence be remedied. It was a timely sermon and should be given due consideration.

Ordinance No 16

Be it Ordained by the board of Commissioners of the town of Knox City, Texas:

First, that each person or persons within the corporate limits of said town, owning dogs, shall pay an annual tax of \$1.00 per head on male dogs and \$2.00 per head on female dogs.

Second, that all STRAY dogs found running at large within the corporate limits of said town shall be impounded and, if not claimed by owner within days from date of impounding, the animal shall be killed.

Third, that penalty for refusal to pay above mentioned tax shall be a fine imposed upon the owner of aforesaid animal of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$10.00.

E. L. Covey Delivers Lecture to Knox City High School.

Mr. E. L. Covey of Goree gave the fifth series of vocational lectures last Tuesday morning, discussing the field of journalism as a vocation. Mr. Covey has made a success in this business for a number of years, and is experienced along this line. He explained to us that the work is interesting as well as beneficial to the schools, community and country. His lecture was clear and interesting. We enjoy these talks and they are a help to boys and girls who are to choose a life's

You are urged to see these grades and your co-operation is solicited by his teachers.

If your child is failing or not coming up to your expectations each teacher would appreciate an opportunity to co-operate with you in securing better work.

Steps are being taken to publish copies of the by-laws and regulations of the school board, so that every one interested in the school shall have a chance to read them.

In these regulations there has been a ruling made that no teacher should keep a child in over forty five minutes after school. So when your child does not return home after a reasonable amount of time, do not blame the teachers, for he has loitered along the way.

Faculty meetings are held two weeks on Monday nights. The teachers are taking a study course which is helping them in their work, and giving them ideas on school supervision. "Friday night they studied 'Methods in Reading.' They will take up the study of the new system later, so that the teachers throughout the county will be more uniform in grading.

Mr. E. L. Covey of Goree, who was with us Tuesday morning, was asked to talk to the Editorial Staff. He explained fully the duties of each member and encouraged the staff in their work. He said it was no secret over the county that Knox City was putting herself on the map. We were made to feel proud of our school and work when he told us of a remark he had heard made on the streets of a certain town. Now patrons, we will tell you, provided it doesn't make you "dizzy" or "giddy-headed," for we received the news in a very appreciative manner. In reading the county school paper the remark was made that Knox City was surely doing her part in contributing news. "Well, you can just count on it that whatever Knox City school enters she is sure to make a success of it."

Last week there was a subscription contest in the interest of our county school paper between classes of the High School. The Seniors and Sophomores, who were working against the Juniors and Freshmen, won. A unique social was given in the basement of the Methodist Church Saturday night by the defeated classes, and was thoroughly enjoyed by every member of High School. A full account of this contest and social will be given in the county school paper.

The report cards for this school term are somewhat different from any previously used by the school. The cover is attractively designed, featuring a picture of the main building. The second page is arranged to contain six reports, each report covering a period of six weeks. In

addition to this record there is to be added on page three a report on attitude toward school work, recitation and general conduct. This will be in the nature of a complete diagnosis of any trouble the child may be experiencing with school work. The motive of this is to keep the parent informed as to the work and attitude of the child in every respect. When these cards are given out you are earnestly requested to examine the report and to consult the teacher in charge about unsatisfactory grades so that the matter may be more readily adjusted.

The Korean prophet, Chyong Kam, whose writings have been preserved in the ancestral mausoleum of the one-time imperial family of Korea, long ago prophesied that Mount Kelyong would be chosen as the religious center of the sect which he founded and of the peninsula. His prophecy has recently been given great publicity. It is reported, and thousands of Koreans are flocking to the mountain, firm in their belief that it is to be one of the greatest cities of the world and that they are "getting in on the ground floor."

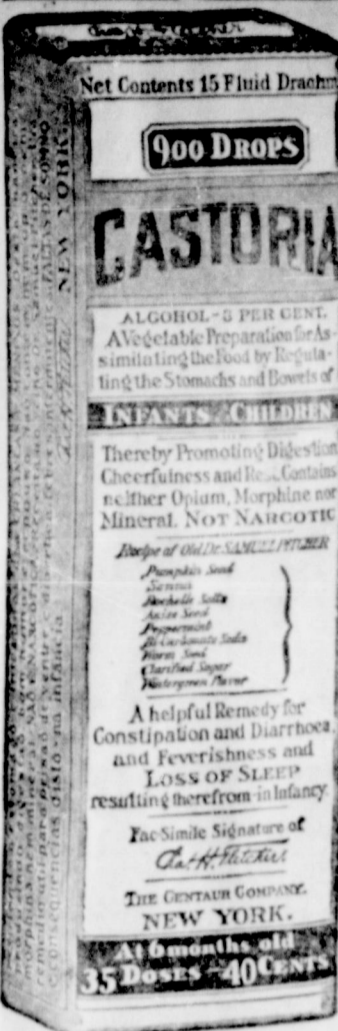

According to the forthcoming report of the Attorney General only seven death penalties and eighteen life sentences were imposed in Texas during the two years ending Aug. 31 last. The data is collected by the Attorney General from the various county offices for publication in his biennial report.

In his charge to the grand jury at the opening of the October term of the Travis County Criminal District Court, Judge James R. Hamilton called special attention to the offenses of bootlegging, gambling, wife or child desertion, pandering, prostitution, adultery and slurring or procuring of innocent girls on joy rides for wrong purposes.

The purpose thereof reads: "To bring together the white female, Protestant American-born of the United States for the purpose of encouraging and cultivating religious spirituality, to help the unfortunate, to encourage observance, respect for citizenship, the Church, the flag, the Constitution, the land, the active participation in the enforcement of the law and the channels of the law."
