Junior Livestock Show To Be Held Here Saturday

Final plans were completed last week for the Knox County Junior Livestock Show, which will be held in Knox City this Saturday, February 14.

The show will be held in the cotton warehouse, which is west of the south signal light. Judging will begin at 1:30 p. m.

According to County Agent W. C. Pailmeyer, classes will be set up for milk fed steers, fat lambs, boars, sows, gilts, barrows, and sow and litter.

Judge of the show will be J. A. Schofield of Vernon, district extension agent.

Exhibitors and families will be treated to the noon meal by the Knox County Farm Bureau in conjunction with the Knox City Lions Club, which is presenting the show. For the second year, the show is being jointly sponsored by all communities in the county.

Showmanship awards will be presented to the showmanship winners in the steer, lamb and swine classes. A halter will be presented to the top showman of beef calves, and belts will be presented to the top showmen of both lambs and swine. These gifts are being awarded by the Farm Bureau.

All animals must be in place by 11:00 a. m. and all steers, lambs and fat barrows weighed to determine class. Present indications are that 13 steers, six lambs and 30 swine will be entered.

After the judging is completed, animals will be selected for the Wichita Falls, Amarillo and Abilene Shows.

Prizes being offered in all classes of the show total about \$400.00.

First game will be played tomorrow (Friday) night. The second game is scheduled for Monday night, Feb. 16, and the third, if necessary, for Wednesday, Feb. 18. The first two games will start at 7:45 with the third at 8:45 p. m.

O'Brien completed its regular conference schedule with an undefeated record, while Knox City lost only two games, both to O'Brien. The three game playoff decides the conference championship.

The Greyhounds defeated Vera last Thursday night, and Friday night on the local court, they wound up the regular season by defeating Rochester, 42-32.

Teachers Oppose Shivers' Plan for Salary Hike

County School Superintendent Merick McLaughlin, Supt. S. E. Reed of Benjamin and Supt. J. B. Lawson of Goree were in Wichita Falls Saturday to hear a report on the progress of school legislation that is before the state legislature at Austin.

The meeting was held at the Wichita Falls High School, and the report was given by Bob Proffer of Denton, state president of the Texas State Teachers Association.

The association, and individual teachers, are strongly opposing Gov. Shivers plan to give the teachers a cost-of-living increase, to be paid for by reshuffling existing school revenues in such a manner as to put a greater part of the cost of education on local school districts. The plan, embodied in House Bill 3, is also meeting opposition in the legislature because it would result in increased local school taxes.

Contending that the plan would not raise enough money to meet their needs, the teachers are backing House Bill 24, which would in effect provide a \$600 yearly across-the-board raise for all teachers and administrators. A companion bill, Senate Bill 216, proposes the way to raise the money. The \$33,000,000 to \$34,000,000 increase in state funds was not included in the budget message of Gov. Shivers or of the legislative budget board.

According to the TSTA, Gov. Shivers' plan would have the effect of increasing taxes in the Knox City school district by about \$2,400 a year, in the Benjamin district by about \$2,100, and in the Munday district by \$3,000.

Benjamin Church Members Staging Attendance Contest

The Sunday School of the First Christian Church at Benjamin has been divided into two sides, the "Reds" and the "Blues", and one of the most talked-about contests in the history of the congregation is underway, according to the minister, Karel Desgrange.

Jack Idol is captain of the Reds and Mrs. Lee Snallum is captain of the Blues. Each side can receive points in the following ways: one point for each one present at the morning, evening and prayer meeting services; one point for each chapter read; ten points for the side that answers two out of three questions from the assigned chapters; twenty-five points for every chapter that is memorized from the New Testament and quoted before the congregation.

Mrs. Herbert Sams also quoted I Corinthians 13, and Mrs. Desgrange gave Ephesians 6."

The contest will end May 1. The minister invited everyone who does not worship elsewhere to attend the Benjamin church. Sunday School is held at 10 a. m., communion and morning worship at 11 a. m., and evening services at 7 p. m.

Tank battery is being set for the Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 1-B L. W. Graham, and operators are preparing to drill plug for completion. The Palo Pinto reef was topped at 4214 in this well, and good porosity was found in the top of the formation. The hole was bottomed at 4314.

It is also reported that operators will set casing and acidize the Urice Drilling Co. No. 1 Vernon Buckley, a mile and a half north of town. The reef was topped at about 4228 and the hole was bottomed at 4305. Tests from 4,228-48 found the formation fairly tight.

Location has been readied for Stanolind's No. 2-B J. V. Denton, 2 1-2 miles northeast of town, and it is reported the rig will move from the Graham well to this location.

Pumping unit is being set on the Thos. D. Humphrey & Sons No. 3 Mary A. Bush, wildcat 7 miles west of town. Production will be from the upper Strawn, where substantial oil shows were found on tests.
