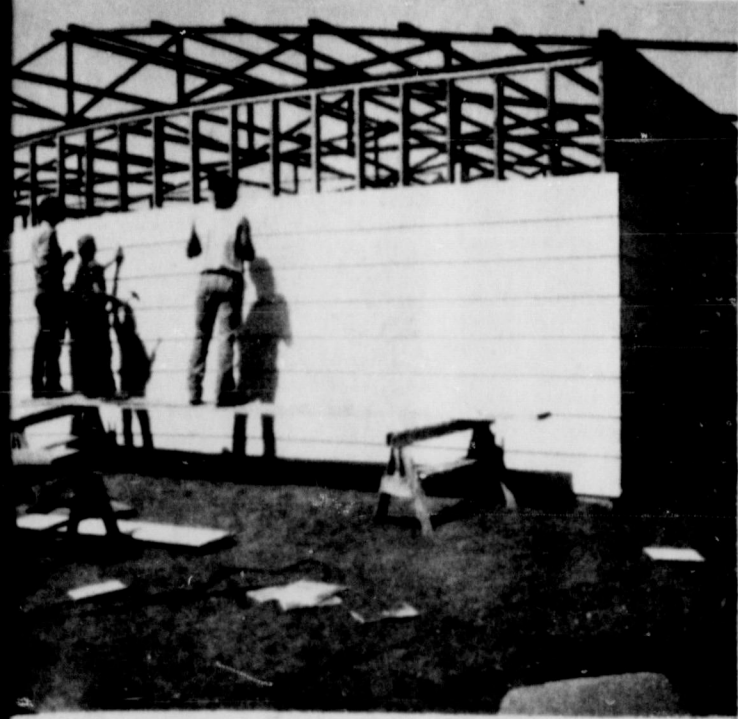

Buford Wright, local manager for Lone Star Gas Company, received word last weekend of a two car, head-on crash that took the lives of his grandmother, Mrs. Delia Wright, 90, his uncle, John Dewey Belcher, 55, and a cousin, Joe David Belcher, 22, all of Stephenville. His aunt, Mrs. Opal Belcher, suffered facial cuts and was reported in satisfactory condition late Sunday.

The tragic crash occurred about 2 p.m. Sunday six miles northeast of Stephenville on U.S. 377.

Only occupant of one of the cars, Billy Yarborough-Brown, 45, was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace S.W. Miller.

Investigating Highway Patrolman Fred Cummings of Stephenville said that apparently one of the vehicles was in the wrong lane, and that no skid marks were left by either car. The car driven by Brown was west bound and the Belcher car was heading east at the time of the collision.

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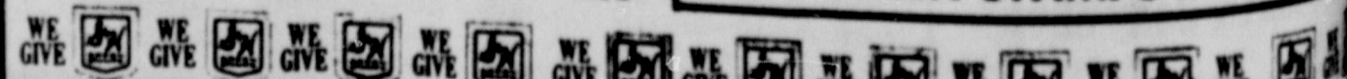
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# Knox City Businesses Make Improvements

Times change! So do business trends and methods of operation.

Knox City is moving forward and several businesses in Knox City have made changes in their operations. Some are the obvious ones such as the remodeling in Jones Drug, and some are not so immediately obvious, such as the computerized ordering at Bob's Super Save and the newly installed computer at the Citizens State Bank.

The News plans to run a series during the summer, as space permits, featuring businesses which have made recent improvements and changes.

In the grocery business, innovations have decreased the time lapse between the placing of an order and its delivery from weeks to hours.

In the "good old days" of cracker barrels, pickle barrels, and licorice sticks, when "drummers" got off the train, "worked" the town, and left on the next train, the grocerman could expect delivery of the merchandise he ordered to take from several weeks to several months.

This was a considerable improvement, however, over trading post days when supplies were hauled in by freight wagons on very infrequent and uncertain intervals due to the vicissitudes of weather, oxen and mule health, and Indian tempers.

When Bob Harrison, owner of Bob's Super Save, went into the grocery business in Jayton in 1953, salesmen arrived by car with their order pads in hand. The ordering process was lengthy and tiring for both salesman and store owner. It involved going through the store shelf by shelf and then through the storeroom by Harrison and the salesman. If an empty space was found on the shelves, Harrison had to rely on memory to determine what item had been sold out.

The salesmen worked on commission and so urged some unneeded products on their customers in order to enlarge the size of the order and thus their commission. There was also a great deal of haggling over prices so the price each grocerman paid for the merchandise he bought was dependent to some degree on his "horse tradin' "

ability. After spending from five to six hours walking the store making the order, the grocerman could expect delivery of the merchandise to take from five to seven days, after the salesman mailed the order to the warehouse.

In 1960, the ordering system was improved when salesmen began using an itemized order book which listed by number and name items available to the grocerman from the warehouse. It also listed the price of each item on the order book so that the same price was paid by every grocerman. However, this system still required some five to six hours to make out the order. The merchandise was delivered in from three to four days instead of from five to seven days, but still many items ordered would not be sent as the warehouse would be out of stock.

Today, thanks to the marvels of computer and communications systems, grocermen like Bob Harrison can make out their order in approximately two hours, dial a phone number in Fort Worth, send the order in fifteen seconds by computer tape, and the groceries will be delivered as ordered to his store within 15 hours.

This astonishing operation begins in Bob's each Monday when Amador Gonzales or Smiley Barrios dons the MSI Source 2100 Order Entry System computer-recorder, and begins the tour of the shelves in the store. On the shelves, in front of each item, is listed the number and name of the item which belongs in that particular spot on the shelves. A certain amount of each item is kept on the shelves and when this amount runs low, more is ordered.

When the tour of the store is completed, the storeroom is checked. If the stock in the storeroom shows that more or less of an item is needed, that amount is added or subtracted on the computer tape, erasing the previous total.

This amazing little computer is also programmed so that it is virtually impossible to make an error on the order. When a wrong number sequence of an item is pushed, a light indicates an error and the number will not record on the tape.

To deter any would-be thieves, the recorder also has an identification code built in so any tapes sent off it gives the code which identifies the owner.

On completion of the order, Harrison dials the number of the master computer in Fort Worth. His store is scheduled so this call is to be made prior to 3 p.m. Monday. On reaching the number in Fort Worth, several beep tones indicate the computer is ready to receive the order, and the phone is placed in a transmitting unit which is hooked up to the computer-recorder. A button is pushed on the computer-recorder, and the week's order of groceries is transmitted in approximately 15 seconds - a matter of one quarter of a minute.

When the tape transmission ends, Harrison picks up the phone, the computer signals by a tone code that it has received the order, and Harrison hangs up the phone. Without one word having been spoken, some 400 cases of groceries have been ordered with delivery expected at 7 a.m. the next morning!!

To accomplish this feat, more computer and communication system magic is needed. The master computer in

Fort Worth, in its turn, transmits Bob's order to the warehouse in Lubbock, having first unscrambled the order so that the items wanted are listed in the order in which they are located on the aisles at the giant warehouse in Lubbock. The computer also rescrambles the order so that it appears on the invoice as it was sent from Bob's.

The master computer in Fort Worth is also hooked up to computers of the major companies so that each order

sheet which is a record sent quarterly to each store showing all items bought by the store. The report lists each item order, how many of each item was ordered, and when it was ordered, the cost of the item, percentage of profit on each item, and percentage of the total volume sold by the store this item represents. From the velocity sheets, Harrison can determine what items are selling best and which are not selling well, and so can determine whether to keep or discontinue an item or replace it with a more current and salable item.

Harrison reports that plans are being made to set up a computerized inventory and bookkeeping system next year.

What's in the future? More fantastic things!

Electric eyes, installed in counter tops at checkout stands, will read universal coded figures on grocery items, ring up the item on a cash register pre-programmed to register a certain amount for that one coded item. Also, while it rings up the item being sold, the cash register will automatically re-order the item. Harrison said

this system is already being tried in large urban stores, but because of the cost of the equipment needed, it is not feasible for small town stores.

The Harrisons, Bob and Bobbie, who farmed at Jayton prior to entering the grocery business there, came to Knox City in 1962. In the interim, they had also owned and operated a grocery store at Rochester. The location of their first store in Knox City was at the corner of Central and Main. They moved to their present location next door to the post office in July 1970.

In 1955, while at Jayton, the Harrisons became the parents of a son, Rob. Now a student at Dallas Institute of Mortuary Science, Rob is a 1973 graduate of Knox City High School.

Since moving to Knox City, both Bob, a native of Jayton, and Bobbie, who was born and reared at Spur, have been very active in the civic affairs of their "home town", with Bob's being a past president of the Knox City Chamber of Commerce. His wife, who in addition to being active in the store, has been a member of several clubs, is a talented china painter.

### Changes Due In SS Checks

Three separate changes will take place July 1 which will affect the amount of Social Security checks received in July, according to Kenneth R. King, Social Security Branch Manager in Vernon. These changes will result in increased benefits for most people.

The first of these changes is an automatic 4% increase which most social security beneficiaries will receive. This is the final step in an 11% two-part increase passed by Congress last year. The first step of 7% was included in April 3 checks.

People who also receive the new Supplemental Security Income benefits would normally notice a decrease in their Supplemental Security checks equal to the amount of the increase in their regular Social Security check. However, also starting in July is an increase in Supplemental Security benefits of \$6.00 for an individual or \$9.00 for a couple who are both on the rolls. This will largely offset any decrease due to the Social Security raise.

The final change in July is in the cost of the medical insurance part of Medicare. This cost will increase for most people by 40 cents per month - from \$6.30 to \$6.70. This increase will be deducted

from the checks of persons receiving checks who have Medicare.

These three changes combined may make it difficult for many persons to predict exactly how much they will receive in July. The computations are being done automatically by computer in Social Security headquarters and it is not necessary to apply in any way to receive the increased benefits. It is suggested that persons who have questions about the amount they receive in July wait until they have received their second check for the new amounts, in August, before contacting the Social Security Office in order for all necessary changes to be completed. Persons who normally receive a Social Security or Supplemental Security check but whose check has not come by the sixth of the month, should as always, notify the Social Security Office.
