ROAD WORK UNDER NEW COMMISSIONER PROGRESSING NICELY

This will very likely be the last public demonstration on terracing for this section of the County for this year and for this reason, we want all persons that are interested in saving their soil to be present on Saturday morning.

A bill has passed the legislature and has been signed by Governor Moody, which reorganizes district courts in our section. In the reorganization bill the counties of Dickens and Motley are taken off the 50th District and are combined with Floyd and Briscoe to make up the 110th Judicial District.

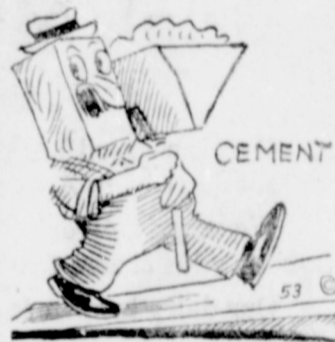

Determination of Number of Rooms

The room count is based upon the ordinary real estate rating, and in making the count, alcoves, unfurnished attics, bathrooms, cellars, hallways, laundries, closets, pantries, open porches, garages, barns and outbuildings will not be included. Premises with less than three rooms, real estate rating; will be classed as 3-room premises; those with more than seven rooms will be rated as 7-room premises.
