Mr, Mann said that after taking the presidency of the North Dako'a association, he sent out questionnaires from which he learned that 75 percent of the merchants of that state did not advertise and that ten per cent advertised only because they wanted to help out their local papers.

At the same time, he said, the mail order houses were sending 72 carloads of catalogus into the state and it was reported by wholesale houses that 72 per cent of the merchants were insolvent. He said he took up a crmpaign to induce the country merchants to go on a cash basis and to advertise, and he has succeeded in bringing 200 of them around to his sys-





Seniority Again Blocks Efforts to Settle the Railway Shopmen's Strike.

Next Dose of Treacherous Drug Illinois Miners Resume Work and Passes Coal Commission Bill -Senate Acts Swiftly on Soldiers' Bonus-Slaying of Michael Collins.

S ENIORITY rights were still blocking a settlement of the railway shopmen's strike as last week drew to close, and though peace efforts were ntinued, their success was worse than problematical in view of the uncompromising stand of both sides on the chief point in dispute. On Wednes-day the Association of Railway Executives, by a vote of 254 to 4, rejected the proposal of the chiefs of the brotherhoods, acting as mediators, that the strikers be reinstated with seniority unimpaired. The brothergood leaders, after conferring with heads of other rail unions, suggested the possibility of separate agreements with the railroads, and the executives said they would test the sincerity of this proposal, but with the distinct inderstanding that any individual settlement would have to conform to the understanding of seniority reached nt the general session of the execu-tives. Most of the railroads also refuse to agree to take back all of the strikers, as consistently demanded by

Bert M. Jewell, spokesman for the strikers, was pessimistic as to a peacement saying:

Mexican Official Intimates He Was Duped Into Crossing the



### Condensed Austin News

The State Board of Control awarded contracts for a new power house at the Southwestern Insane Asylum near San Antonio.

No bills were returned by the Grayson County grand jury at Denison according to Assistant Attorney General Clifford L. Stone, who returned to Austin after having represented the State authorities before the grand jury.

While in Austin State Senator W. R. Cousins of Beaumont, saw the Governor and urged the executive to make a public statement saying that he will recommend to the Legislature that it make an appropriation out of the general revenue fund to supple ment the available school fund to the end that the amount for the coming scholastic session shall be \$14

Governor Neff says that he is going to get the best man possible to go on the Railroad Commission when Earle B. Mayfield resigns to become United States Senator. Mr. Mayfield will take his seat in Washington on March 4, next, but said that he did not know when he would resign as Railroad Commissioner. ...

The Railroad Commission has just adopted blanks for annual reports by the railroads for the first time since it made peace with the Interstate Commerce Commission. In the letter of transmissal it is stated that the forms are exactly like those supplied by the Interstate Commission, with additional pages for purely State

Dr. J. A. Udden, director of the Bureau of Economic Geology and Tech-nology at the University of Texas, has returned from a two months' visit to Norway, having spent some time at Christiana. He says Norway is abou half as large as Texas and does not possess nearly the rescurces of this State, yet its geological mi away ahead of those of t

According to the Co port which has just be total number of acres n printed the total number of acre ed for taxes in Texas 1652,06,017 acres, val 687,740, an increase of 639 acres and in value of \$33,240,087. Sor this year there is a general decrease in the total valuation of the State.

Of the 148 cases which have been filed in the Court of Criminal Appeals since summer adjournment on June 23, 55 involve violations of the State liquor laws. All of these con-victions were under the Dean law and include charges of possession of fquor, manufacture and transportation of liquor. Fourteen murder cases have been filed and in eight cases oriminal assault in charged.

### TRYING TO CUT DOWN EXPENSES OF THE U. S.

Conferences To That End Are to Be Held in Many Large Cities Shortly.

New York .- Conferences are to be held shortly in about a dozen of the principal cities of the country with a view to enlisting representative men and women in a movement to keep down Government expenses, curtail expenditures by Congress and avoid the imposing of new taxation, according to an announcement made by he National Budget Committee which John T. Pratt is chairman, and which has planned the meetings.

The first of the conferences will be held in Boston, on Sept. 25, and the details are being arranged by Mrs. Francis L. Higginson, state chairman for Massachusetts, and Frederick S. Whitewell, chairman for the city of Boston. Representatives from all of the New England States will attend the Boston conferences. It will be followed on dates to be announced later, by conferences in Cleveland, Chicago, Kansas City, Minneapolis, Seattle, Los Angeles, New Orleans Atlanta, Richmond, Va. and New York.

Prohibition Vote In Sweden. Stockholm .- With half the returns counted, the total shows a vote of 550,753 against prohibition and 432. 663 in favor of it. Incomplete re turns in the referendum on the question of prohibition indicate strong tendency against prohibition. It was a day of great excitement throughout Sweden. In all the big cities the squares were crowded by thousands of people awaiting the result.
