The plan, which begins in ebruary, 1972, expands the ne-year-old program which llowed high school students to attend technical training courses in public community olleges within driving distance of their home district.

During the 1970-71 school year, 452 high school students studied 15 different occupations in nine community colleges. Their job skills range from auto mechanics to cosmetology, date processing to sign paint-

Under the expansion plan authorized by the 62nd Legisla. ture, high school students will be able to attend similar classes in private colleges and trade or technical schools. The updated program also allows students to transfer from one public school district to another offering technical programs not available at home.

Schools offering the courses ust comply with state guideines on class size, teacher ertification, and facilities, All lasses must be offered during egular school hours.

Once the contract is approved by the Texas Education Agency. tate funds totaling a maximum \$390 per student will be released to the home school district to cover the cost of the course. During the first year, the cost totaled \$264 per

## **Rules For** Garbage And Trash Disposal

Every occupant shall provide metal containers, not less than 20 gallons nor more than 32 gallons. The combined weight of the container and contents shall not exceed 100 pounds.

Containers shall have lifting handles on the outside and tight fitting lids. Such lids shall be removed only to fill or empty containers.

Containers that have deteriorated or have been damaged to the extent of having jagged edges capable of causing injury must be disposed of. If not replaced, they will be confiscated.

Garbage and trash cans shall be placed adjacent to the alley. Collectors will not service containers within fences, unless they can be easily removed without going inside. In no event will collectors go into buildings, garages, breezeways, carports, or other structures to make collections.

Trash that cannot be put into regulation containers shall be placed in disposable containers or bundled and placed in orderly stacks adjacent to the alley. Tree limbs will not exceed 10 feet and no limb or stump shall exceed 50 pounds. Grass and hedge trimmings must be put in disposable containers.

Rock, dirt, concrete, brick, tile, plaster, scrap building materials, or other trash resulting from general clean-up or sizeable amounts of trees, brush, or debris cleared from property will not be removed by the City. Anyone hiring a contractor or other person to trim or prune his trees or shrubs must have the trimmings and debris removed at his own expense.


Garbage and trash mixed with water or other liquids must be drained thoroughly before being put in containers. All garbage subject to decomposition must be bagged or wrapped in paper before being deposited in garbage containers.

Every occupant whose containers are not emptied for a period of seven days, must notify the City Secretary of this fact.

Dogs, cats, or other dead animals shall not be placed in garbage containers.

Upon notice, the City will provide pick-up service.



### Control Peach Tree Borer

Knox County peach tree owners who plan to use Paradichlorobenzene Crystals for controlling the peach tree borer should make plans to treat the trees between October 20 and November 15, according to County

Agent Herman H. Collier. The Paradichlorobenzene crystals should be put down when the soil is dry and soil temperature is 55 degrees ? or above, Remove weeds, loosen and level soil about 1 foot from the tree trunk, Place PDB crystals in a narrow circular band, preferable in a groove about 2 inches from the trunk. Place several shovels of clean coil over the crystals and mound the earth into a cone-shaped pile about 6 inches high around the base of the tree, Avoid pushing any of the material against the tree since crystals n cause injury. Compact the

soil with the back of the shovel. Remove the earth mounds early in the spring. For 2 and 3 year old trees use 1/2 ounce of crystals; 4 to 5 year old trees 3/4 ounce and for mature

trees 1 ounce. The time of year as mentioned above for the application is very important says Collier.

A) Records should be kept as long as they are material in administering any Federal tax law. As a general rule, the IRS may assess additional tax or you may claim a refund within three years of the tax. due date of a return. Therefore, any record you might need to support an item listed

Naturally, you will want to keep some records longer. For example, records on the purchase of a home or the acquisition of stock should be kept turn? longer, because they will be needed for your tax return when the assets are sold or exchanged.

He was honored earlier this year when the Minnie Stevens Piper Foundation of



ARMYWORM INFESTATION Large infestations of fall armyworms are present in field, ranges and lawns in Knox County. These larvae attack grain sorghum, corn, small grains and grasses as well as alfalfa, peas and beans. The large numbers of fall armyworms are a result of the cool, wet weather which was experienced during August

and September. Damage by the fall armyworms is generally heaviest in fields and lawns that are in a lush green growing condition. The larval stage lasts about 20 days during which time the larvae feed continuously, There may be several generations in one year.

Insecticidal control of fall armyworms is accomplished most efficiently when fall armyworms are small. Several applications of insecticides may be required to control larger larvae, Chlordane, Carbaryl (Sevin) or Toxaphene sprays may be used on lawns, Carbaryl, Methyl Parathion or Parathion may be used on small grains, Label instructions found on the containers should be followed.

HOG CHOLERA NOT ERADICATED YET

Worried about proving your age? Social security manager Vernon, Wayne Klipping, said the people at your social security office may be able to help when you make your claim. There are some things you can do ahead of time. If you were born in a state that kept birth records when you were born, write for your birth certificate. If the state where you were born wasn't keeping birth records at the time, the next best thing is a baptismal rec-

If you were baptized before age 5, you'll be asked to find out if there s a record. If there is, it is all the proof of age you'll need.

If you have no birth or baptismal record, the people working in the social security office will be happy to suggest some other possibilities. Some examples are an old family Bible. school records and federal census records.

You may not recall now, but when you bought your marriage license you gave your age, You may also have some old insurance policies about the house. The list of proofs to try is quite long. When you file your claim, it helps if you have already found the oldest thing ou can that shows your age. Usually, the older the record the better it is for proving your age, It will help the people at the social security office pay you your benefits sooner if you think ahead on your age. were the three leading appliances inspected which were emitting carbon monoxide. The study clearly indicated carbon monixide was emanating from many different sources and was very difficult to detect.

Early symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning include yawning, headache, nausea, dizziness, ringing in the ears, and abdominal pains, Gaspy breathing and unconsciousness quickly follow. The victim should get fresh air immediately and he should be kept lying down and warm, A physician should be called promptly, and inhalations of oxygen or oxygen-carbon dioxide minture administered.

Since the nerve cells are involved in the poisoning, temporary or permanent damage can be done to the brain, with serious disturbances of vision, hearing, speech, and memory.

A new training program, tailor -made to equip local sanitarians with a capability for teaching the principles of sanitary food preparation and service to local food handlers, was launched this week in Austin.

The new course is an effort by the Texas State Department of Health to make food hygiene courses readily available at the local level. Heretofore, the State Health Department, Division of Public Health Education, has been providing instructors on request to train food handlers in a given community in methods of food-borne disease control.

Officials at the State Health Department concluded more progress could be made if they used the "multiplier effect," State Health Department officials will train local sanitarians, health educators, and other public health personnel to teach courses of their own.

Local health officials could then supervise the training of local food handlers in the proper food hygiene techniques, giving them more training at more convenient times and with more follow-up services.

These training programs for community health officials will be conducted by the State Health Department once every quarter. or a total of four a year. The courses will be conducted in the different geographical areas of the state in an effort to eventually cover the entire state. The three-day course held in Austin this week taught its 50 participants how to teach food hygiene practices to virtually anyone who serves food.

The Texas Association of Sanitarians is cooperating in the seminars.

Sanitarians will be provided with an instructor's guide, films on various phases of food hydemonstration materials, illustrative color slides, and similar materials.

Health officials hope the training program will help to reduce the incidence of foodborne disease in Texas.

A recent study by the National Restaurant Association indicates that only 8 percent of food poisoning cases result from food that has been kept too long; another 38 percent can be laid to improper refrigeration. The rest are due to improper handling or preparation, poor insect or rodent control. Infection among the help, and poor sanitary practices, such as dishwashing.
