## Armed Forces Caravan To Visit KC April 16

The Armed Forces Bicentennial Caravan, illustrating the theme, "The History of the Armed Services and Their Contributions to the Nation," will be on display in Knox City Friday, April 16.

Four mobile museums, which represent the four major military services, will be on display from 1:00 p.m. until 7:00 p.m. in the block directly in front of The Knox County News. The street will be roped off from the Citizens State Bank west to Model Cleaners during the display hours. Admission is free to the public.

According to Mrs. Doris Crownover, secretary-manager for the Knox City Chamber of Commerce, an opening ceremony is being planned by members of the American Legion's Teague-Carpenter

Post No. 229 along with other activities scheduled during the six hours the caravan is here. Details of the other activities will be given in next week's News.

Army Captain Ken Colucci, officer in charge of the Caravan, said, "This is a concerted effort, by the Armed Forces, to bring the American Revolution Bicentennial closer to the people of Knox City and surrounding communities. It is not a recruiting program." He said the vans use audio-visual techniques to depict not only contributions each service has made toward the freedom Americans enjoy today, but also contributions the services have made toward the civilian community.

## Timilu Graham Has Winning Youth Essay

How does it feel to be chosen as one of 12 winners in a statewide contest and receive a long distance call telling you that you have won a trip abroad? Well!—Seems as if all Timilu Graham could muster was, "Wowee!"

Timilu, a senior in Knox City High School, has been selected as a winner in the statewide Youth For Understanding Bicentennial Courier project. Timilu's winning essay, an open letter to the American patriots in the revolution, helped her to win an all expense paid trip to a foreign country this summer.

Timilu is one of 12 Texas high school students who will travel to a foreign country in June to act as a youth ambassador from this country. She will be living with a host family for a two-month period, while talking about America and Texas in special meetings with officials and students in a selected country.

Timilu was one of 213 students who entered the Texas YFU contest. She was selected as one of 24 semifinalists invited to Houston recently for a personal interview with the judging committee.

Youth For Understanding, the largest of the three U.S. teenage exchange programs, has been officially recognized by the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration in Washington D.C. Since its inception in 1951, YFU has been giving students aged 15-18 the freedom to discover themselves and others through an international family living experience.

The program began as an effort to counteract the bitterness and disillusionment of youth in post World War II Germany. In 1951, 75 German

## Hounds Win Again At Archer City

Knox City's Greyhounds totaled some 155 points to again walk away with another first at the Archer City Wildcat Relays Friday.

Al Bateman scored two first place victories for the Hounds to lead the Greyhounds to the team championship. Bateman recorded wins in the long jump with a leap of 20'9 1/2", and the 100 yard dash with a time of 10.2. Munday finished second place with 112 points, and Holiday was third with 107.

KC scored 40 points in the two relay events, winning the 440 with a time of 44.2 and the mile relay in 3:42.3.

Another first for Knox City was that of Tim Whitten's who ran a 15.4 in the 120 high hurdles. Jimmy Lynn took second place in that event with a time of 15.6.

Charlie Flye ran the 100 yard dash in 10.3 for second place and Billy Bob Reynolds also made a second for KC in the pole vault with 11'0". Reynolds also placed third in

the 880 dash with a time of 2:15.0.

Rusty Grimsley placed second in the Shot put with a throw of 41'11 1/2".

Helping round out scoring for KC were Flye who was

second in the 220 dash with a time of 23.3 and Flint Richardson who placed third in that event with a clocking of 23.5.

Grass Planting Time Is Here

The grass planting season in the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District is here. Many farmers in the district are already in the process of planting grass. The best time to plant grass is in March and April, but no later than June 1. Our spring rains usually occur in April and May and the grass seed, or sprigs need to be in the ground to take advantage of the moisture.

The seeding of native rangeland must be done immediately following seedbed preparation made by mechanical means such as rootplowing, treedoing, or rootraking. The seeding operation can be done during the seedbed operation by tractor mounted seeders, or with a grass drill following rootraking and burning of brush piles.

Pastures must be deferred following seeding until grass is well established if good results are to be obtained. Good examples of range seedings can be seen on the A.L. Cox ranch near Benjamin, on the Eugene Brown farm near Rhineland, and the Glenn McWhorter farm near Vera.

Landowners are advised to sprig Bermuda grass on grassed waterways and on critical areas. Bermuda grass should be sprigged in a moist firm seedbed. It is important that Bermuda spriggs be kept moist and protected from wind and sunlight between digging and sprigging operations.

The native grasses such as Sideoats grama, Switchgrass and Green Sprangletop should be seeded in a dead litter crop or mulch litter. Native grasses are planted very shallow and litter or mulch is needed to protect the young plants until a root system is established.

Grasses planted in cut areas such as waterways and critical areas should be fertilized. Soil tests in the Wichita Brazos SWCD show that about 30 pounds of nitrogen and 40 pounds of phosphorus per acre should be applied for proper establishment on most soils in the district.

Producers planting grass on critical areas and waterways this year are Carl Chafin, John McCown, and Charles Lankford of Knox City, Phillip McAfee of Munday, and Arlin Kinnibrough of Vera.

## SS Reports Due April 30

Quarterly wage reports and social security contributions for household workers are due by April 30, according to Carl R. Beisner, claims representative of the Vernon Social Security Office.

Persons who pay a household worker \$50 or more in cash wages in any three-month calendar quarter must send a report of the wages, along with the social security contribution, to the Internal Revenue Service within one month after the end of the quarter.

"Wage reports and social security contributions for January, February, and March of 1976 are due by April 30," Mr. Beisner said.

The wage report may be filed on a form available at any Internal Revenue Service Office—"Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees (for social security)."

The social security contribution for a household employee is 5.85 percent of covered wages, and the employer pays a matching amount.

Social security contributions build retirement, disability, survivors, and Medicare protection for workers and their families. Those who employ household workers can get a free copy of the leaflet, "Social Security and your household employee," from the Vernon social security office at 1701 Cumberland, phone 817 552-9346.

### County Riding Club To Sponsor Playday

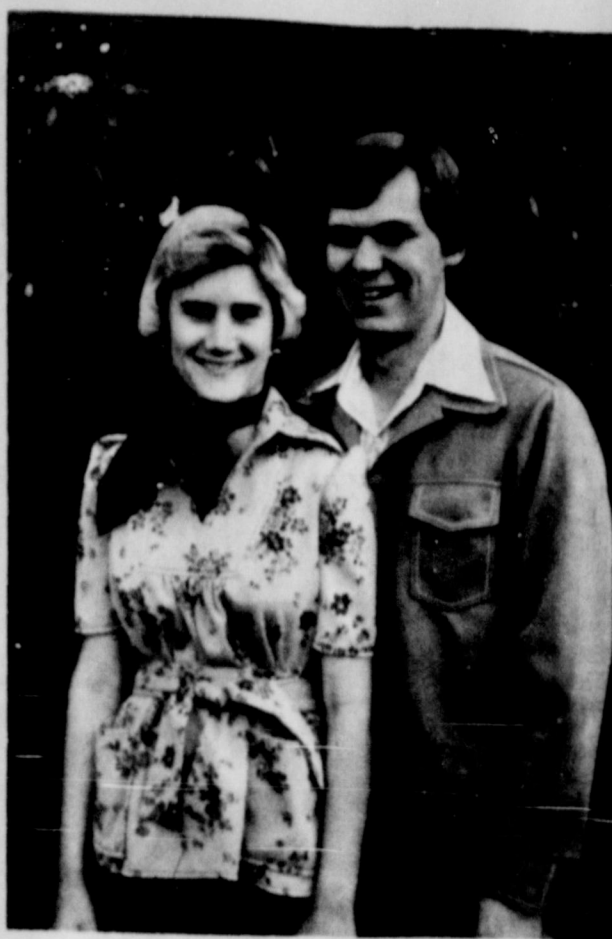
