ary 16, 1880, near Gainesville. He came to Knox City as manager of the Wooldridge Lumber Co. in 1908.

On December 8, 1910, he married Miss Pearl Reeder of Knox City, and the couple moved to Rvan in 1913. At the time of his death, he was first assistant to the county treasurer of Jefferson County, Okla.

Survivors are the wife, one son, Dr. J. R. Sawyers, who is in the army; one brother, Wayne
