TWO KNOX CITY BOYS TO GRADUATE AT A. & M.

College Station, Texas, May 24 — Candidates for degrees at A. & M. College, to be conferred Friday night, June 7, total 581, making up the largest graduating class in the history of the college. Of these two are from Knox City, J. H. Finley and B. B. Campbell, Jr.

A total of 34 students are candidates for advanced degrees, 32 as master of science and 2 for professional degrees as electrical engineer.

Candidates for baccalaureate degrees include 467 for Bachelor of Science; 35 Bachelor of Arts; four Bachelor of Architecture; and 35 Doctor of Veterinary Medicine. Six students are candidates for certificates in the two-year course in cotton marketing and classing.

The candidates come from 260 Texas cities and towns, ten cities in six other states and three cities in Mexico.

Knox City candidates include: Bachelor of Science, Agricultural Administration, J. H. Finley, Mechanical Engineering, B. B. Campbell, Jr.

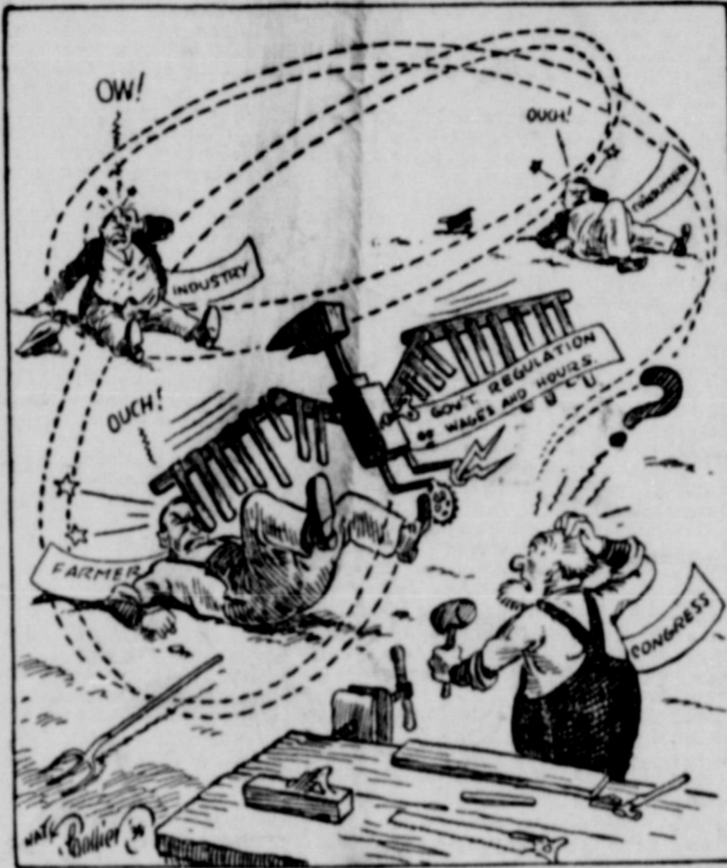

Poppy Day

Saturday May 28, 1938

WHAT IS POPPY DAY?

Poppy Day is a day observed throughout the United States by wearing memorial poppies in honor of the World War dead. It will be observed this year on May 28th, the Saturday before Memorial Day.

WHAT IS THE MEMORIAL POPPY?

The memorial poppy is a replica of the poppies which grew on the battle fields of France and Belgium during the World War.

WHY WAS THE POPPY CHOSEN AS THE MEMORIAL FLOWER?

The poppy was chosen as the memorial flower for the World War dead because it grew where they fell, the one touch of beauty in the desolate battle areas.

WHO MAKES THE MEMORIAL POPPY?

Memorial poppies are made by disabled World War Veterans working in government hospitals and in convalescent workrooms maintained by the American Legion Auxiliary.

WHO DISTRIBUTES THE MEMORIAL POPPY?

Women of the American Legion Auxiliary, working as unpaid volunteers, distribute the poppies throughout the United States.

WHAT IS DONE WITH THE MONEY CONTRIBUTED FOR THE POPPIES?

Every penny is used to support the work of the American Legion and Auxiliary for the welfare of the disabled veterans, their families and the families of the dead.

WHO WEARS THE MEMORIAL POPPY?

Every American who wishes to honor the war dead and aid the war's living victims.

Poppy Day To Be Observed Here

GAS COMPANY VICTOR IN BIGGEST RATE CASE

Lone Star Gas Company's victory in the famous gate rate case decided in its favor by the United States Supreme Court is the climax to a long series of court victories by the company, according to company officials. Since 1929, the company has won nine cases that have reached final decision.

In the present case, after six years of exhaustive investigation by the Texas Railroad Commission and the Courts, the company has established the fact that the railroad commission's order reducing its rate from 40 cents per 1,000 cubic feet to 32 cents was unjust and confiscatory. The Supreme Court sustained the verdict of a jury in the district court at Austin which held that the rate ordered by the commission was unfair and has returned the case to the Court of Civil Appeals for judgment accordingly.

This case, started by the railroad commission in 1932, was the one in which the commission assailed the company's advertising, laying down a policy which virtually would have prevented the company from advertising had it been upheld. While the commission did not eliminate the company's advertising expense in this case, it inferred that most of its advertising was for political purposes and stated as a positive policy that only the local distributing companies should advertise and not the Lone Star Gas Co.

The Supreme Court, according to company attorneys, in effect held that since the jury as the trier of the facts found the commission's order confiscatory upon the conflicting facts, the Court of Civil Appeals could not overturn the jury's verdict on the ground that the company had failed to properly segregate its Texas and Oklahoma property. The High Court further held that the evidence was sufficient which the company introduced in support of its claim that the commission's rate was confiscatory.

Saturday, May 28th, was proclaimed "Poppy Day" in Knox City in a proclamation issued today by Mayor C. C. Hoge. The proclamation urged all citizens to honor the World War dead and aid the war's living victims by wearing the American Legion memorial poppy that day. The proclamation reads:

"Whereas, in the World War of 1917-1918 the young men of Knox City gave their service to the defense of the United States in an exalted spirit of patriotism and some were called upon to sacrifice their lives in that service:

"Whereas, many others were called upon to sacrifice health and strength, with resulting suffering and hardships to themselves and families which continue to this day:

"Whereas, the memory of these patriotic sacrifices should ever be kept fresh in the minds of patriotic citizens, while fullest aid should be extended to those still within the reach of human aid:

"And, Whereas, the wearing of the Memorial Poppy both honors the dead and aids the disabled and dependents:

"Therefore, I, C. C. Hoge, Mayor of the City of Knox City Texas, do hereby proclaim Saturday, May 28th, Poppy Day in the City of Knox City, Texas and urge all citizens to observe the day by wearing The American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary Memorial Poppy."

The other major cases won by the company since 1929 involved rates in Fort Worth, Royce City, Wichita Falls and Oklahoma, and regulatory issues in Sherman, Wichita Falls and Fort Worth.

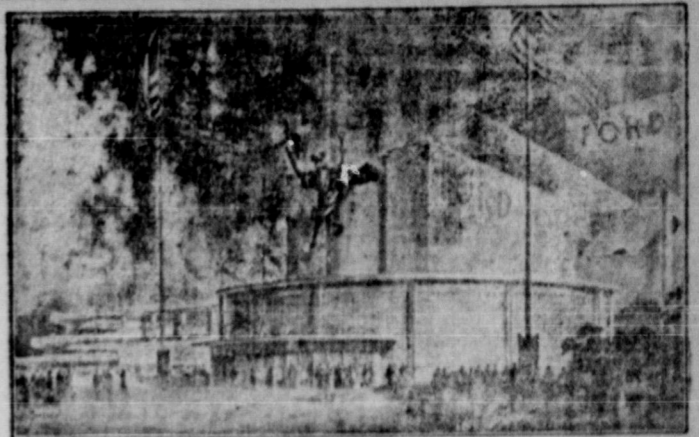

Ford Exhibit At New York World's Fair



THE theme of the Ford Motor Company's exhibit building at the New York World's Fair in 1939 will be prophetic of the advances America may expect in transportation in coming decades, according to an announcement by Edsel Ford, president of the company.

Based upon an exposition of the institutional character of the Ford company and the fundamental policies which have directed its growth during the past 35 years, the fair exhibit will reach its climax in "The Road of Tomorrow," an elevated highway more than half a mile long, rising upon a series of spiral ramps, traversing the borders of a patio and finally circling the main building on a deep setback at the top of the walls.

The exhibit, in four rather distinct parts, will include an entrance rotunda facing the main west gate, a spacious Manufacturing Hall, a patio, with pools, playing fountains and large rest areas, and the elevated road. From the west side

of the patio, steps will rise to a broad mezzanine. There Ford V-8 and Lincoln-Zephyr cars will load passengers for the ride over "The Road of Tomorrow."

From the leading platform the cars will pass to the south, enter the spiral ramps, climbing to the upper level and following the elevated highway as it passes over the mezzanine, west along the south wall of Manufacturing Hall, through a tunnel lined with photomurals; thence circling the top of the building, through a glass tunnel high in the Rotunda; down the ramp to the second level, around the patio and back to the starting point.

At night flood lighting will fall upon the cars as they circle the highway high on the walls of Manufacturing Hall, playing moving shadows on the building walls, in full sight of the whole fair grounds. The building will occupy the highest location on the grounds. It will be decorated in white, red and blue and will be floodlighted at night.

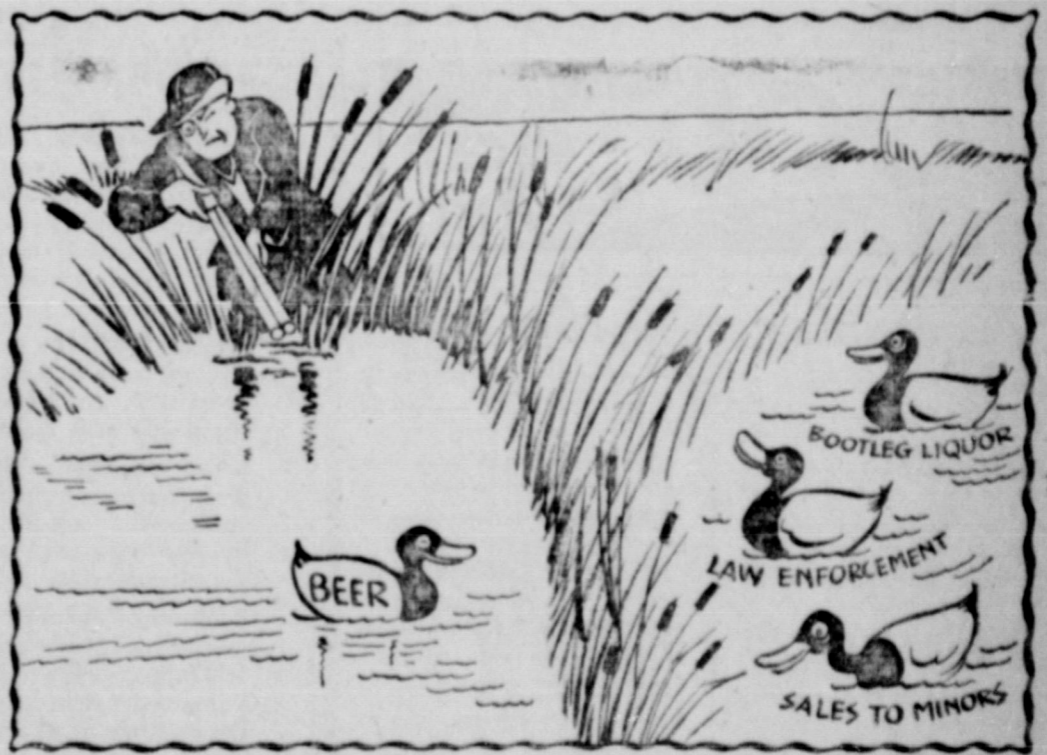

**Notice To Taxpayers of

This is to notify you that the City of Benjamin, Texas, has been sued by the BOND HOLDERS for payment of past due bonds and interest and it is necessary that the City take some action towards the collection of delinquent taxes in order that they may pay their bonds and interest as they become due.

It seems that the only avenue left is for the City to force the collection of delinquent taxes by law. I will be in the OFFICE OF THE MAYOR in the City Hall, in Benjamin, Texas, on the first, second and third days of June for the purpose of receiving taxes and making arrangements for payment at some definite time. This appeal is made to the delinquent tax payers and you are requested to be there on one of the three days above mentioned, between the hours of NINE and FIVE. If you live away from Benjamin and cannot be present, a statement of your taxes will be mailed to you on request.

ASKING TOO MUCH GETS NOTHING

The candidates in Texas who are running on a platform favoring increased pensions for the old, or favoring granting pensions to all who are sixty-five years of age, need not be so careful as the aged pensioners should be. If the candidate can, by reason of his promised favors, win a lucrative office we will not suffer, but the old who labor under the delusion that the State can grant practically unlimited amounts for pensions are liable to find themselves without as much State aid as they are now receiving.

They ought to give diligent study to the results in those states that have adopted a "liberal" pension policy. Colorado was so liberal that it voted to grant a pension of

\$45 a month to all persons over 65 regardless of their needs. Colorado promised but Colorado was not paid, and has not paid because her voting was so liberal that she could not find means of raising the money to pay the liberal amounts. Uncle Sam refused to be as liberal, limiting his part to \$15 per month to each "needy" citizen, and paying only when the State paid an equal amount to the needy.

Oklahoma was "liberal" with her pensioners, paying to men long dead, or to men not in need. Uncle Sam doesn't like that kind of liberality so he cut all relief to Oklahomans.

No one need doubt that if Texas gets half so liberal as some of her candidates promise to be that promises will be about all that she will be able to pay. There is a limit to what the tax payers can, or will pay, and if that limit is passed the pensioners will be sure to suffer. Social security is all right up to a certain point, but beyond that any effort will fail and suffering will result. Those entitled to pensions above all others ought to work and vote to keep pension payments within due bounds lest they lose what is their due.

A New York Judge has ordered all women on the jury in his court to remove their hats, remarking that they lacked dignity. They didn't say so, but we are sure what the women jurors think is that the judge lacks sense.

The New Deal is quite as successful as was the late match king of Sweden, who spent a hundred million dollars before he crashed. The New Deal has spent only about twenty-two billion and hasn't smashed yet.

The party row in Pennsylvania, with Chairman Farley favoring one faction in a three-cornered fight, promises hope to the G. O. P. that the Keystone State will re-

turn to its old love in November.

J. Edgar Hoover says that the crime bill we pay taxes each individual in the sum of \$120 a year. And to think how much good fishing that would pay for if we had our \$120.

France has gotten in such a hurry for more war planes that she has ordered a number from American factories. And you will be safe in betting that the planes will not be shipped on open account. They will be paid for before shipment is made. Uncle Sam's experience with furnishing France means is sure to be remembered by airplane makers here.

The voters of Pennsylvania who claim allegiance to the Democratic party apparently do not look with favor on John L. Lewis and his CIO. The candidates Lewis backed took a back seat when the returns began to come in. And Jas. A. Farley found that the voter took half his advice by voting for one candidate he favored and against another he favored. They didn't seem to like "instructions from Washington."

The president has signed the bill appropriating one billion, one hundred and fifty-seven million dollars for the expansion of the navy. That places Uncle Sam in the lead in the race of building more and bigger war vessels. Of course Uncle Sam does not intend to use those vessels in war, but is just building them to show his good faith in keeping world peace.

Primitive things were not all bad, nor

primitive customs to be despised. When Siam recently wanted to build a school the royal family led an elephant hunt in which fifty-five wild elephants were captured, sold and the money devoted to the building of a school. Over here we would have voted bonds to run forty or fifty years and on which we would have to pay interest for two generations.

A Seattle woman has gained a new husband but lost a chicken delivered each week by her former husband on court orders. Having married another man, the chicken must be furnished by him if she gets any. Won't it be painful if she finds a chicken a week beats a husband any day?

The tragedy in which Haile Selassie has the chief role is not a new one. Many other kings have gone into discard for the same reason which is that they ruled over territory that some other nation desired and was powerful enough to obtain. The deeper tragedy is the one of which Haile Selassie is a spectator rather than a participant. It is the tragedy of the complete collapse of the device which democratic nations set up to protect the weak. It is the tragedy of internal morality sinking to such depths as to condone the conquest.

Hitler's safe in allowing the notes of the Liberty Bell to be heard in a coming symphony concert. He knows nobody'd recognize them by this time.

Uruguay is one nation in a million these days. The sign on that country's consulate in Philadelphia was stolen a while ago, and nobody has been able to think of a reason for it yet.

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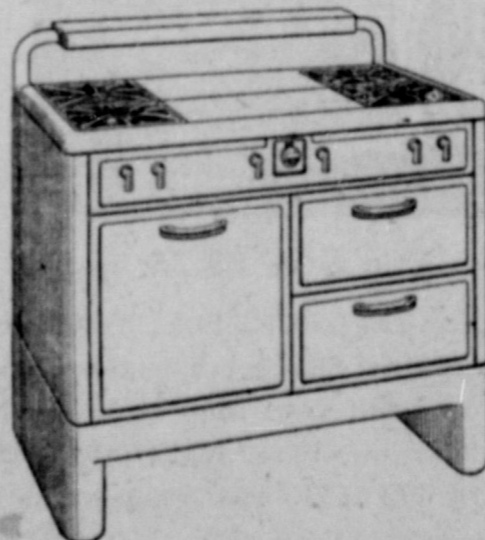
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
