

Survivors Deceased Servicemen Should Contact USES Office

Wichita Falls, Texas-Survivors of mployment covered by the Social Seurity Act prior to their entrance into the armed forces were urged to con tact the nearest Social Security Board field office by R. L. Surles, manager of the Wichita Falls field office.

In addition to any benefits payable from War Risk Insurance, there may also be some payment from the Old-Age and Survivors Insurance system These payments can be made if the worker was insured under the Social Security plan, particularly if the deceaed is survived by minor children. since monthly payments continue un til the youngest child reaches age 18. Delay in filing the claim after notice of death is received may result in some loss of benefit by the survi-






