how to make the different articles of furniture for the tabernacle. And in Exodus 27:1, we find where He said to make the ALTAR and to make it FOURSQUARE. Exodus 28th chapter gives the description for the garments for the Priests and we find that the Breastplate of Judgment also had to be made FOURSQUARE. Besides, in the 37th and 38th chapters it tells where Moses made the Incense Altar FOURSQUARE, also the ALTAR of burnt offerings was made FOURSQUARE. In turning to the first book of Kings, 7:31, we also find where Hiram in building the vessels for Solomon's temple made the borders of the lavers FOURSQUARE, not round. In Ezekiel 45:20 we find there, "Ye shall offer the Holy oblation (offering) FOURSQUARE."

In the very last book of the Bible, Revelation 21:16, the description of the CITY that lieth FOURSQUARE. Acts 1:11, "This same Jesus, which is taken up from you into Heaven, shall come in like manner as ye have seen Him go into Heaven."

Altogether, the Foursquare Gospel means SALVATION, HEALING, the BAPTISM of the HOLY GHOST, and the soon coming KING. We believe in the Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Ghost, in fact the Foursquare Gospel is the Bible from beginning to end. Next week I will continue with the first corner, Salvation. May God bless you all. Remember, Jesus loves you.

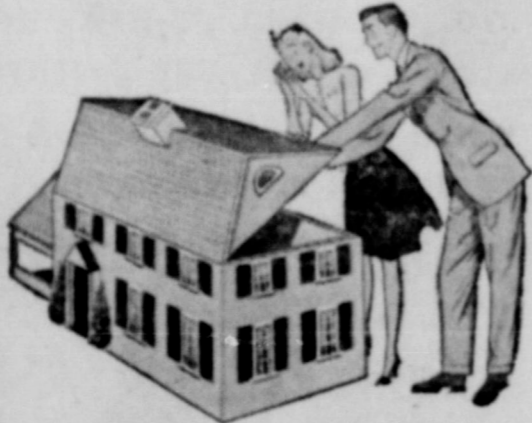

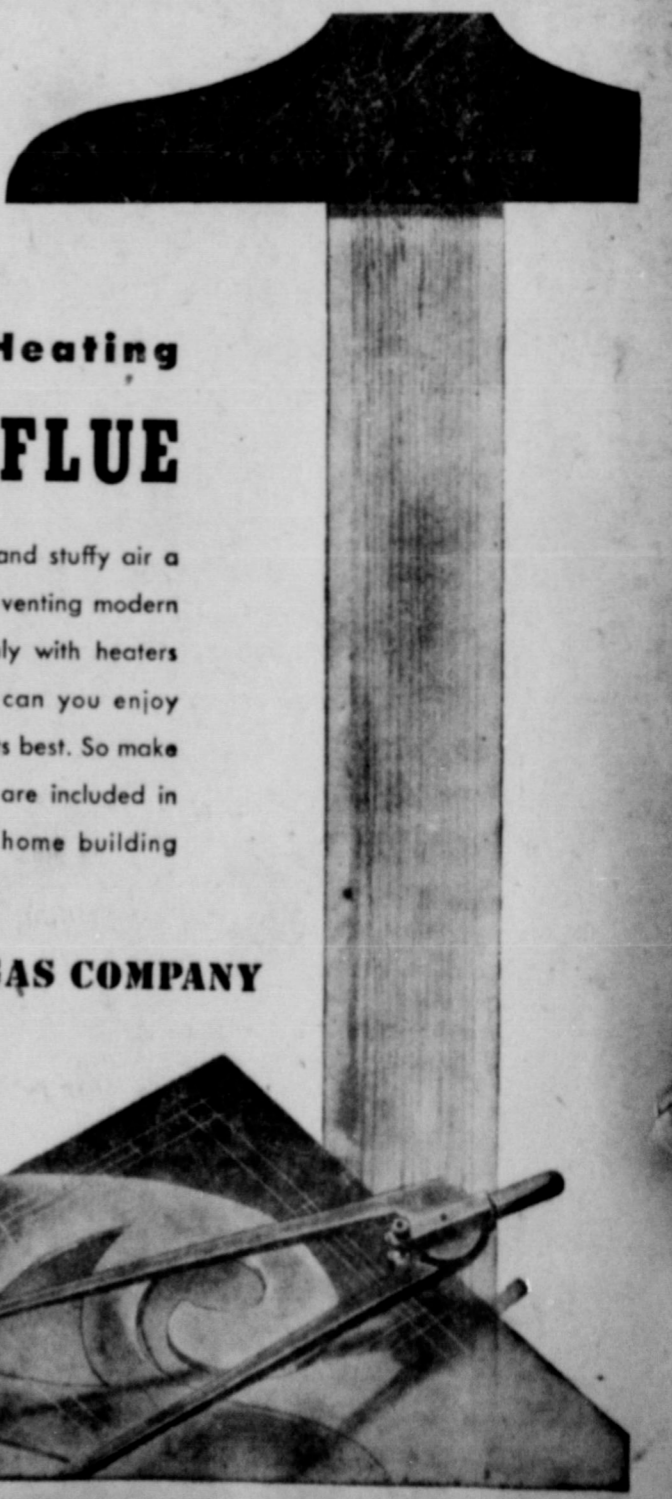
