CONNALLY INTRODUCES NEW PENSION BILL

Washington, D. C., July 12 -Senator Tom Connally of Texas has introduced in the Senate and expects to urge before that body the adoption of a proposal to secure two-thirds Federal participation in Old Age assistance payments up to the maximum of \$15.00, the State and Federal governments to continue to share equally above that amount, as at present. If enacted into the Social Security Act, this would have the affect of providing \$10.00 from the Federal government to match the first \$5.00 from the State government for federally eligible old age pensioners in Texas instead of the equal basis o: contribution now in operation.

In explanation of als plan, Senator Connally said:

"Under the present law, the Federal government pays to each State an amount equal to the average paid by the State to old age pensioners who are eligible and are on the roll under the State administration of old age assistance or pensions. The maximum limit is \$15.00 per month on the part of the Federal government, but there is no minimum fixed by the law. The result has been that in some states the Federal contribution has been out of proportion to the same contribution in other states. For itstance, in Arkansas, the state contribution to something over \$3.00 per month and, therefore, the Federal government pays to the eligible old age pensioners in Arkansas something over \$3.00 per month. "To somewhat rectify this inequality, the amendment i have offered provides that the Federal government shall cortribute two-thirds of the payment to be made to old age pensioners on the state rolls to an amount not exceeding \$15 (in other words, the Federal government would pay \$2.00 for each dollar provided by the State, or \$10 in Federal contribution to \$5 state contribu- next ten days. "PAPPY" USES PENCIL ON STATE APPROPRIATIONS

MORE TRAFFIC DEATHS

Austin, July 12-State police today sought an explanation as to why nearly half the people killed in traffic are fatally injured on Saturdays and Sun-

The death toll is far out of proportion to the volume of traffic on those days, even though week end travel is high.

Much of the blame, state police believe, must be laid to the "week end driver"-careless, thoughtless, joy riding, sometimes drunk and often inexperienced. He must shoulder responsibility for an apalling toll which in five months this ear has claimed 279 lives out of a total of 567 fatalties for that period, they declared.

The five month survey dislosed that 49 per cent of the traffic deaths occurred on week nds, 26 per cent on Sundays, 23 per cent on Saturdays. But less than 34 per cent of all trafsic moves on week ends--18 per cent on Sundays, 15.7 per pointed out. The volume of annually. traffic was taken from average figures developed by the statewide highway planning survey based on a year's actual count.

Week end fatalties were the highest in January, when 73 lives were claimed on four Saturdays and five Sundays, and have declined appreciably, the survey showed. February had studied it. 56 deaths for four Saturdaya and four Sundays; March, 50 deaths for four Saturdays and four Sundays; April, 53 deaths Sundays; and May, 47 deaths for four Saturdays and four

Chief Ralph L. Buell of the state driver's license division described the "week end driver" thus:

"He is frequently the man who leaves the car with his wife all week, then takes it out on Sunday for a long drive on the highways. He is unpre pared by habit for heavy trafsplit-second reaction. Often he can't criticize him to his face. driver

"Frequently he is a student, pushing his car to the utmost to spend all the hours possible that week end with the home folks-and the girl back home.

Austin, July 11 .- Gov. W. ON WEEK ENDS Lee O'Daniel today slashed \$5,383,616 from appropriation bills passed by the legislature at its recent session.

His action on the appropriation bills, together with vetoes and signatures of a number of other measures, in effect finished business of the session, the longest in the history of Texas.

The governor swung his veto ax on the appropriations for state government departments, colleges, eleemosynary institutions and miscellaneous claims, but allowed those for the judiciary and rural and vocational school aid to go through un-

The most staggering cut sustained by any single department was more than a million dollar slash in the highway department, biggest of all state agencies.

The governor blue-penciled the entire department and district employes division of the agency, abolishing of 327 employes ranging from administrative assistant at \$4,200 . cent on Saturdays, state officers | year to porters earning \$660

The veto left the department only 191 employes and represented better than a 50 per cent overall slass.

Julian Montgomery, the department's chief engineer, said he had not been informed as to what the veto covered and will not comment until he has

The tabulated amount was \$1,047,740 compared to a total highway department appropriation by the legislature of \$2,-

020.744. The appropriations for edu cation suffered less than appropriations for departments and eleemosynary institutions.

Most of the cuts were in buildings for eleemosynary institutions, provision for staffs to man those buildings, and in various departments.

Appropriations totaling more than \$62,000 for buildings and equipment at the Wichita Falis State hospital were lopped off. These were in addition to the tuberculosis hospital, \$40,000: additional needed appropriations if the hospital addition were granted, \$15.636, and aundry equipment. \$7,400.
