KC Youths Win At Fort Worth Show

Knox City exhibitors captured two Grand Championships and a Reserve Championship with their entries in the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show Breeding Swine Show last weekend. None of Knox City's entries placed out of the top ten in their respective classes.

Nine animals were entered in the Fort Worth show from Knox City.

Kyle White's Spotted Poland China boar took the first place ribbon in his class and then took the Grand Championship. Kyle's August Spotted Poland China gilt placed fourth in her class.

Kristi White's Spotted Poland China gilt was named Grand Champion after taking first in her class of August gilts.

Kristi and Kyle are the children of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy White of Knox City.

Art Crownover's August Hampshire boar took a second place in his class, and then showed to the Reserve Championship. Art also had an August Duroc boar which took first in his class.

Mike Burkham showed his August Duroc gilt to a second place in her class. His sister, Gaylynn, took a fourth place with her August Duroc gilt.

Accompanying the young showmen and their animals to Fort Worth were Knox City vocational agriculture instructors Leon Burkham and Jim Dillon, Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy White, Mr. and Mrs. John Crownover, and Kenneth Lankford.

While at the show several former KC residents including the Roger Butlers and the Jimmy Hackneys, stopped by to visit the Knox City Exhibit. Also, a number of area residents visited with and cheered on the Knox City contestants, according to Burkham.

Burkham left Wednesday with 18 animals to be shown in the market swine division. Contestants accompanying him were Kelly Robinson, Ray Thompson, Bobby Marion, Mike Burkham, Mark Howell, Joey Swain, and Jimmy Ross. Gaylynn Burkham and Kyle and Kristi White will join the group in Fort Worth Friday when they will show their animals.

Fitzgerald said that a building could be completely destroyed before the volunteers reach it if all the information is not available, especially the location.

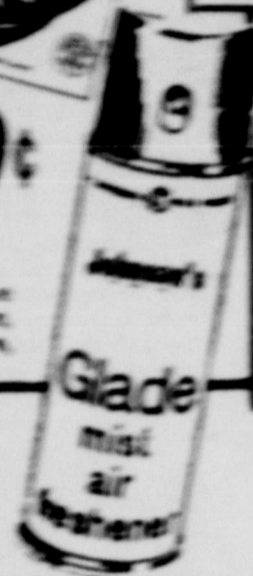
