# **VOTE FOR GEORGE** MOFFETT STATE SENATOR 23rd District

In 1931, he tried to get Texas to establish a cotton research laboratory to find new uses for cotton. He reasoned that since cotton is used in making tires, gun cotton, paper, airplanes, cellophane, etc., that many other uses could be found if proper search were made.

When Moffett first introduced his cotton research laboratory bill in 1931, he had few supporters, but he kept pushing his bill. In 1937, the Legislature adopted it, but the Governor vetoed it after Legislature had adjourned.

However, the merit of the idea gamed ground, and continued agiation caused the National Congress to include in the 1938 Farm Bill a provision for four farm re-search laboratories - one for cotton to be located in a cotton state. Mississippi has offered a h 'f million dollars bonus if the Federal Government will put this laboratory in that state.

Had the search for new uses started eight years ago, when Moffett first proposed it, very likely there would be enough new uses for cotton now that acreage reduction would not be necessary. Idle acres would be producing, employment would be better, and money more plentiful.




