General Election Tuesday May Draw Heavy Vote Here

Democrats, Republicans, members of the Constitution Party, independents, and those who call themselves "Democrats for Eisenhower" will go to the polls next Tuesday, Nov. 6, to elect everything from constables to a president.

Although not as many poll taxes were paid in Knox County this year as in 1952, interest in the presidential race indicates that a heavy vote will be cast in the county.

The big question in Texas is whether the state will again go in the Eisenhower-Nixon column, as it did in 1952, or if the state's electoral votes will go to the Democratic nominees, Adlai Stevenson and Estes Kefauver.

Early in the campaign, most observers conceded that Texas would probably go Democratic, but the timing of soil bank checks, as well as the present crisis in the Middle East, may affect the outcome and the results are expected to be close.

Campaigns by both parties have reached a fever pitch in the state in recent weeks, with Senator Lyndon Johnson and Congressman Sam Rayburn heading the Stevenson-Kefauver campaign and Governor Allan Shivers speaking for the Republican candidates. Nixon has visited Texas, and a visit to Dallas this week by Eisenhower was cancelled because of the Middle East crisis.

Knox and most other "rural" counties are expected to stay in the Democratic column. While the state gave Eisenhower 1,102,878 votes in 1952 to Stevenson's 962,228, the vote in Knox County was Stevenson 1,558, Eisenhower 1,034.

The Republicans also have a candidate for Governor, William R. Bryant, and W. Lee O'Daniel, who ran third in the Democratic primary, has been campaigning as a write-in candidate for governor. The Constitution Party is on the ballot with T. Coleman Andrews and Thomas H. Wordel as candidates for president and vice-president.

The Democrats' candidate for governor is Price Daniel, who supported Eisenhower in 1952 but this year has given token support to the nominees of his party.

The ballot will also list, as Democratic nominees for state office, Martin Dies for congressman-at-large; Ben Ramsey for lieutenant governor; Will Wilson for attorney general; Meade F. Griffin for associate justice, Supreme Court, place 1; Robert W. Calvert, place 2; James R. Norvell, place 3; W. A. Morrison, for judge of the court of criminal appeals; William J. Murray Jr. for railroad commissioner; Robert S. Calvert for comptroller of public accounts; Earl Rudder for commissioner of the general land office; Jesse James for state treasurer; and John C. White for state commissioner of agriculture.

District and local nominees are George Moffett, for state senator; Ed J. Cloud for state representative; Lewis M. Williams for district judge; A. W. Davis for district attorney; H. T. Melton for sheriff; John A. Smith for county tax assessor-collector; Lewis Floyd for constable; and Lincoln Bolin for public weigher.

Eight proposed constitutional amendments will also be on the ballot for approval or rejection by Texas voters.

Tomorrow (Friday) night the Greyhounds, in their final home game of the season, will be trying to "upset" the Rule Bobcats.

Rule has the only unbeaten, untied Class B team in the Abilene area, and is rated at the top in area standings.

In 7-B play Rule has played only one game, defeating Lueders, while Rochester leads the district with wins over both Lueders and Aspermont. The Bobcats and Steers will meet at Rule Nov. 17.

Coach Les Cowan said this week that the 'Hounds are still unhampered by injuries, and Rip Collins, stalwart center who was out because of illness Friday night, will be back in action this week.

Cowan said the Rule team uses the single wing and double wing formations, and "they can be upset."

The Knox City Greyhounds

and the Aspermont Hornets battled to a scoreless tie on the local field Friday night, in the Greyhounds' first district game of the season. Aspermont had previously lost to Rochester.

Knox City drove inside the Aspermont five-yard line four times only to be stopped by the Hornets. At one point Doug Bradley, on a reverse around his own left end, raced 30 yards to the goal line, but the play was called back for an off-sides penalty against the 'Hounds.

The Hornets' only penetration in the contest came late in the fourth period, on a drive that started with a Greyhound fumble on the Knox City 30. The visitors worked the ball to the Knox City 3-yard line, where the Greyhounds' stalwart defense headed by Bobby Day, Billy Yarbrough and Don Johnson held them for two downs. The game ended with the visitors on the 2-yard line, with third down coming up.

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New Plymouths and DeSotos On Display

New Plymouth and DeSoto models went on display Tuesday at Egenbacher Motors in Knox City.

The new Plymouths are wider, lower and more powerful, and represent a complete change in styling, body structure and chassis. Wheelbase for the cars has been lengthened to 118 inches for standard models and 122 inches for Suburban station wagons.

On the chassis, coil springs have been taken off the front and replaced with torsion bar suspension. Other innovations include 14 inch wheels with low pressure tires, and a safety recessed steering wheels.

All 1957 Plymouths have more powerful engines than the 1956 models, with a reported increase in performance and economy.

As in 1956, Plymouth is offering four lines, the Belvedere, Savoy, Plaza and Suburban.

The new DeSoto is nearly five inches lower than the 1956 models, and have two large, upswep outward-canted aircraft type tail fins, which offer greater stability at highway speeds, the manufacturer claims.

Local Church to Honor Pastors for 16 Years Service

Rev. and Mrs. Floyd V. Bailey, pastors of the Knox City Four-square Church, will be honored by members of the congregation with "Homecoming" at the church Sunday.

The occasion will mark the Baileys' 16th year of service with the local church.

There will be morning services, dinner at the church, and afternoon and evening services. Former pastors will speak during the services.

"Everyone in the area is invited to attend," members of the congregation said Tuesday. "If you cannot attend the morning service, you are welcome in the afternoon or evening."

Rev. and Mrs. Bailey came to Knox City 16 years ago from Norwalk, Calif. During their ministry here the church has had 912 converts, 417 of whom are known to be still active in the church. Seven of the converts are now missionaries, and six are ministers.

For the past ten years Rev. Bailey has been district superintendent for a district extending from Seymour to Abilene to Sweetwater. He has helped to build six churches—at Stamford, Hamlin, Rochester, Haskell, Abilene and Sweetwater. A congregation has been founded at Munday, but no building has been constructed.

The local church now has an active membership of 120. The church's property value has been increased from \$4,500 to \$33,000 during Rev. Bailey's tenure.

Services at the church Sunday will be: Sunday School at 10 a. m., morning worship at 11, afternoon service at 2:30 and evening worship at 7:00.

Soil Conservation Technicians Advise Planting Cover Crops

Many parts of the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation Service District have recently received sufficient moisture to enable farmers to plant winter cover crops, according to technicians of the Soil Conservation Service.

Winter cover crops furnish a protective cover on the land during the critical blowing period. Ray Blackwell, work unit supervisor, said. They also add organic matter to the soil, which helps increase the water-holding capacity of the soil, plant food and air. Where winter legumes are grown nitrogen is added to the soil, which is essential to the

growth of all crops.

Winter cover crops adapted to most soils in the district include Austrian Winter peas, vetch, or a mixture of these two legumes with small grain. When Austrian winter peas are drilled, 20 to 30 pounds should be seeded per acre. If planted in rows, 8 to 10 pounds per acre should be used. Vetch should be seeded at the rate of 15 to 25 pounds per acre when drilled alone. If planted with small grain 10 to 15 pounds per acre should be seeded and when planted in rows 5 to 7 pounds should be seeded.

The Wichita-Brazos district has seeding equipment that can be used in planting these cover crops. The type of equipment now available are regular grain drills with fertilizer attachments,

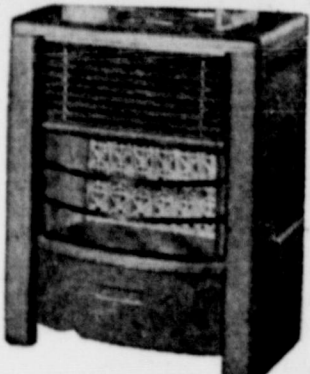
inter-row seeders, to plant cover crops in the middles of row crops, and special conservation plows

that enable the cover crops to be planted on the sides of beds. All legume seed should be in-

oculated with the proper bacteria in order to obtain results.

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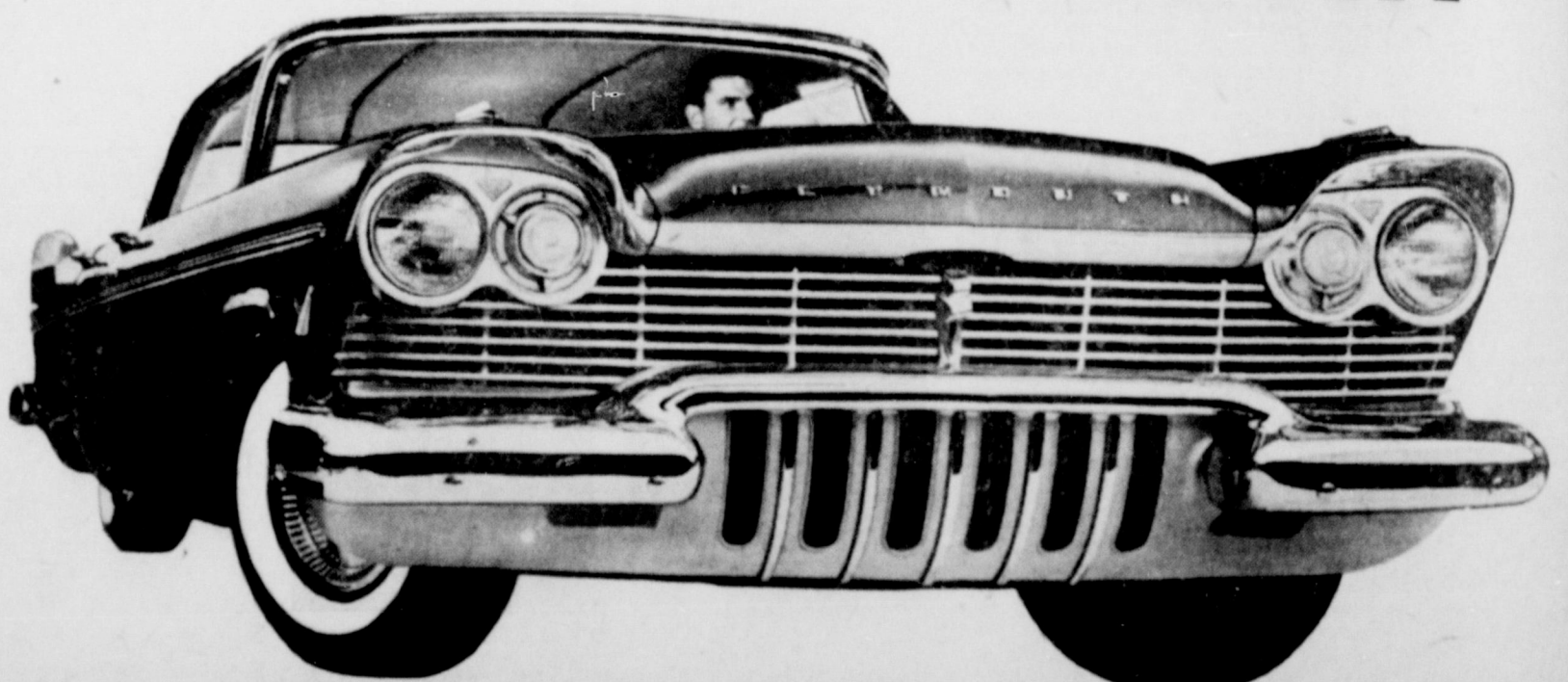

Veterans Insurance Deadline Changed

Veterans separated from active service since September 4, 1956, will not have 120 days in which will apply for 5-year term nonconvertible GI insurance; they will have only until December 31, 1956.

Robert W. Sisson, manager of the Veterans Administration regional office at Lubbock, said the new application deadline was set by the recently enacted Servicemen's and Veterans' Survivor Benefit Act (Public Law 881, 84th Congress).

Before this law was enacted, Mr. Sisson said, eligible veterans had 120 days from separation in which to apply for the post-service five-year term nonconvertible policy.

The new law ends issuance of this insurance effective January 1, 1957, and thereby established Dec. 31 as the deadline for ap-

plication, even though less than 120 days have elapsed since separation, Sisson said.

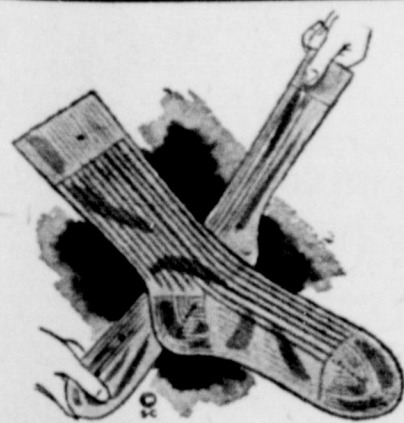
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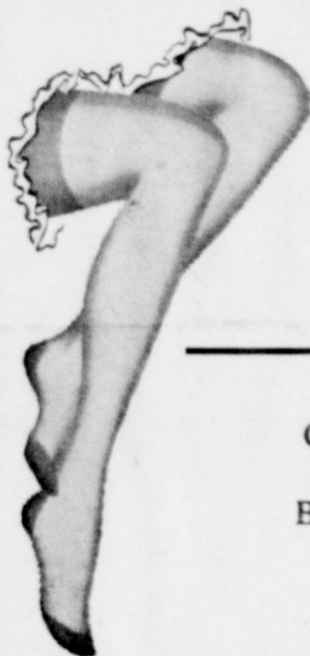

'Khaki-Color Package' Just What We Needed

(Reprinted from "Letters to Editor", Ft. Worth Star-Telegram)

In a speech delivered at the Arena in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, on October 8th, 1952, Adlai Stevenson is credited with having made what is likely the most ill-conceived statement ever uttered by any candidate for public office in America when he said of his opponent, Dwight D. Eisenhower, "the Republicans are trying to put over a fast deal in trying to get the American people to buy a nice new fancy khaki-colored package, without opening it first."

This slur at the uniform of our country must have shocked everyone who heard it, and candidate Stevenson should never be permitted to forget this studied insult to the uniform of our country. We should let him know that we do not intend to forget it.

And It Applies Today

When I read this remark of Stevenson's four years ago I was moved to write the following letter, which was given nationwide circulation during the campaign, and which is just as apropos today:

"Yes, Eisenhower is the 'khaki-colored package' who successfully landed a million or so other 'packages' on Normandy Beach during World War II. There are many thousands of 'khaki-colored packages' lying beneath the soil all over the world today—'packages' which went to the dead-letter office and could not be returned to the sender. Other thousands of such 'packages' have been and are being returned to us, some draped with the flag for which they died, with sad-faced 'khaki-colored packages' as escorts, and still more are coming in marked 'received in bad order'. These are the sons who fill our veterans' hospitals. Perhaps no less unfortunate is the 'khaki-colored package' who comes back undamaged to find the country for which he risked death, wallowing up to its neck in the corruption of war-profits, taxing the people beyond endurance that it may continue its spending spree to keep the Democratic Party in power, even if it means wrapping every youth in America in a 'khaki-colored package'. He must envy those of his buddies who did not come back when he hears slimy politicians telling the people that they 'never had it so good,' and listens to the strains of 'Don't Let Them Take It Away' coming from the throats of power-drunk, greedy Democrats bloated with war riches.

"Sure, Eisenhower is a 'khaki-colored package,' and how many

wives and parents in this country must yearn for the day when they will receive their long overdue 'khaki-colored packages' from Korea and other far-off points.

"He jests at scars that never felt a wound."

Knew What to Do

Now, we can tell Mr. Stevenson that we have opened that 'khaki-colored package' which we took "without opening it first," and in it we find a man who was the choice of 39 of our 48 states; who received 442 of the 531 electoral votes, and a popular vote of 33,936,252. Looking further into this "khaki-colored package" we see a four-year period of peace which has been maintained by this man who had spent most of his adult life fighting wars which started under Democratic administrations. We see a prosperous nation, with income breaking all records. We see over 66,000,000 people employed. We see more peace in labor than we were ever permitted to see during the 20 years of New-Fair Deal regimes. We see a new respect for the rights of states, and for the dignity of man. We see, in fact, a record which should send voters across party lines this year in even greater numbers than in 1952 when we "bought this khaki-colored package without opening it first."

Another Victory Seen

Looking beyond the contents of this "khaki-colored package" we see, very clearly, another victory for the man who wore his country's uniform, when we were threatened abroad, and who as readily took it off to fight for us when we were in trouble at home.

Every soldier, and the parents and wives of every man who has worn the uniform of our country should get out and show their resentment of Stevenson's insult to that uniform on November 6. By our votes let us tell Adlai Stevenson that we like what we found in that "khaki-colored package" when we opened it, and that we will "buy" it for another four years!

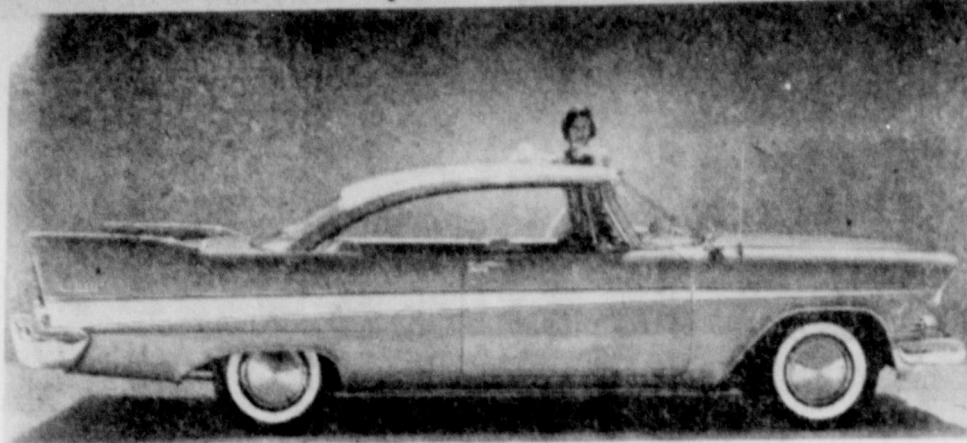

State Representative Is Speaker at Meeting Of Local Lions Club

State Representative Ed Cloud of Rule was guest speaker at the Knox City Lions Club Wednesday, discussing the nine proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on this month. The speaker, who was introduced by John May, said that many Texans believe our constitution is antiquated and should be rewritten, but that he disagrees. Since 1886, he said, 1,700 efforts have been made to amend the constitution, but only 208 proposals were passed by the legislature and submitted to the people. Of that number, 121 were approved by the voters.

"In all likelihood," he said, "several more amendments will be submitted two years from now." Mr. Cloud expressed himself as favoring the proposal to authorize the legislature to compensate persons imprisoned or fined for crimes they did not commit; changing the oath of office for appointive and elective officeholders; permitting judges to deny bail to persons convicted of two previous felonies; aid to the physically and mentally incompetent between ages 18 and 65; and requiring medical or psychiatric testimony before commitment of a person to a mental institution.

He gave brief explanations, without expressing his favor or disfavor, of the proposals to allow county commissioners to reallocate county funds; broadening the method of investing university funds; increasing the veterans land fund; and increasing the benefits of the teacher retirement system.

During a business session, a majority of the Lions voted to close their places of business on Monday, Nov. 12, since the Armistice Day holiday falls on Sunday.

Ground Observers At Truscott to Receive Awards

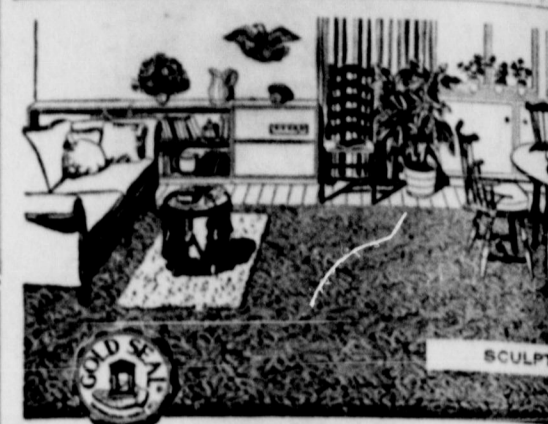

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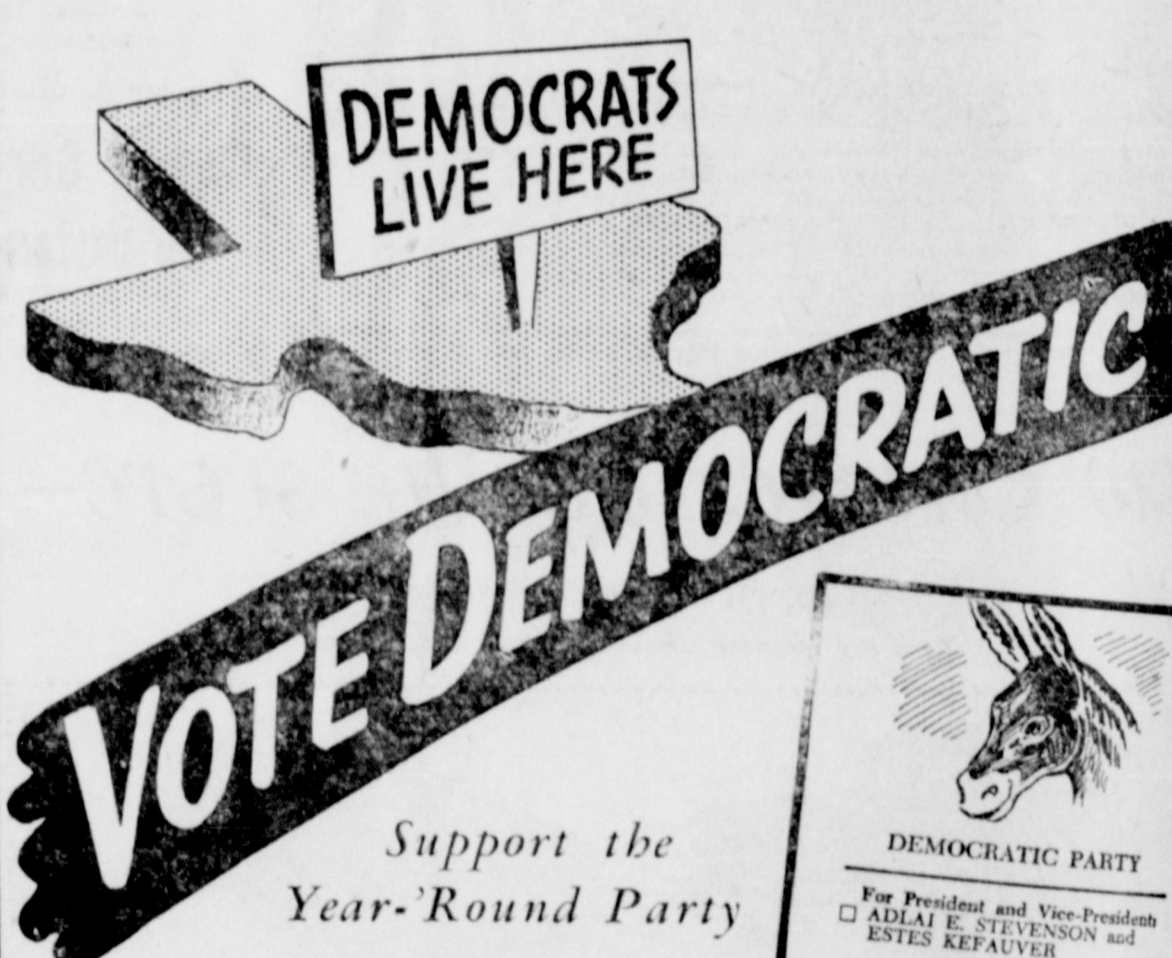
